Frank P. Wietor, 85, of Campbellsport, who formerly operated a tavern and dance hall at Wayne many years, died unexpectedly at 3:45 p. m. Friday, Apr. 10, at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, where he had been a patient.

Born Feb. 20, 1874, in the town of Lomira, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Wietor, he was married on Sept. 24, 1901, to Minnie Serwe. They lived at Wayne 35 years, moving to Ashford in 1945 and to Campbellsport in 1947.

Mr. Wietor was a member of the Holy Name society of St. Matthew's church, Campbellsport.

Surviving are the widow, a daughter, Mrs. Lucy Boegel of Wayne; three sons, Alois of Bakersfield, Calif., Leo of Campbellsport and Cyril of Kewaskum; 17 grandchildren, a great-grandchild; a sister, Mrs. Mary Walter of Lomira, and a brother, Matt Wietor of Juneau.

The body was in state at the Twohig funeral home, Campbellsport, after 7 p. m. Saturday. Funeral services were held from the funeral home Monday at 9:30 a. m. to St. Matthew's church there at 10 o'clock. The Rev. Peter Schwamb officiated and burial was in Holy Trinity parish cemetery, Kewaskum.

Fire Destroys Barn, House, Machine Shed On Dombrowski Farm

Fire of undetermined origin burned to the ground the barn, frame house and a machine shed on the Dombrowski farm located several miles southwest of Kewaskum Monday night. Also destroyed in the blaze was a large amount of farm machinery stored in the barn and shed. No one resides in the home, the farm being unoccupied.

The fire first destroyed the barn and, fanned by a strong wind, spread to the machine shed and dwelling. The Kohlsville fire department was called to the scene but because of a shortage of water was unable to save any of the buildings except one other shed, which was the only building left standing on the farm.

No estimate of the amount of damage nor any further details were available at this writing.

Kewaskum to Join Nation-Wide CD Alert This Friday

SIRENS TO ANNOUNCE TEST AT 11:15 A. M.; TRAFFIC TO BE HALTED FOR DRILL

Kewaskum and Washington county will join in the nation-wide Civil Defense Conelrad alert this morning (Friday) beginning at 10:30 a. m. Only two Milwaukee radio stations will broadcast the alert from 10:30 to 11 a. m. All other radio and TV stations leave the air during an emergency to prevent enemy planes and missiles from tracking them to the target.

The local fire siren will be sounded at 11:15 a. m. to announce the "Take Cover" period. The Take Cover signal is a rising and falling siren tone which will continue for 3 minutes. This will be followed by 2 minutes of silence before the "Alert" signal, a steady siren tone, is sounded.

During the "Take Cover" period cars will be stopped as part of the test. Traffic will resume its course immediately after the 5 minute test period. Local Civil Defense and auxiliary police personnel will be stationed at their assigned spots to help control traffic and pedestrians.

A group of 50 "monitors" will be on duty throughout Washington county to report on radio reception. Reports of their findings will be tabulated for future use. In the county the control center for the alert will be set up at the court house in West Bend, under the direction of Ray Storck, county CD coordinator.

The Milwaukee radio Conelrad test will extend over a seven county area. More than 300 monitors will listen to the broadcast in Racine, Kenosha, Walworth, Waukesha, Milwaukee, Washington and Ozaukee counties. Friday's alert will inaugurate the beginning of CD alerts for 1959 with others to follow.

On Saturday a convoy of CD emergency vehicles will pass through Washington county in conjunction with another "dry run" for Civil Defense purposes. It will include fire engines, ambulances, rescue squads and other related vehicles. A county squad car will meet the convoy at the north Sheboygan-Washington county line on Hwy. 14 about 11 a. m. The convoy will pass through the county to its destination at Indian Mounds in Waukesha county. The convoy's progress will be reported by two-way radio. It will travel along 144 to Hwy. 45 in Barton, west on Hwy. 23 in West Bend to Allenton and south on Hwy. 175 at Addison Center to Hwy. 83 and on to Hartford.

80 VOLUNTEERS REGISTER SO FAR, NEED 150 TO FILL QUOTA

A campaign to enlist contributors for the Community Blood Donor club "bank" is in full swing this week for the visit of the mobile unit in Kewaskum on Friday, Apr. 24. The blood clinic will be held from 1 to 6 p. m. in the new Kewaskum Community high school gymnasium.

So far only 80 volunteer donors have registered for the mobile unit and 150 are needed to fill the quota of 100 pints. More volunteers to give blood are urgently needed. To make appointments donors should phone Henry Rosenheimer 29, Mrs. E. E. Miller 209 or Mrs. Harry Koch 179W.

The St. Lucas Lutheran Church Guild will be in charge of serving refreshments at the Kewaskum mobile unit.

All blood contributions from the Kewaskum clinic will go into the reserve of the Community Donor Club blood bank, which serves all of Washington county except Hartford, Polk, Erin and Richfield townships.

If the quota is not filled we will run short in the blood bank. When the bank is empty and anyone from Washington county would need blood, they would have to pay for the blood in addition to finding volunteers for the type of blood needed.

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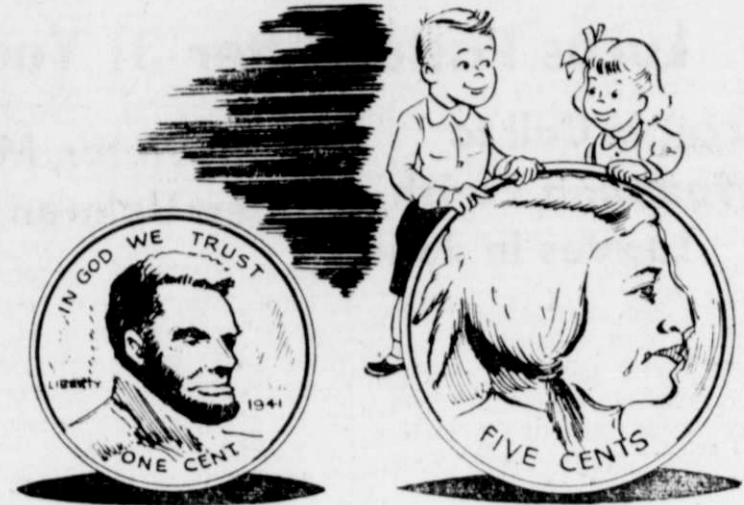

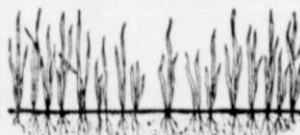

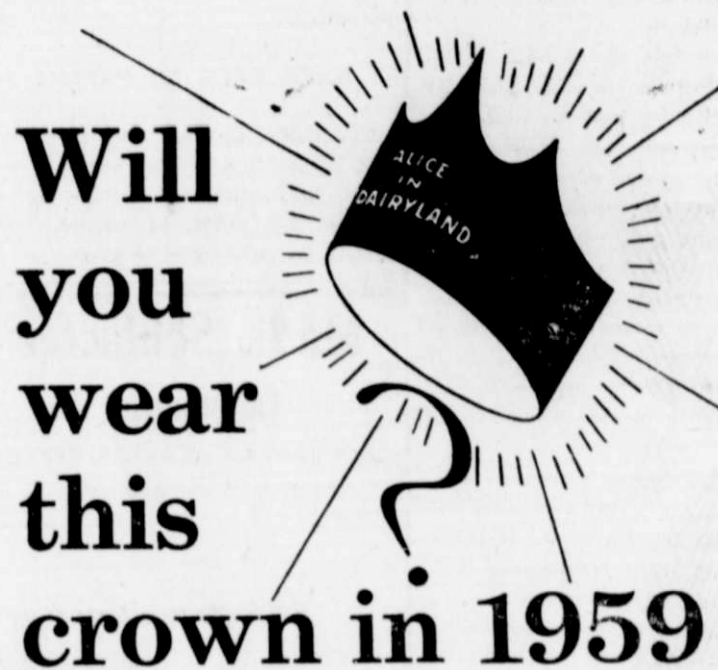
It has been decided to hold our April 27 meeting at the Peace Church in conjunction with the Boy Scouts annual pancake supper.

for good fishing. About 5000 black bass fingerlings and 2-3,000 bluegills have been planted thus far. When Wallace lake is poisoned next month some of the northerners removed will be placed in the river.

Wilmer talked about the sportsmen's pheasant raising activity. There is room for 700 chicks and last year 668 were released. Seven hundred more are on order for this year. The state furnishes feed for 9 weeks. The club owns the pens and 4 1/4 acres of land. Wilmer pointed out the need for more members and money to continue this fine project.

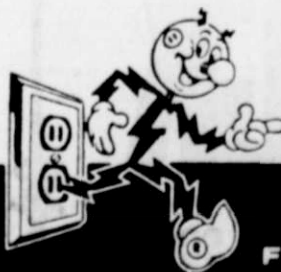

6th Annual Civil Defense 'Alert' to Begin April 17

The sixth annual civil defense Operation Alert will begin April 17 and continue through the summer in progressive stages.

The 1959 "Alert" will begin at

11:30 a. m. (EST) with the mock approach of "enemy" planes and missiles. Warning signals will sound in cities and towns across the nation. The drill may call for evacuation, shelter, or a combination of both, depending on local plans.

At the same hour, a nationwide 30-minute Conelrad Radio Alert Drill will be held. Civil and Defense Mobilization Director Leo A. Hoegh will speak on a national Conelrad hookup as part of a drill to increase public awareness of the emergency broadcasting system and to train radio personnel in its use. Conelrad radio stations operate only on 640 or 1240 kilocycles. All other radio and television stations will be off the air. Hoegh will be heard at about 11:45 a. m. (EST).

Operation Alert 1959 will be the first such exercise since President Eisenhower promulgated the National Plan for Civil Defense and Defense Mobilization last October. Many of the procedures and lines of authority set up in the plan will be practiced during the Alert.
