Hundreds Snowbound, Trains, Cars Stranded, Traffic at Standstill

STORM LEAVES 11 DEAD IN
STATE; ENTIRE TOWNS
ARE ISOLATED

This area and the entire southern and central portion of Wisconsin were virtually paralyzed by the severe blizzard which battered the state over the week end. The heavy new fall of drifting snow, swept by 35 to 45 mile an hour winds, stranded four passenger trains, blocked highways, tied up traffic to an almost complete standstill, marooned hundreds of persons, isolated entire cities and reduced visibility to zero.

The snowfall of 6 to 7 inches was not the heaviest of the winter but was the worst in years from the standpoint of snarling transportation and paralyzing this area, especially in Washington and neighboring counties. The effects of the storm were made so much worse by the huge drifts and mountainous embankments of snow already lining highways from previous storms. The new sweeping snow piled the drifts so much higher and the banks so much deeper in the roads. The blizzard began at about 10 p. m. Saturday and continued until early Sunday evening.

Because of the high winds, county plows were recalled from the highways Sunday morning until the storm abated. By the time the wind died down the storm had a stranglehold on the entire county. Crews called off of highways as a safety measure due to the extreme danger of striking stalled or marooned cars because of the poor visibility faced an almost impossible task of clearing roads when the storm let up. Main highways drifted shut faster than the plows could open them.

Traffic was almost completely paralyzed and no cars at all were seen on highways and streets as people spent Sunday indoors. No sidewalks or driveways were shoveled until the storm blew itself out, most of this work waiting until Monday. The few pedestrians out walked in the middle of the street, being unable to see more than a few feet ahead of them as they fought their way against the driving snow.

Bus traffic was halted and rail-

road traffic, which has suffered severely this winter due to the deep snow, took another beating. One of the trains stalled was southbound train No. 206 of the North Western railroad, which hit a tremendous drift about 1½ miles north of Campbellsport and was marooned there with about 100 passengers and crew members for 10 hours, from 9:40 a. m. Sunday until 7:46 p. m. before it could be freed by a plow and section crew.

State and federal highways were opened Monday. Many county trunks and town roads were still snowblocked on Wednesday and farmers and other residents on these roads were marooned since Saturday. Many persons stayed and slept in their cars Saturday night, others walked to nearby farm houses to spend the night, and some walked to villages, abandoning their autos. People were marooned in farm houses, villages and cities, many of them in large numbers. Highway crews were extremely handicapped by the gale winds which prevented plows from staying at their tasks as operators were blinded by the driving snow and could not see stalled cars in the drifts which all but covered the vehicles.

Classes at all local schools were called off Monday. Meetings, card parties, socials and all other affairs were postponed. No services were held at the Peace and St. Lucas churches. Masses were read at Holy Trinity church but the attendance was small. Not a single car was at the 10 a. m. mass. Some parts of the village were without electric power Sunday morning because of wires being down. Many business places closed.

Eleven deaths in the state were attributed to the storm, most of

them from heart attacks suffered while shoveling snow and others overcome by monoxide gas while sleeping in their stalled cars.

A group of Girl Scouts at Mauthe lake for the week end became stranded in the storm, but were reported in good condition with ample food supplies and shelter. Others were not so fortunate. Some marooned farm residents began running out of food when roads were still not opened by Wednesday. One woman running low on food walked about three miles to the village on Wednesday, the trip through the deep snow taking about four hours.

Snowdrifts are so high on many streets of the village that they tower high above cars and drivers have no visibility at intersections or view at the side. A pile of snow in front of the depot almost hides the view of the building. Village crews, having no more room to deposit the snow hauled from the main streets, engaged a bulldozer Tuesday night to push the old snow from the river banks onto the river ice to make room for the new stuff.

The snow also brings with it the usual amount of humor. One thing we got a bang out of is a sign on top of a huge bank in front of the Herbert Ramel home west of the village which reads: "Snow for sale—overstocked."

Cheer up, Saturday is the first day of spring. By the 4th of July all of the snow should be melted but then we'll be under water. Seriously, at this writing the temperature is in the low 50s with strong southerly winds and the snow is thawing fast.

\$440,600 Subscribed to Date in Charities Drive

The total subscribed to date in the Catholic Charities and Seminary appeal is \$440,600.00, it was announced this week by Frank M. Surges, general chairman. Inclement weather over the past two week ends slowed the campaign down considerably. Practically all of the districts outside of Milwaukee county are snowbound and have found it impossible to solicit their parishioners. It will take extraordinary work on the part of all to complete the work in time.

Civil Defense Director, Marvin Martin, was authorized to attend any civil defense meetings he deems necessary to attend.

The following resolution was introduced by Trustee Merwin:

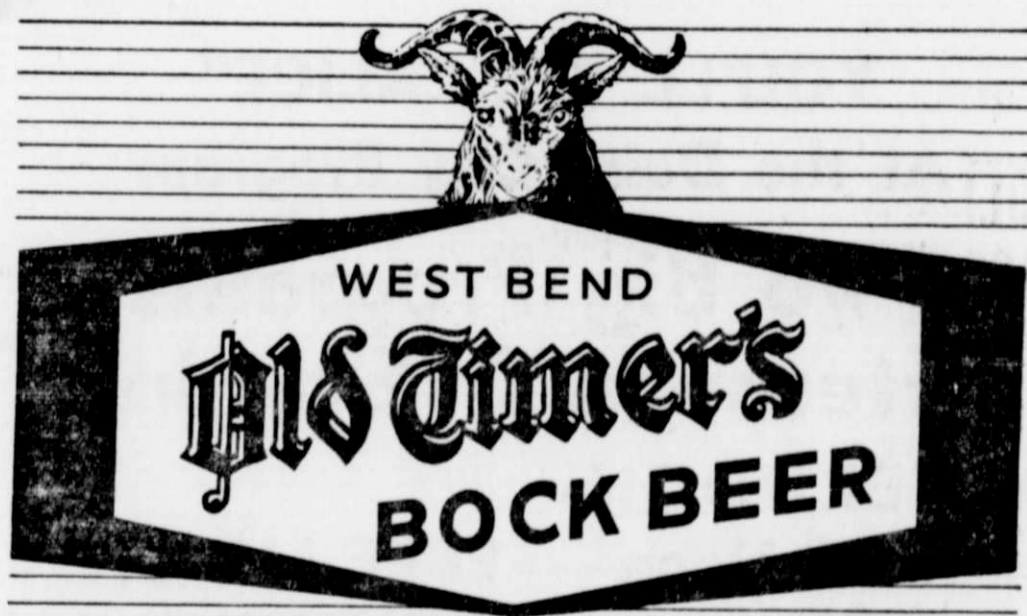
