DRIVER'S LICENSE FEES WOULD BE RAISED TO FINANCE PROGRAM

Driver's license fees would be hiked to finance a stepped-up driver training program under a bill introduced in the assembly last Thursday at Madison by Assembly-(Washington county) and two other co-sponsors of the bill, Assemblymen Hardie (D-Taylor) and Calvert (R-Benton).

> Under terms of the bill, operators' licenses would be raised from \$2 to \$2.50, learner's permits would be increased from \$1 to \$1.50, and all operators' and chauffeurs' renewals would be set at \$2.

> An estimated \$1,962,091 for the year, beginning July 1, would be available for distribution to high schools under the bill. This compares with about \$300,000 a year available for driver training education under present law. The aid would be distributed on the basis of \$25 for each student who completed a driver training course.

kind made especially for broil-ing. Now trim the dough and the foil together into a 12-inch circle, saving the edges of dough for the basket handle.

To make the basket place one hand in the center of the dough hand in the center of the dough to hold it flat, and turn the edges up all around. Accordion pleat the edges in deep, wide flutes all the way down to the base, pinching the foil together the package directions and cool. Fold in the whipped cream and pour into shell, then insert the handle into pudding. Carefully remove the foil pan, in creases to retain the shape garnish with cherries or other fruit, and your dessert is ready while baking.

To make the handle, twist to serve.




