83 Pints of Blood Donated At Clinic Here

FALL SHORT OF QUOTA OF 100 AS ONLY 98 OF 126 REGISTERED REPORT; DONORS LISTED

The Community Blood Donor club "bank" was built up again when 83 pints of blood were donated at last Friday's mobile unit in Kewaskum, held from 1 to 6 p. m. in the high school gymnasium.

The 83 pints of blood donated fell short by 17 of the goal of 100. This goal could have been reached had more of those registered reported to give blood. Out of 126 donors registered, only 98 reported Friday. Fifteen of these were rejected, mostly because of having colds or flu. Twelve of the donors were first-time volunteers.

Kewaskum's record for the past three years during which blood clinics were held here now stands as follows: 1957—62 pints collected; 1958—85 pints, and 1959—83 pints, or a total of 230 pints donated to the blood "bank."

Henry Rosenheimer served as chairman and Mrs. E. E. Miller as co-chairman for the clinic. They wish to express thanks to Mrs. Vivian Pledl, R. N. and Mrs. Ann Schwartz, R. N. for their assistance, the St. Lucas Ladies' Aid for serving the lunch, the Woman's club for their telephone campaign, and all others who helped.

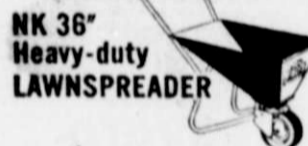
