## County Medical Group Offers Cash Awards of \$200 in Essay Contest

**MRS. RICHARD G. EDWARDS NAMED CO-CHAIRMAN FOR KEWASKUM COMMUNITY**

Members of the Washington-Ozaukee County Medical society are again offering a total of \$200 in cash awards for the winning essays in conjunction with the 13th annual 1959 AAPS Essay contest for high school students sponsored by the Association of American Physicians and Surgeons' Freedom Programs, Inc.

On the national level, prizes totaling \$2,675 are being offered for the best essay on either of two topics, "The Advantages of Private Medical Care" or "The Advantages of the American Free Enterprise System."

Students in the 10th, 11th or 12th grades in parochial or public schools are eligible to enter the contest. The local winner (in Washington or Ozaukee county) will automatically be entered in the national contest and become eligible for the major awards available on that level.

Locally the contest is being conducted with the assistance of the auxiliary of the Washington-Ozaukee Medical society. Chairman is Mrs. A. H. Barr of Port Washington. Co-chairmen from the various communities include:

Six prizes will be offered on the local level as follows: 1—\$75; 2—\$50; 3—\$30; 4—\$20; 5—\$15 and 6—\$10.

The contest began on Jan. 1, 1959 and ends on March 1, 1959 so that local judging can be accomplished in time for the national judging by April 1.

On the national level the first prize is \$1,000; 2—\$500; 3—\$250. In addition there will be four prizes of \$100 and seven of \$75 each.

The national contest is the 13th annual such program sponsored by the Association of American Physicians and Surgeons' Freedom Programs, Inc., 185 N. Wabash Ave., Chicago 1, Ill.

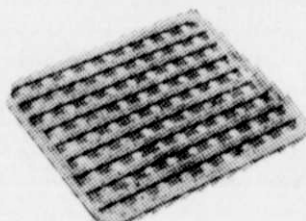

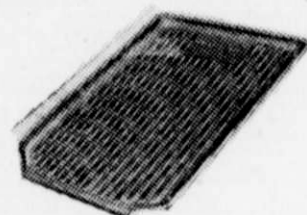

## Plan Observance of Brotherhood Week In County Feb. 15-22

Brotherhood Week will be observed nationally and in Washington county from Feb. 15-22, it was announced by George Stube, West Bend, county Brotherhood Week chairman.

Donald Ripple, West Bend has agreed to serve as co-chairman with Stube.

The appointment of Stube was announced by R. S. Barber, Brotherhood Week chairman for District 1, state of Wisconsin, which includes Washington county. State chairman for the week this year is Supreme Court Justice Thomas E. Fairchild of Madison. Serving with him as co-chairmen are the Hon. Byron B. Conway, Wisconsin Rapids; Maurice B. Paser, Madison, and Dr. J. Martin Klotsche, Milwaukee.

The Brotherhood Week observance has been sponsored annually since 1934 by the National Conference of Christians and Jews. The purposes of the week are: To give people an opportunity to rededicate themselves as individuals to the basic ideals of respect for people and human rights which are essential to our way of life; to dramatize the practical things which people can do to promote an understanding and realizing of these ideals; and to enlist the support of a large number of people in year-round activities to build brotherhood.

Commenting on his appointment, Stube said: "All weeks are equally in need of the practice of brotherhood. However, the week of Washington's Birthday has been set aside as a time of resolution to sustain brotherhood throughout the year. This can and should be done without seeking a union of religious bodies, without modifying the distinctive beliefs of Protestants, Catholics and Jews, and without weakening the loyalties of those of any faith. It is our hope that the people of Washington county will make every effort to participate in this observance."

The following committee chairmen have been appointed to assist in organizing the Brotherhood Week observance:

James R. Brown, West Bend, com-

munity organization; Rev. Harry W. Baumer, West Bend, religious organization; Fred Holt, West Bend, educational organization; Jos. F. Huber, West Bend, publicity; Howard Schacht, West Bend, finance organization.

Schools, churches, civic, fraternal, veterans' and other organizations will participate in the observance.

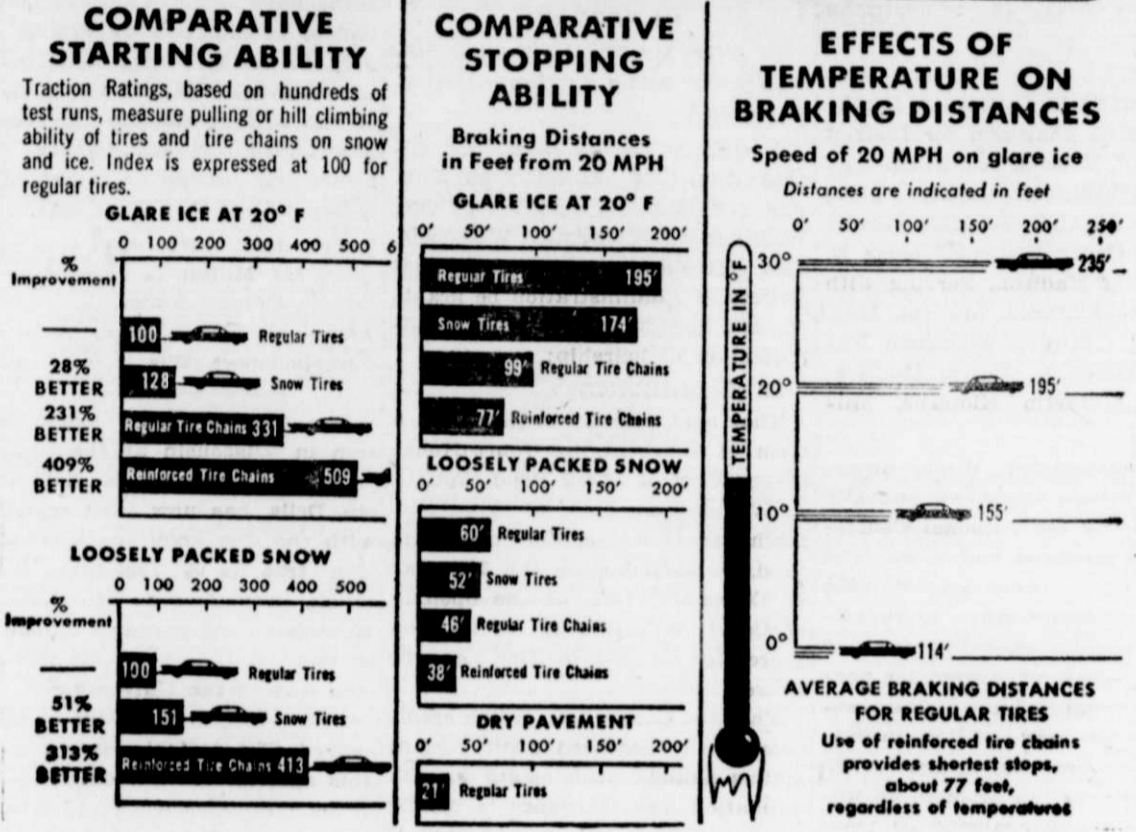

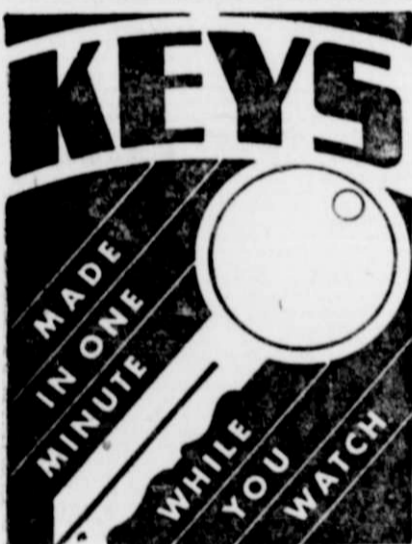

The marmalade calls for fresh cranberries, so put up plenty while the berries are in season. The clear, sparkling jelly is made from bottled cranberry juice available the year around.

### CRANBERRY JELLY

2 cups bottled cranberry juice cocktail  
3 1/2 cups beet sugar  
1/2 bottle liquid fruit pectin

● Measure juice into large saucepan. Add beet sugar and mix well. Place over high heat and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Stir in liquid fruit pectin; bring to a full rolling

boil. Boil hard one minute, timing carefully.

● Remove from heat; skim off foam and pour quickly into sterilized glasses or jars. Seal. Yields 5 to 6 glasses.

### CRANBERRY MARMALADE

1 lemon  
2 oranges  
1 1/2 cups water  
1/4 teaspoon soda  
4 cups (1 lb.) cranberries, washed and sorted  
6 1/2 cups beet sugar  
1/2 bottle liquid fruit pectin  
1/2 cup sliced blanched almonds (optional)

● Quarter the lemon and oranges; discard seeds. Slice thinly crosswise. Combine with water and soda; cover; simmer 20 minutes. Add cranberries; simmer, covered, 10 minutes more.

● Measure 5 cups of the fruit mixture into a large pan. Stir in the beet sugar. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil; boil hard one minute, stirring constantly.

● Remove from heat and at once stir in liquid fruit pectin and warmed almonds. Skim and ladle into sterilized glasses or jars. Seal at once. Yields 4 pints.

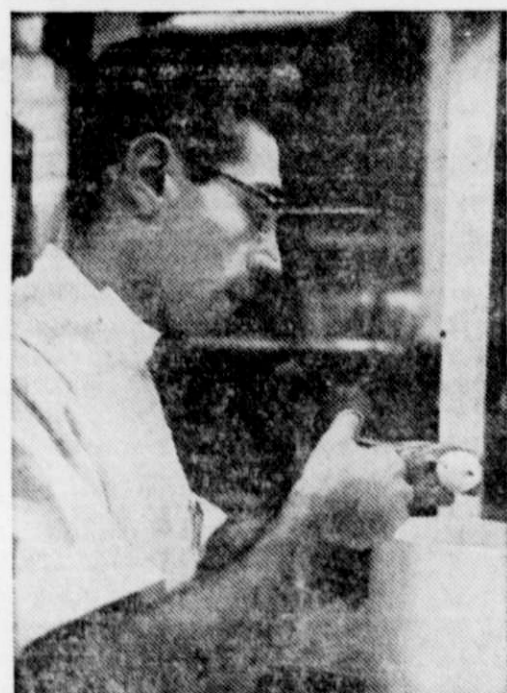

## 'Dimes' Research Seeks Drugs Against Viruses

Three research projects supported by the March of Dimes are spearheads of efforts to find drugs that will be effective against many virus diseases other than polio. Antibiotics are potent weapons against bacteria, but up to now no such wonder drugs have been found for viruses.

In New York, at the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research, Dr. Igor Tamm is director of a project which is studying the action of drugs against polio, influenza and other viruses. Scientists are investigating how slight changes in the chemical structure of compounds have a tremendous influence on their ability to restrain virus multiplication in living cells.

At the University of Utah in Salt Lake City, a team under the leadership of Dr. William J. Burke is searching for a substance in crude gallic acid which appears to give monkeys some protection against paralytic polio. The substance, still

unidentified, does not occur in pure gallic acid, but in the raw form of the chemical, made from a growth which appears on a species of oak tree grown in China.

At the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, drugs which in preliminary experiments have proved hopeful are tested further in mice and monkeys. The project is headed by Dr. Thomas Francis Jr., who made the official evaluation report on the Salk Vaccine.

Hundreds of drugs have been studied over the years in man's search for compounds effective against polio and other viruses.

Although polio virus is used more than any other in the projects supported by the March of Dimes, scientists hope that if they find a drug effective against this disease they will have made a break-through toward finding drugs that can be used against the other virus diseases that plague mankind.

CISCO BACKHAUS TO MANAGE TEAM IN TILT AT HORICON; HIGH SCORERS LISTED

The stars selected from the other seven teams in the Land o' Lakes league will take on first half champion Thiensville in the annual all-star game at Horicon this Saturday night at 8:30 o'clock. The 7 p. m. preliminary will pit host Horicon, tied for first place, against a selected Land o' Rivers star team. Some of the best amateur basketball players in this area will display their talents in the games.

## PANCAKES KNOW NO LIMITS

Pancakes of today are so dressed up that they properly go to lunch, supper and snacktime, as well as breakfast.

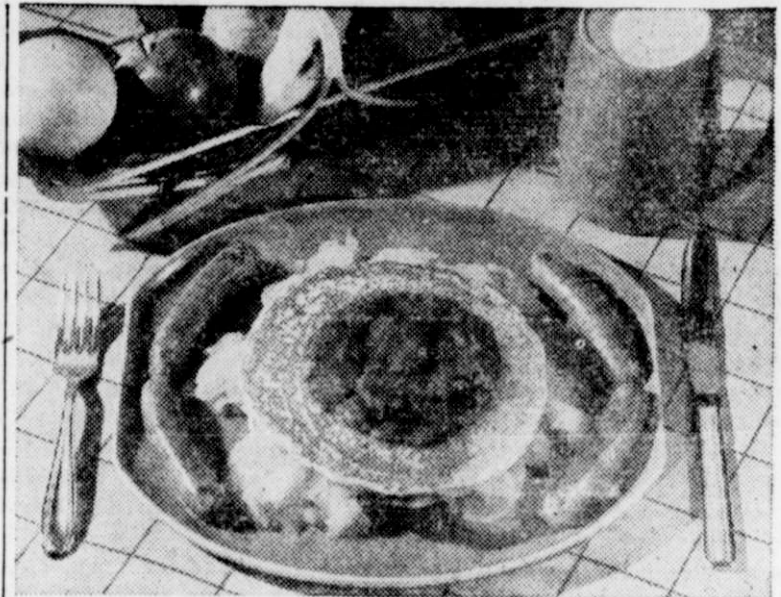

- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 2 1/2 cups buttermilk
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons melted butter
- 2 cups pancake mix

Dissolve soda in buttermilk; add with unbeaten egg and butter to pancake mix, stirring lightly. Bake on hot, lightly greased griddle, turning only once. If you're preparing a large batch and the batter tends to become thick on standing, add more buttermilk to thin it a little. While buttermilk pancakes are light and tender, the addition of cottage cheese to the batter will make them even more so. Use one-half cup of the



cream style cottage cheese. You'll be surprised with the results.

An interesting and easy way to dress up buttermilk pancakes is with cinnamon butter and applesauce. Serve them as "cinnamon apple pancakes." These are especially good for lunch or supper, although your family also would appreciate them to give variety to the first meal of the day.

Cinnamon apple pancakes are made by putting a generous portion of cooked or canned applesauce between two pancakes and topping with cinnamon butter. Those who delight in the taste

of a dash of cinnamon on apple sauce, will fall these pancakes as a clever flavor combination. Butter, with its unmatched natural flavor, is alone a wonderful topping for pancakes. The addition of cinnamon provides a temptingly spicy touch.

### CINNAMON BUTTER (1 cup)

- 1/2 cup butter
  - 1 cup confectioner's sugar
  - 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon
  - 2 teaspoons milk
- Cream butter and sugar. Add cinnamon and milk and mix well.
