## Dairy Day Is Outstanding Success; Gov. Nelson Tells Farmers Reorganization Need

### Capacity Crowd of 1,000 Jams Gym For Night Program

Kewaskum's first Dairy Day event at the high school on Saturday was a success beyond expectations with huge crowds attending the show both in the afternoon and evening.

A crowd estimated at 700 persons attended the afternoon program while over 1,000 people jammed the gymnasium to capacity for the night show. All of the available seats were filled, about 100 additional chairs were brought in and the rear of the gym was filled to the doors with a standing room only crowd. Others stood in the halls. Exhibitors put much effort in their booths, which surrounded the gym floor. Additional displays of farm machinery, automobiles and others were in the agricultural room and shop.

A surprisingly large number of persons came early and over 400 were fed a free noon dairy lunch to open the affair. The lunch was served from 11:30 a. m. to 1:00 p. m. and the spacious cafeteria was filled continuously during this time. Many comments were received on the excellent lunch served, topped off with ice cream for dessert and milk or chocolate milk for the beverage.

A half hour concert by the high school band at 1 p. m. opened the afternoon program and this was followed by the appearance of outstanding speakers. Easily the highlight of the afternoon was the appearance and talk by Democratic Gov. Gaylord Nelson, chief executive of the state, who arrived right on schedule.

Gov. Nelson was expected to speak on his ideas on an agricultural program for Wisconsin, but hardly mentioned agriculture. Three weeks of screaming over the proposed re-organization of the state government and then calm appraisal by the legislature was forecast by the governor. He told the crowd that he was going to do some budget trimming but that there were certain expenditures which could not be avoided.

"I have received letters urging that I cut all of the budget increases," he said as his audience (from a strong Republican area) gave him a rising greeting. "But if I did, I could not go to church and hold my head up. There's 18 million dollars for school aids. There will be millions more needed for schools."

The governor stressed that he was not backing up an inch on his proposal to try to get more efficiency in government through re-organization, even if he felt a bit stifled.

"There are 79 departments in state government over which the governor has no authority," he said. "As a state senator, I could do more about needed reform than as governor. At least a senator can talk about it, demanding a check on expenditures. As it is now, often the governor does not know whether a request for more state employees is justified or not."

"Taxpayers get mad at their tax bills, but not mad enough to insist on efficient re-organization. I believe we can re-examine government at all levels, local, county and state."

Lewis C. French of The Milwaukee Journal staff was here to cover Gov. Nelson's talk and ask him questions on other subjects. A lengthy item on the executive's talk, those of other speakers and the Dairy Day event was published in Sunday's Journal.

Other Democrats here to greet Gov. Nelson included Jim Megellas, candidate for Congress in last fall's election, and Miss Carole Laehn of Fond du Lac; Chairman Alvin Roell, Vice-Chairman Dr. Robert Roberts and Treasurer John Flitter of the Washington County Democratic committee. Following his talk the governor stayed on for some time meeting friends before leaving for Fond du Lac to attend a Democratic dinner. A number of other men prominent in agriculture and public offices were present.

Other afternoon speakers included Don Peterson, weed control specialist of the University of Wisconsin; Dr. Marvin Beatty, soil specialist of the University of Wisconsin Council of Agriculture, and Linley Jeurs, director of the dairy division of the Wisconsin Council of Agriculture Co-operative.

A special program for ladies in the cafeteria, with Miss Mary Weber, high school home economics teacher, in charge was well attended with the room being filled. Preparation of dairy products and demonstration of their uses on menus for the home was done by home ec students.

Even the free show presented at the Kewaskum theatre for the children proved a popular attraction with more than 400 youngsters attending.

The evening program before a packed house began with a half hour concert by the county 4-H band. Next in line was the home talent contest which was well received. Winners of the cash prizes were Connie Rassew, soloist, first; Nancy Held, pianist, second, and the Maedke sisters, duet, third. The seven little children of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Stoffel, singing the "Children's Marching Song" received honorable mention. It made a big hit and brought many laughs from the audience.

Brief talks were given by Village President James D. Reigle, Kewaskum Business Association President Jack Koehn, Bernard Murray, high school agriculture instructor, and County Agent Maurice Hovland.

## Four Candidates File Papers for Trustee Offices

OTHER VILLAGE OFFICIALS TO BE UNOPPOSED FOR RE-ELECTION APR. 7

Friday, Mar. 20, at 6 p. m. was the deadline for the filing of nomination papers in the village of Kewaskum for the offices of village president, supervisor, assessor and justice of the peace to be elected on April 7 at the spring election.

Four candidates filed papers for the three trustee offices to be elected. Two of the present incumbents, Joe Eberle and Wayland Tessar, will seek re-election, while the third incumbent, John G. Stellpflug, will not be a candidate for re-election. Other candidates are Carl F. Schaeffer, former trustee, who was defeated two years ago, and a newcomer, Cyril N. Wietor.

The rest of the slate of village officials will be unopposed for re-election. They are James D. Reigle, president; Elwyn M. Romaine, supervisor, and Ralph J. Remmel, assessor. There are no candidates for justice of the peace. All of the officials will be elected for two-year terms.

The three remaining trustees, Arvin Merwin, Henry Becker and Joseph Schwind, hold over in office for another year.

## Schowalter Co-Sponsor Of Proposed Stepped Up Driver Training Bill

DRIVER'S LICENSE FEES WOULD BE RAISED TO FINANCE PROGRAM

Driver's license fees would be hiked to finance a stepped-up driver training program under a bill introduced in the assembly last Thursday at Madison by Assemblyman Elmer Schowalter of Jackson (Washington county) and two other co-sponsors of the bill, Assemblymen Hardie (D-Taylor) and Calvert (R-Benton).

Assemblyman Schowalter, while attending the Dairy Day event here Saturday afternoon, in a conference with the editor and Eugene LaMarche, driver training instructor at the high school, stated that, with increased revenues received if the bill is passed, it is hoped to expand the present driver-training program for students in the hope that such a program will help reduce highway accidents in the state by teaching young people to become more responsible, careful drivers.

Under terms of the bill, operators' licenses would be raised from \$2 to \$2.50, learner's permits would be increased from \$1 to \$1.50, and all operators' and chauffeurs' renewals would be set at \$2.

An estimated \$1,962,091 for the year, beginning July 1, would be available for distribution to high schools under the bill. This compares with about \$300,000 a year available for driver training education under present law. The aid would be distributed on the basis of \$25 for each student who completed a driver training course.

Funds for the present program are obtained from chauffeur's license receipts above the cost of administering the licensing program. The bill would add to this \$1 of the \$2 collected for each license renewal and 50 cents from the sale of new licenses.

## 25 Years Ago

Jack Tessar, who served as a member of Co. D. of Fond du Lac of the 32nd Division in the World War, was surprised Saturday to see a picture of himself which appeared in the Wisconsin News. Tessar was shown beside a machine gun with several buddies. The caption read: "Seeking what little shelter the open terrain afforded members of Co. K, 126th Infantry, 32nd Division, waited for resumption of the advance in the Valpries farm, 3 kilometers west of Juvigny on Aug. 29, 1918. The 32nd, composed largely of Wisconsin and Michigan men, formed the spearhead of a key position. On the third day of the battle, a brilliant flanking maneuver enabled capturing the village and plateau beyond. Five German divisions were routed."

### LOCAL AGENT SELECTED TO ATTEND MINNEAPOLIS MEET

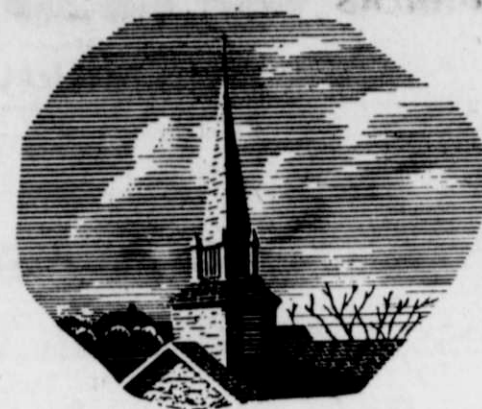

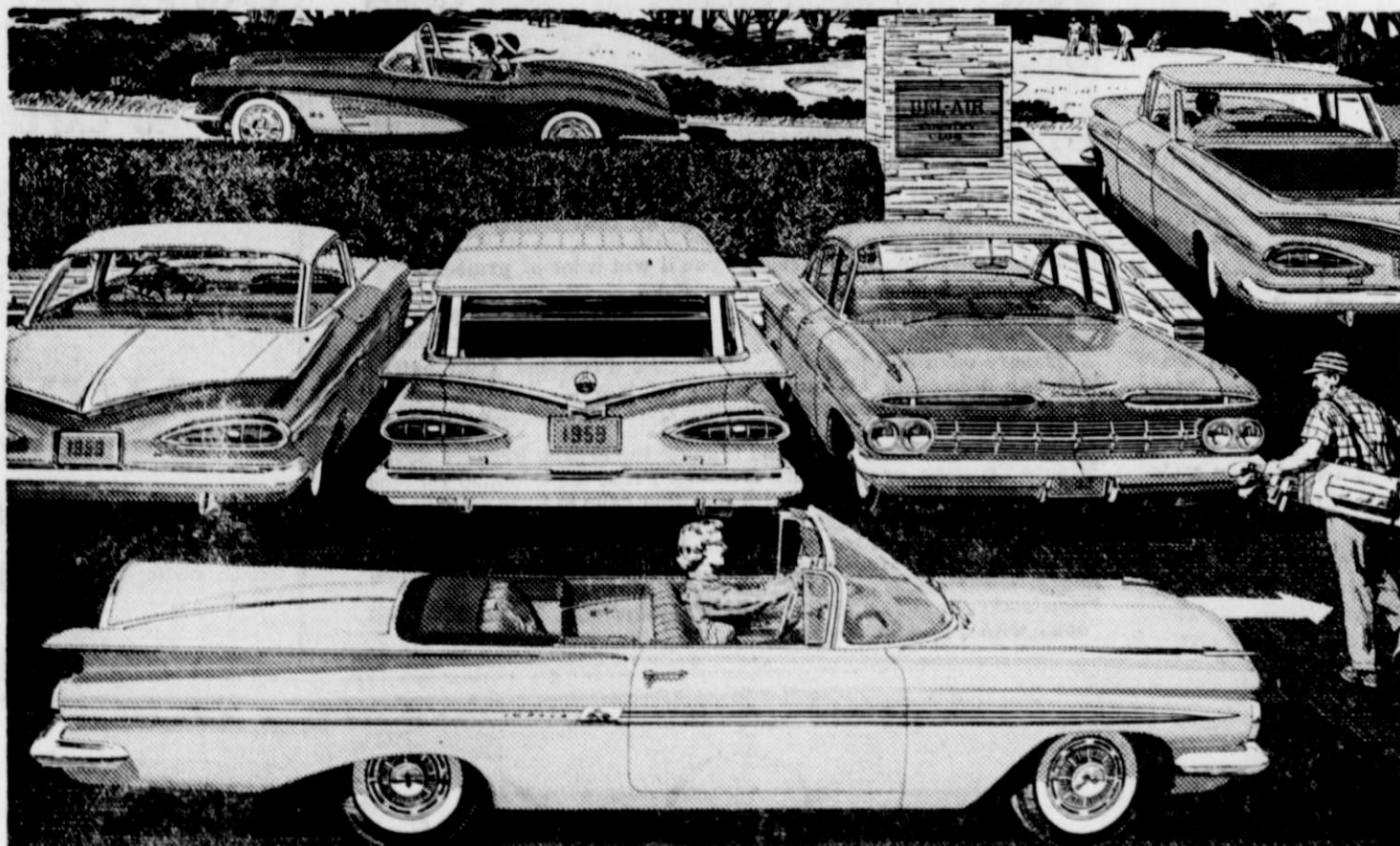

### 33 Register for Civil Defense Training Course

### KIWANIS KORNER

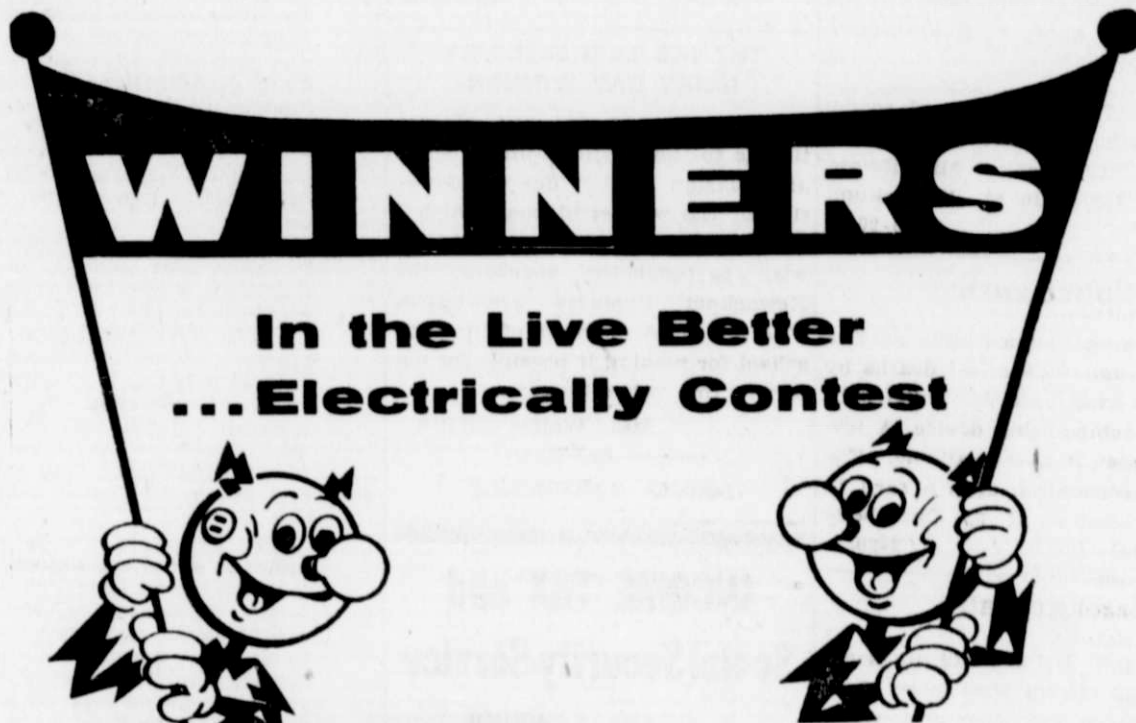

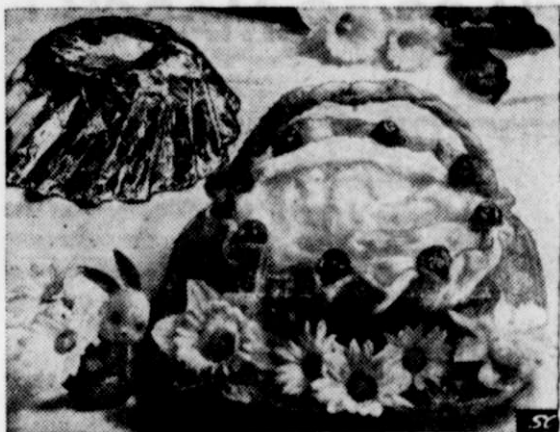

### Easter Basket Torte—Delicious Dessert

For a specially festive dessert that is pretty and gay, you might try this Easter Basket torte. Instead of using a spring form pan, you can make your own pan out of heavy weight quilted aluminum foil in any size or shape you desire. The use of foil lends itself to a wide variety of adaptations.

This torte which utilizes a package of pie crust mix, a package of lemon pudding and fresh fruit, is one of the most delicious desserts you can make.



This gay Easter torte is delicious and easy to make with package mixes. The fluted basket is made with heavy weight quilted aluminum foil, which lends itself to a wide variety of different forms.

#### Easter Torte (Serves 6 to 8)

- 1 package prepared pie crust mix
- 4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon almond or vanilla flavoring
- 1 package lemon pie or pudding mix
- 1 cup whipping cream, whipped
- 1 cup fresh fruit

Follow directions on package for making pie dough, except add sugar and flavoring before adding the liquid.

Roll pastry out 1/4 inch thick on a 14-inch square of Kaiser heavy weight quilted foil, the kind made especially for broiling. Now trim the dough and the foil together into a 12-inch circle, saving the edges of dough for the basket handle.

To make the basket place one hand in the center of the dough to hold it flat, and turn the edges up all around. Accordion pleat the edges in deep, wide flutes all the way down to the base, pinching the foil together in creases to retain the shape while baking. To make the handle, twist

together two 1/4 inch strips of pastry about 16-inches long, allowing a bit on each end to anchor into pudding. Shape these strips into a curve by laying them over the bottom of a mixing bowl or half a ball of foil the desired size.

Bake the basket and handle separately until golden brown, according to the package directions.

Prepare the pie filling according to the package directions and cool. Fold in the whipped cream and pour into shell, then insert the handle into pudding. Carefully remove the foil pan, garnish with cherries or other fruit, and your dessert is ready to serve.

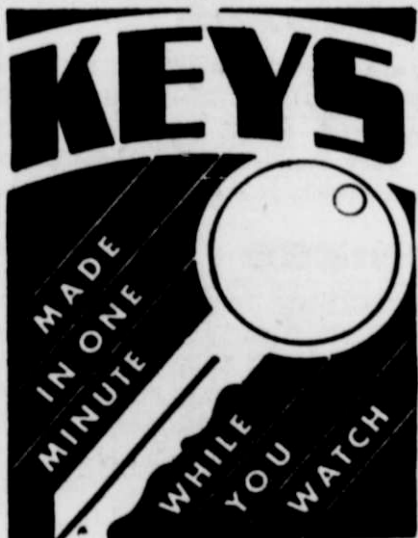

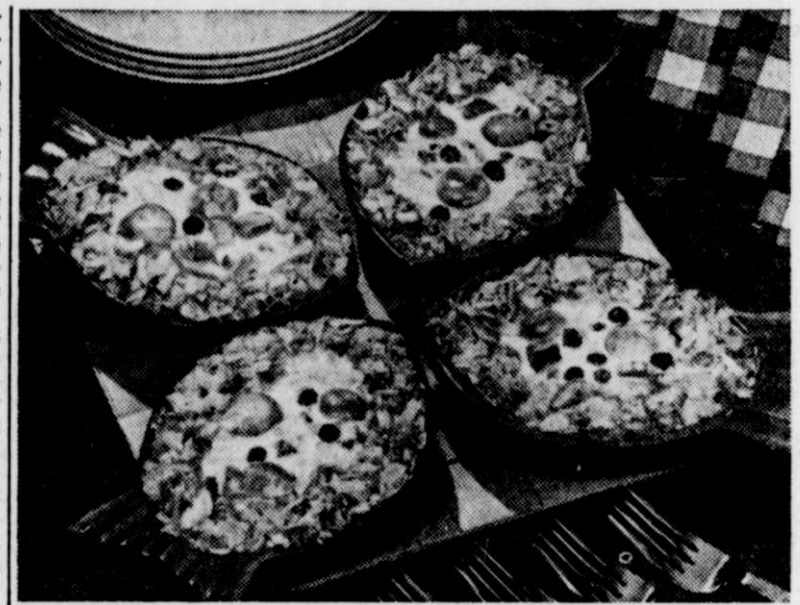
# Here's Tasty Salmon Casserole

We're again in the Lenten season when meal planning sometimes becomes a problem. However, it needn't be because there are three protein foods, cheese, milk and fish which can be made into distinctive dishes. With the many combinations that can be made with these three versatile foods you never need worry about meal monotony. They give the meal planner a challenge to bring some new ideas to the table.

Here's a salmon casserole that is a one dish meal. It contains nutritious evaporated milk, vegetables and fish. It is an easy way to solve the Lenten meal planning problem. Evaporated milk is used for the white sauce in this casserole, making it creamy smooth and rich. Onions, green pepper, celery and mushrooms blend with the fish and cheese to give it a distinctive flavor.

This casserole can be served either in individual casseroles or in one large two-quart casserole. Layers of salmon, cooked peas, cream sauce, and crunchy potato chips are arranged in the casserole. The top layer of potato chips is dotted with pieces of butter, and the dish is baked for twenty-five minutes.

**Salmon Casserole**  
2 qt. casserole 6 servings  
375°, 35 minutes  
1/4 cup butter  
1/4 cup chopped onion  
1/4 cup diced celery



1/4 cup chopped green pepper  
1/4 cup sliced mushrooms  
3 tablespoons flour  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1 tall can evaporated milk (1 3/4 cups)  
1 cup water  
1 1-pound can salmon, boned & flaked  
2 cups fresh, frozen or canned peas  
2 cups crushed potato chips

Saute onions, green peppers, celery, and mushrooms in melted butter until lightly browned. Add flour, salt, and pepper and mix well. Gradually stir in the evaporated milk, then the water and cook until smooth and thickened, stirring constantly. Arrange layers of salmon, peas, cream sauce, and potato chips in a buttered 2-quart casserole. Top with a layer of potato chips and dot with butter. Cover and bake at 375° for 25 minutes. Uncover and bake 10 minutes longer or until the top is brown. When using individual casseroles, cut the cooking time in half.

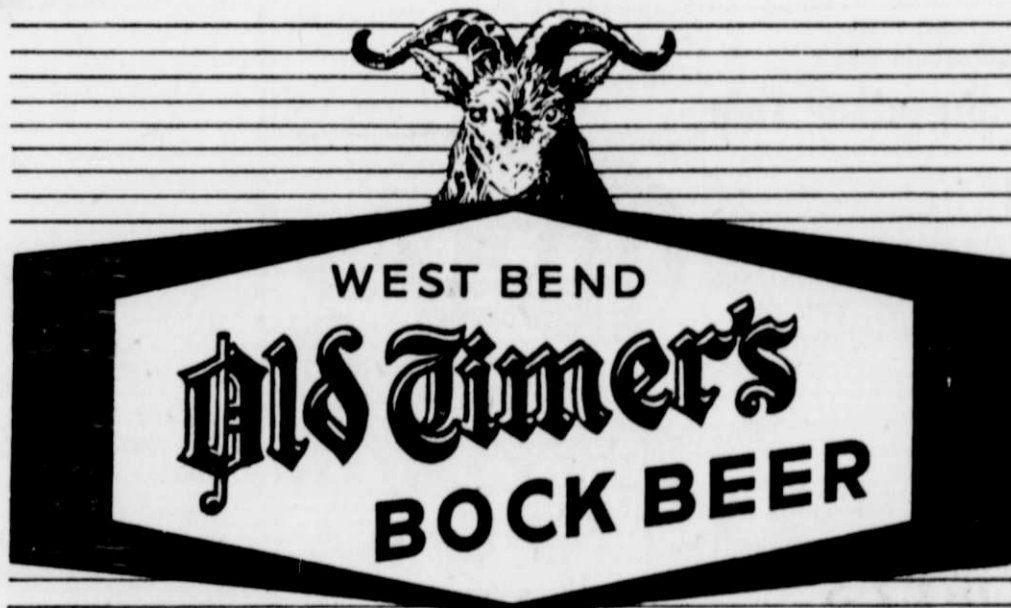
