Plan Immunization Program in County

BOOSTER SHOTS SHOULD BE GIVEN CHILDREN DURING MARCH, APRIL AND MAY

Many thousands of babies and children are safe from certain serious diseases—diphtheria, smallpox, lockjaw and whooping cough—because parents have them immunized. Children should receive this protection as soon after birth as the family doctor recommends. If you have a preschool child who has not been immunized, make plans with your doctor right away.

Children also need to have additional or booster shots at regular intervals to keep up their defenses against these diseases.

Washington county grade school children will have a chance to "boost" their protection during the immunization program throughout the county during March, April and May.

The local Medical society recommended booster shots for diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus at 3 to 4 year intervals after the child has entered school. Also, children should be re-vaccinated against smallpox at about 5 to 7 year intervals. Check your records to see what protection your children may need. If you are not sure, your doctor is the best person to guide you.

Pewaukee and Random Lake Join New Scenic Moraine Conference

ADDITION OF TWO SCHOOLS INCREASES NUMBER OF TEAMS TO EIGHT

Official announcement has been made that Random Lake and Pewaukee high schools have joined the Scenic Moraine conference, increasing the number of schools in the loop to eight. Other schools already in the conference are Kewaskum, Campbellsport, North Fond du Lac, Slinger, Germantown and Grafton.

Most schools in the conference range in enrollment between 225 and 300, although Kewaskum, with a present enrollment of about 335, should reach an expected enrollment of around 400 next year. Besides all athletics, including baseball, football, basketball and track, the Scenic Moraine offers competition for the band, chorus, forensics and dramatics.

The new schools will change over to the conference in the 1959-60 terms when they will compete in dramatics, music and track. The two schools will participate in their present conferences in basketball at this time. Football is now planned under the continued participation for another year. During the 1960-61 term Random Lake will terminate all connections with the Kettle Moraine conference and participate in the new loop. That school will be host for the conference forensics next year.

Principal R. P. Diehl of Random Lake announced that the school will drop out of the Kettle Moraine circuit as soon as all commitments have been honored.

10-Inch Snow Buries Area, Sets Record

SEVERE STORM BRINGS SEASON'S TOTAL TO 37 INCHES; SCHOOLS CLOSE, BUSINESS AT STANDSTILL, ROADS BLOCKED, CREWS DIGGING OUT

Another very heavy snowfall of about 10 inches, which was the worst in many years and set a record for the season, buried this area on Monday night and Tuesday. The storm, which brought the total snowfall for the season so far to nearly 27 inches, closed schools, put business at a standstill, blocked roads and isolated rural residents, crippled transportation, closed industries and cancelled almost all activities. Residents and snow removal crews have been digging out ever since the storm ended Tuesday night.

No longer is the snow on the ground being measured by inches but by feet and there are still 36 days left until spring. There are mountains of snow wherever one looks. Snow removal crews are running out of places to stockpile the stuff and shovellers are searching for places to throw it. The more than 30 sub-zero days so far this season have added to the miseries of this winter which is even worse than those the old timers talk about.

The snowfall began Monday evening, continued all night Monday and all day Tuesday until a late hour at night. Estimates of the fall ranged from 3 to 12 inches. Because of the high wind, it was almost impossible to accurately estimate the total fall.

Streets and highways were opened up as fast as possible during the height of the storm by busy crews who had to go over and over the main roads to keep them passable. The highways blew shut almost as fast as they were opened by the plows. Main roads were open Wednesday morning after the storm subsided but side roads were still closed and most rural residents were snowbound. Traffic was back to near normal by Thursday.

Nearly every form of transportation was held up or crippled Tuesday. Trains were hours late and trucks and other vehicles were unable to make deliveries. Workers were unable to get to plants and other places of employment and most of them "enjoyed" a day or two vacation. Locally at Regal Ware, Inc. and other plants, very few outside workers were able to come to work.

The public schools and high school were closed Tuesday and Wednesday and Holy Trinity school on Tuesday. Some local stores and other business places were closed Tuesday because the owners and clerks were unable to get to town. Others closed early. The snow was preceded by freezing rain and sleet Sunday night and Monday.

Drifted sidewalks caused most persons to walk in the streets. Although village crews already had cleaned the streets and hauled the snow away a couple of times this season, this week's storm piled up

Judy Rahn Wins Homemaker Award

Judy Ann Rahn has been named 1959 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow at Kewaskum Community high school.

She received the highest score in a 50-minute written examination on homemaking knowledge and attitudes taken by graduating senior girls in her school. She will receive a homemaking pin, manufactured by Josten's, which represents the slogan "Home is Where the Heart Is." Her examination paper will be entered in competition with those of other school winners in the state to name the state Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow.

Every girl who takes the test receives a copy of Betty Crocker's Homemaker Profiler and Guide to Homemaking. About 16 Kewaskum senior girls took the test.

Each state Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a \$1,500 scholarship, an educational trip April 4-10 with her school advisor to Washington, D. C., colonial Williamsburg, Va., New York City and Minneapolis, and she will be a candidate for the title of All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. The school of each state winner will receive a set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica. General Mills will award a \$500 scholarship to each state runner-up. There are 12,260 participating schools throughout the nation.

The 1959 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be announced in Minneapolis April 10 at the American Table Dinner in the Leamington Hotel's "Hall of States."

The scholarship of the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be increased to \$5,000. The national runner-up will receive a \$4,000 grant, third place winner a \$3,000 award and fourth place winner a \$2,000 scholarship.

Board Accepts Petition For Annexation of Town Of Kewaskum Territory

Adjourned Meeting
January 20, 1959

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in adjourned session with President Reigle presiding and all Board members present.

Mr. Edwin Groszklaus appeared before the Board to question the billing made for water and sewer connections on his property fronting on Kewaskum Street.

The Village Board discussed the problem of providing a refuse dumping site.

The Board discussed the advisability of taking collision insurance on its Village Equipment.

The following resolution was introduced by Trustee Merwin.

Resolution No. 59-1

RESOLUTION OF VILLAGE BOARD ACCEPTING PETITION FOR ANNEXATION

WHEREAS, A petition for direct annexation of the following territory of the town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, to the Village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, was filed with the village clerk on November 8, 1958.

That part of the South Half of the South East Quarter (S½ SE¼) of Section 9, Township 12 North, Range 19 East, described as follows, viz:

Commencing at the point of intersection of the Westerly line of the Fond du Lac Road (now known as U. S. Highway No. 45) with the North line of the South Half of the South East Quarter of Section 9, Township 12 North, Range 19 East, thence West 120 feet, thence Southeasterly parallel with said Road 75 feet,

thence East 120 feet to a point in the Westerly line of said Road, thence Northwesterly along the Westerly line of said Road 75 feet to the place of beginning.

Excepting so much as has been taken for highway purposes.

And more particularly described as follows:

That part of the South Half of the Southeast Quarter (S½ SE¼) of Section 9, Township 12 North, Range 19 East, Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, which is bounded and described as follows: Commencing at the point of intersection of the north line of said 80 acre tract with the westerly line of the Fond du Lac Road, said point being marked by an iron pipe and also being identified as being the most easterly corner of Lot 8, Block 15 of the proposed assessor's plat for the village of Kewaskum; said point being South 88 degrees 54' East, 1249.4 feet from the Northwest corner of said 80 acre tract; thence South 28 degrees 52' East along the westerly line of the Fond du Lac Road 75.00 feet; thence North 89 degrees 43' West, 111.33 feet; thence North 28 degrees 52' West, 75.00 feet; thence South 89 de-

grees 43' East, 111.33 feet to the Place of beginning.

WHEREAS, the Village Clerk has investigated said petition and certified to the village board that it was signed by all of the owners of land in the territory proposed for annexation as of the date of filing of the petition and that the territory to be annexed is properly described in the petition and shown on the scale map attached thereto, is contiguous to the village of Kewaskum, and in unincorporated:

NOW, THEREFORE, the village board of the village of Kewaskum, Wisconsin, determines that the petition for annexation of the above described territory is a sufficient and legal petition conforming with the requirements of s. 66.021 of the Wisconsin Statutes; and

RESOLVES, that the petition be and is hereby accepted; and

That the village clerk is hereby directed to notify the clerk of the

town of Kewaskum, of this resolution of acceptance in accordance with s. 66.021 (5) (a), Wisconsin statutes.

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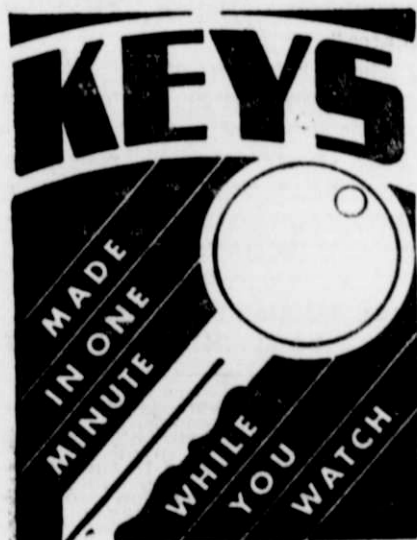

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Mayville Noses Out Chevs By Point, 78-77

FACE CLASSY HORICON FIVE HERE SATURDAY NIGHT

The Kewaskum Chevs lost another heartbreaker at Mayville Saturday night when they were nosed out by one point, 78-77, in a very close game. The setback, the team's second in four starts in the second half, just about eliminated the Chevs from contention for the title as the league leaders, Horicon and Slinger, both won over the week end and now have 4-0 records.

The defeat was only Kewaskum's third of the entire season and none of them were by more than 2 points. The Chevs lost to Thiensville in the first half by 2 points, to Slinger by 2 points and now to Mayville by 1 point, or a total of only 5 points in all 3 losses.

Kewaskum and Mayville have always tangled in very close, hard fought games and Saturday's tilt was a typical example. Led by Augie Bilgo with 11 points in the first quarter, the Chevs appeared to be hot and raced off to a big 10-point, 24-14 advantage. Mayville cut the margin down by netting 21 points to Kewaskum's 18 in the second stanza and closing the gap to 42-35 at the intermission.

The Chevs slipped badly in the third period and relinquished the lead. They made only 11 points while their opponents poured in 22. This gave Mayville a 57-53 advantage. Kewaskum fought back in the final quarter and got back 3 of the points, scoring 24 to Mayville's 21, but it wasn't quite enough as the Chevs still trailed by a lone point at the final horn.

Bilgo and George Hanrahan were standouts for the losers, each scoring 25 points for top honors. Don Meisenheimer added 11 more. Genzmer with 23 points and T. Bartelt with 19 paced the winners. Kewaskum lost three of their starters, Meisenheimer, Bilgo and Frank Krueger, on personals and this really hurt. Another factor that lost the game for them was their poor shooting from the free throw line. The Chevs made only 17 in 34 tries while Mayville sank 28 out of 27 for a very high average.

This Saturday night, undefeated, league leading Horicon brings their accurate shooting quint here to do

battle. The Chevs won at Horicon in the first half, 84-76, but will have to be at their best to do it again this half. Kewaskum was hot in their first meeting at Horicon.

The Kewaskum Indians, who lost their first four conference games, won three of the last four to jump from the cellar into a tie for fourth place. Latest victim was Grafton, which team the Indians defeated here Friday night, 50-40, to gain a tie in the standings with that team. League leading Campbellsport had a narrow squeak past Slinger to make their record 7-1 and second place North Fondy (6-2) downed Germantown to stay in the running.

Kewaskum, now possessing a 3-5 record, trailed Grafton at the end of the defensive first quarter, 7-5. But the Indians outscored the Blackhawks in every period thereafter to increase their advantage as the game went on. Kewaskum scored 17 to Grafton's 13 in the second stanza to take a 22-20 half-time lead. This advantage was increased to 32-28 in the third quarter. The Indians poured in 18 points in the final period to Grafton's 12 to win handily.

Norm Rodenkirch had one of his best nights of the season and dumped in 29 points to take high honors. He scored over half of his team's total. Norman and Kehoe, each with 13 points, paced the Blackhawks.

Kewaskum won the contest on free throws, sinking 22 while Grafton made good on only 10. The Blackhawks were guilty of 27 personals and the Indians only 19. The losers lost two players on fouls.

The Indians will play their second last conference game of the season tonight, Friday, and it will be a tough one at Slinger. The Owls, with a 4-4 record, hold third place.

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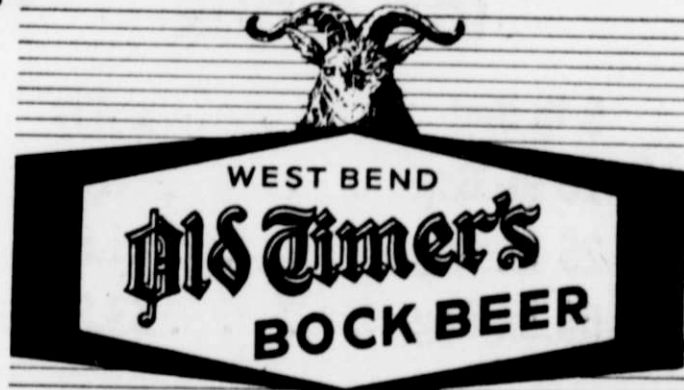

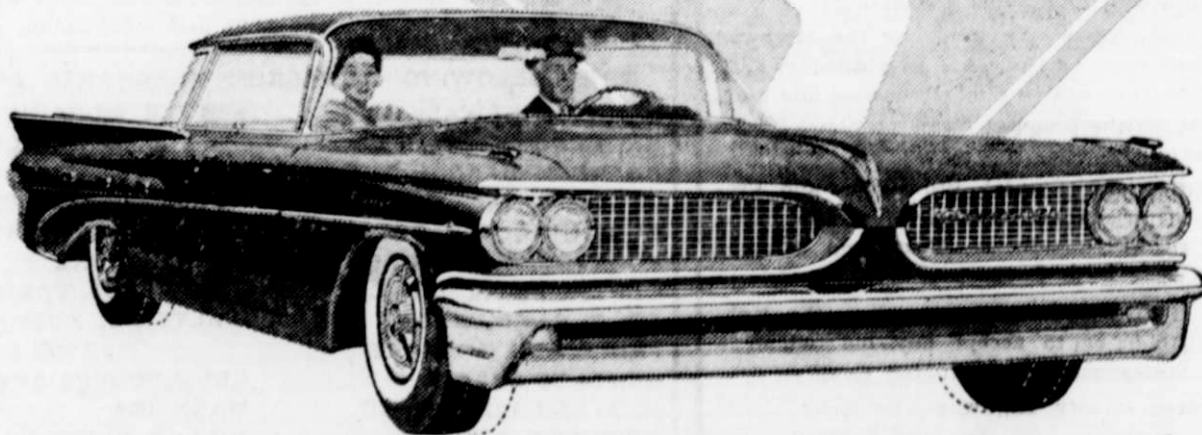
