### **Diann Ramel Hurt** When Hit By Car; **Other Accidents**

Saturday. Diann is an eighth grade pupil at Holy Trinity school. The Ramel family resides a short distance southwest of the village. on Hwy. H.

Miss Ramel suffered a possible fracture of the right leg, injuries to her left leg and head injuries. She was removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance. She was reported to be getting along quite well at the hospital this week.

The mishap occurred when an auto driven by Mrs. Raymond Skrentny, 43, of Kewaskum struck the girl and bicycle. Mrs. Skrentny reported she was driving slowly when the car suddenly hit the gir! and bike. Neither Mrs. Skrentny ror two of her sons who were pas sengers in the vehicle saw the gir before the impact. A bright sur was shining in their faces at the time.

The front bumper and hood of the car was reported to have struck the girl and she was thrown off to the right of the vehicle. The bicycle was under the front end of the auto.
