## Heart Fund Appeal Underway in County

R. EDWARDS CHAIRMAN FOR VILLAGE AND TOWNSHIP; OTHERS ANNOUNCED

Supplies for the 1959 Heart Fund Appeal have been sent to all local Heart Appeal chairmen throughout Washington county. This announcement was made by Attorney Deane R. Bascom, Washington county representative of the Wisconsin Heart association. The drive was scheduled to begin Feb. 1, and will culminate on Feb. 22, which has been designated as Heart Sunday throughout the entire state.

Local chairmen and the areas in which they will conduct the campaign for Heart funds are as follows:

Funds raised by this drive are used by the Wisconsin Heart association in research on the causes and cures of heart disease which has been labeled the nation's number one killer. Funds raised in the drive are also used to sponsor clinics, educational programs and many other activities related to the fight against heart disease.

## \$217.61 Collected In Mothers' March

## Sub-Zero Cold, Snow As Usual This Week

The groundhog saw its shadow on Monday (the sun couldn't have been any brighter) and you know what that means, six more weeks of winter (and probably more).

Weather this week was the same as it has been most of the time since the new year started—very cold and much snow. The temperature dropped to about 17 degrees below zero Sunday morning and another 10 below Monday. Tuesday it warmed up and about two inches of snow fell. Wednesday about three inches more fell. Thursday it turned much colder and the thermometer dropped to the zero mark again as a high wind swirled the snow into even deeper drifts. Friday morning from 5 to 10 degrees below zero is predicted again. We have now had 27 days of sub zero weather this winter—almost a full month.

The high school dismissed classes at 2 p. m. Tuesday because of the snow and drifted roads to allow the buses to transport pupils before the roads became completely blocked.

We must have about 20 inches of snow on the level by now to say nothing of the mountainous drifts. You folks in Florida, California, Arizona, and other warm places—stay there!

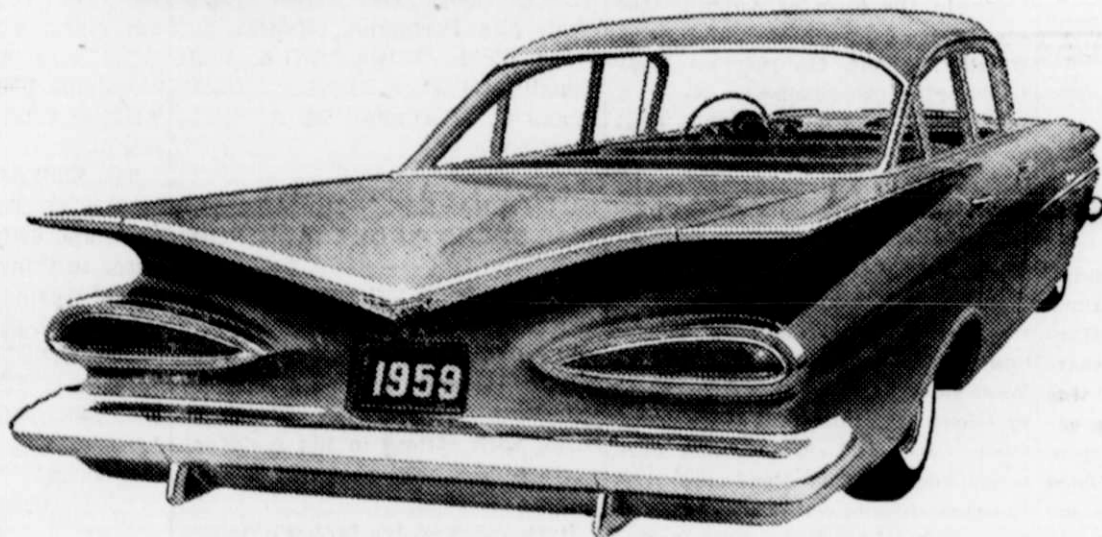

### Chevs in Easy 76-62 Win Over Thiensville

The Kewaskum Chevs gained sweet revenge for a first half loss at Thiensville that cost them the title by downing that team in a return game here Saturday night, 76-62. The loss at Thiensville early in the season was the Chevs' only one in the first half.

Playing without their high scorer, Witte, the league leader who is out with an injured hand, Thiensville has lost three in a row in the second half. Without him the team was no match for Kewaskum. The Chev regulars ran up an 18-9 lead in the first quarter and then Manager "Cisco" Backhaus inserted the second platoon for the entire second period. Thiensville outscored them 19-11 and closed the gap to 29-28 at halftime. With the first team back in the third stanza they ran rough shod over the visitors, scoring 32 points to Thiensville's 14, and again building up a big 61-42 lead. Substitutes played most of the final quarter again and scored 15 points to the losers' 20, cutting the margin of victory to 14 points.

Don Meisenheimer had another one of his good nights and paced all scorers with 25 points. He and George Hanrahan and Frankie Krueger were hot under the basket. The latter two each scored 18 points. Veteran J. O'Connell, Thiensville's aggressive forward, was high for his team with 23 points, followed by D. Lucht with 14 and R. O'Berheu with 12.

This Saturday night Kewaskum faces another tough hurdle when they play at Mayville. The Chevs nosed out Mayville in their first meeting here 67-65. These two teams always play close games and Mayville will have the home floor advantage.

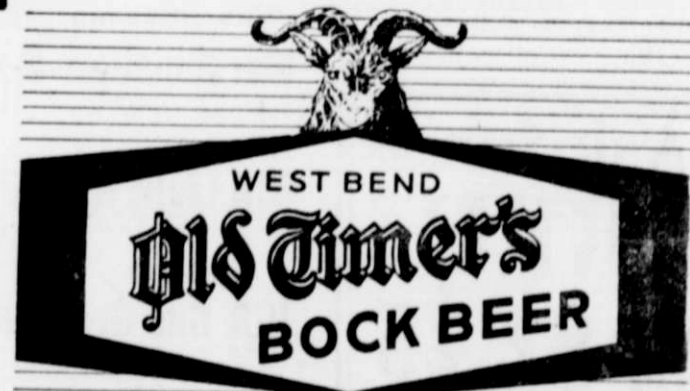

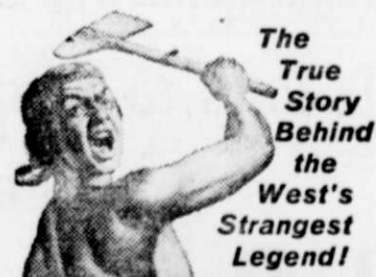

## 25 Years Ago

The Kewaskum Statesman  
Feb. 2, 1934

The village board closed negotiations whereby they have acquired the former South Side park property together with some additional land abutting the Milwaukee river to be used for a city park. The work of beautifying the park will be done and paid for by men employed under the CWA. The land acquired is about two acres from Louis Bunkelman and approximately three acres adjoining the Killian Honeck farm. The village will pay for the first parcel of land \$500 and for the second one \$200.

The Kewaskum high school is also being painted under the CWA. A force of men began work Tuesday and are working in three shifts. The high school project is the largest awarded to this village so far. It will require 2,200 hours of unskilled labor and 1,600 hours of skilled labor. An allowance has been awarded for materials totaling \$1,000. The work also calls for the revarnishing of 150 school seats.

The pickets refused to let McLaughlin take the empty cans with him.

At the January meeting of the fire department the following officers were elected: Assistant chief, A. P. Schaefer; secretary, John H. Martin; treasurer, Val. Peters; foreman, Arnold Martin; assistant foreman, Bernard Seil. Chief Harry Schaefer holds over, having been elected for a five-year term. There are now 31 mem-

bers in good standing. Three new members were added, namely Helmut Lubitz, Ralph Heisler and Jos. Uelmen, Jr.

An inspired way to serve salmon, an old Lenten standby, is borrowed from Italy and adapted to combine the pink-meated king of fish with spaghetti. A rich cream sauce is used to incorporate fish and mushrooms. Serve with crusty bread sticks and a tossed green salad.

Stir in liquid from the can of salmon and cook for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Stir in the cream.

Cook spaghetti in rapidly boiling salted water until tender and drain. Saute mushrooms in the 2 tablespoons butter for 5 minutes, until lightly browned. Mix half the sauce with the spaghetti and mushrooms and pour into a baking dish or deep platter. Make a hole in the center of the spaghetti. Mix remaining sauce with the salmon, flaked, and pour into the hole in the center of the spaghetti. Sprinkle with cheese mixed with bread crumbs and brown lightly in a 350° F. oven for 15 to 20 minutes. Serves 4.
