Everett Kurth Is Killed in Crash; Other Accidents

Two traffic accidents in Washington county during the holiday week raised the highway death toll to 26 for the year. One of the victims was Everett (Butch) Kurth, 43, of 424 W. Loos st., Hartford, a former resident of near Kewaskum, who was killed at approximately 11:18 a. m. Saturday when the oil tank truck he was driving left County Trunk K about 1½ miles south of Hwy. 60 southeast of Hartford and struck a tree, pinning the driver in the cab. Kurth apparently died instantly.

Investigating officers said the tree is only 4½ feet from the highway. The roadway is straight at the scene of the crash and was not slippery. Kurth was employed by his brother, Earl, manager of a bulk gasoline and oil plant at Hartford, and a graduate of Kewaskum high school.

The victim was a son of Paul Kurth now of Milwaukee. The family formerly resided on a farm southwest of Kewaskum. An obituary appears elsewhere in this issue.

Miss Sandra Grubie, 17, R. 1, Kewaskum, suffered fractures of three vertebrae early Friday when the car she was driving left County Trunk G about two-tenths of a mile north of the Washington-Pond du Lac county line, about 1½ miles north of the village at the Mrs. Kate Pesch farm. The auto struck and broke a power pole and sideswiped several small trees before coming to a stop. She was removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance. The car, owned by Dennis Bingen, Kewaskum, was damaged extensively.

Gregor F. Heimermann, 37, Kewaskum, was cut on his ear and shaken at about 2:45 p. m. Sunday when his southbound milk transport truck left Hwy. 45 in the town of Auburn, several miles north of Kewaskum, and rolled one and one-half times in a field at the Emil Dickman farm.

Autos driven by Helen J. Haupt, 40, of Arlington, Wis. and Arnold W. Shaske, 31, Kewaskum, collided at the intersection of River View drive and Main st. at 10:30 p. m. Friday, Dec. 26. The Haupt vehicle was southbound on River View drive when the driver failed to stop for the arterial at Main st. and struck the right center of the Shaske car, which was westbound on Main. Mrs. Ruth Shaske, 30, a passenger in her husband's car, suffered an injury to her right hip and was treated at a local physician's office. Both autos were damaged.

Adam Wiesner, 33, R. 1, Allenton, sustained a bump on his head and Mrs. Lorraine Dornacker, 45, R. 2, Kewaskum, incurred a cut lip and bruised face last Wednesday evening when a car driven by Mrs. Dornacker went off the road and hit an electric pole when she lost control of the vehicle. The mishap occurred two miles east of Wayne and a half mile north of H.

Earl Herriges, 25, R. 1, Kewaskum, lost control of his car while traveling south on Hwy. HH Sunday afternoon. The vehicle traveled along the right hand ditch approxi-

John Firks, 82, Others Pass On

John Firks, 82, retired town of Auburn farmer, and former resident of Kewaskum, died early Christmas Day, Dec. 25, at West Bend.

Born Dec. 15, 1876, at Theresa, he farmed in the town of Auburn for many years before retiring and later moving to this village. His marriage to Apollonia Doms took place on Dec. 3, 1902 and she preceded him in death on Apr. 7, 1945.

Surviving are a sister-in-law, Mrs. Louis Doms, numerous nieces and nephews and other relatives. Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Saturday, Dec. 27, at St. John's Lutheran church, New Fane, the Rev. Arthur Haupt officiating. Burial took place in the parish cemetery. Prior to the services the body was in state at Miller's Funeral home.

Regina Matenaer, 77, who made her home with the family of the late William Koenen just east of the village for about 30 years, died at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, on Sunday, Dec. 28. Ailing for the past year and a half, she had been making her home at present with Mr. and Mrs. Mark Vogelsang in the town of Barton.

Miss Matenaer was born in the town of Barton on Aug. 25, 1881 and lived in that township until 1927. At that time she came to Kewaskum and resided with the Koenen family until about a year ago when she returned to the town of Barton to live with the Vogelsangs.

Surviving are a brother, Steven Matenaer of Barton, nieces and nephews. Her parents, two sisters and three brothers preceded her in death.

Funeral services were conducted from the Schmidt Funeral home, West Bend, at 9 a. m. Wednesday and at St. Mary's church, Barton, at 9:30 a. m. The Rev. O. Ullrich officiated and burial took place in the church cemetery. The body was in state after 3 p. m. Tuesday.

Funeral services for Everett Kurth, 43, of 424 W. Loos st., Hartford, a former resident of the town of Kewaskum, who was killed at 11:18 a. m. Saturday, Dec. 27, when an oil truck he was driving left the highway and struck a tree southeast of Hartford, were held at the First Methodist church, Hartford, at 2 p. m. Tuesday. The Rev. Henry Spear officiated and burial was in Washington County Memorial Park.

Kurth, who was employed by his brother, Earl Kurth, who operates a bulk oil plant at Hartford, was born at Cascade on July 5, 1915. He came to a farm near Kewaskum, southwest of the village, with his parents at an early age. He lived here until his marriage to Bernice Schorg at Guttenberg, Ia. on Aug. 21, 1940. At that time they made

Village Board

Regular Meeting
December 1, 1958

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present.

Immediately before the regular board meeting, the public hearing on the proposed budget for 1959 was held. There were no objections to the budget as presented. However, the Village Board indicated that the budget would be adjusted so as to hold the tax rate the same as the previous year which was \$22.50 per thousand dollars of valuation. This ended the hearing on the proposed budget.

The minutes of the previous meetings were accepted as presented upon motion by J. Eberle, seconded by J. Schwind and duly carried.

Mr. Clarence Bath met with the Village Board to discuss the possible leasing of his refuse dumping site to the Village of Kewaskum.

The following resolution was introduced by Trustee Merwin:

RESOLUTION NO. 58-9

RESOLVED, that the commissioner be and hereby is authorized to transfer the Municipal Building Outlay Fund, account No. 312, to Surplus, account No. 3.

Motion was made by Trustee Stellpflug and seconded by Trustee Tessar that said resolution shall be adopted. Upon roll call vote, all members present voting "aye", said resolution was so adopted.

The following resolution was introduced by Trustee Merwin:

RESOLUTION NO. 58-10

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, that there be and hereby are levied the following taxes for the

year ending December 31, 1958, upon all real and personal property according to the assessment roll of the current year:

STATE TAXES—\$1,612.13 at the rate of \$0.22288 per thousand.

COUNTY TAXES—\$32,527.01 at the rate of \$4.49675 per thousand.
