## Three Persons Killed in Week End Accidents

**COUPLE LOSES LIFE ON HWY. 41, YOUTH KILLED NEAR CAMPBELLSPORT**

A Hales Corners couple died in a two-car collision at the intersection of Hwys. 41 and 60 near Slinger at 5:45 p. m. Sunday. They were Mr. and Mrs. Steve Gabor, whose car collided with one driven by Emil Jorgensen, 63, Oshkosh, State police, who investigated, reported Jorgensen was traveling north on 41 and the Gabor's were heading east on 60, crossing 41, when the vehicles met.

Six of the seven other persons injured in the crash were in serious condition Monday at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, and St. Joseph's hospital, Hartford, where they were taken in ambulances. They are Leroy Gloede, 47, Milwaukee, and Mrs. Gloede; Jorgensen; Donald Jorgensen, 30, Peter Jorgensen, 66, both of Oshkosh, and Ralph Deuster, 47, Hales Corners. Lesser injuries were sustained by John J. Scheuer, 36, Oshkosh, who was cut and bruised. The fatalities were the second and third in Washington county for 1959.

In another week end crash, a West Bend high school student and resident of Newburg, was killed in an accident near Campbellsport on Hwy. V about six miles north of Kewaskum. He was Elmer J. Bandle, Jr., 18, who was pronounced dead of injuries when admitted at St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, Sunday evening. His father's car, driven by Thomas Jerome Braatz, 19, Newburg, went out of control and crashed on County Trunk V, three-tenths of a mile south of Campbellsport at 5:35 p. m. Braatz was also removed to the hospital, sustaining a back injury and possible shoulder, hip and ankle injuries.

Donald R. Banaszynski, 19, of 3206 S. 9th st., Milwaukee, and two companions were injured about 3:40 p. m. Sunday when the car Banaszynski was driving rolled over on Hwy. S (the river road) just north of Kewaskum's village limits when the driver apparently lost control of the vehicle. The car, traveling south, left the highway on the right side, skidded across the road on its top and side, hit the ditch on the left side, and bounced into a field owned by Alfred Seefeldt near his home. Al Liegl and family of Kewaskum, approaching from the opposite direction, witnessed the mishap and reported that Banaszynski was thrown clear of the car, tossed high into the air and was found some distance from the vehicle. He was seriously injured and also hurt were two companions, Gerald Bartnik, 18, of 2845 S. 13th st., Milwaukee, who suffered a cut right foot, possible chest and shoulder injuries, and Roy A. Gruettner, 19, of 1405 S. 11th st., Milwaukee, cuts, bruises and possible injuries to his right side. The injured were removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum ambulance.

## Rites Held for John Etta; Jos. Uelmen

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Saturday at the St. Lucas Lutheran church for John Etta, 71, town of Kewaskum farmer, who died at 3:30 a. m. Thursday, Apr. 30, at his home about a mile north of Kewaskum after having been ailing for the past two years. The Rev. Gerhard Kaniess officiated and burial was in the parish cemetery. Prior to the services the body had been in state at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Friday until 11 a. m. Saturday and at the church from 12 noon until the time of services.

Mr. Etta formerly served as treasurer and assessor of the town of Kewaskum. He also served on the St. Lucas church board and was a school board member several years.

A son of the late Andrew and Fredricka Etta, he was born on Oct. 3, 1887, in the town of Auburn, Fond du Lac county, and lived in the Kewaskum area most of his life. His marriage to the former Golda Backhaus took place on Apr. 9, 1912 at St. Lucas church.

Surviving are the widow, two sons, Earl and Lloyd Etta, both of R. 1, Kewaskum; two daughters-in-law, six grandchildren, Ethan, Duane, Jane, Robert, Anne and Perry Etta; a brother, Julius Etta, West Bend, and a step-brother, Herman Giese, Coleman, Wis.

Joseph Uelmen, 82, 127 Mayer st., West Bend, a former Kewaskum resident, passed away at 2:25 p. m. Sunday, May 3, after ailing for some time.

Mr. Uelmen, now retired, was born in the town of Scott, Sheboygan county, on June 22, 1886, and grew up there. He was married to the former Anna Herriges at St. Michael's church, St. Michaels, on Nov. 25, 1904. Following their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Uelmen moved to St. Michaels where they owned and operated a tavern-grocery store until 1931. Then they came to Kewaskum and lived here until 1941 when they moved to West Bend. Mrs. Uelmen predeceased her husband on Jan. 31, 1953.

Regular Meeting April 6, 1959

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session and in the absence of President Reigle was called to order by Village Attorney, Stephen O'Meara. All trustee members were present. Upon motion by A. Merwin, seconded by J. Eberle and carried, Trustee Stellpflug was selected as acting president.

First order of business was the public hearing on the proposed amendment "A" to the official map. In attendance were Paul Landmann, Harold Degner, Armin Oppermann, Marie Dei and Roland Pledl. Since there were no objections to the amendment, the meeting was declared closed.

Upon motion by J. Eberle, seconded by J. Schwind and carried, the minutes of the previous meeting were approved as presented.

Paul Landmann and Harold Degner met with the Board to discuss what a municipality in an area where the state is buying land for park purposes can do to make up for the revenue lost by taking such taxable property off the tax roll.

Paul Landmann representing the Bank of Kewaskum as trustees for the William Opgenorth estate offered the Opgenorth property just to the east of the Municipal Building to the Village for the asking price of \$8,500.00. Mr. Landmann further stated that the trustees would not sell to anyone else until such time as the Village shall refuse to purchase said property.

Mr. Yocerst of the Wisconsin Electric Power Co. discussed with

the Board a plan for street lighting on the northern end of Fond du Lac Ave. in the area between Millers Warehouse and the north village limits.

Civil Defense Director Marvin Martin was authorized to attend a civil defense meeting at Milwaukee on April 9th.

The feasibility of installing a sludge elevator at the coil filter at the Sewage Treatment Plant was discussed by the Board.

The Superintendent of Public Works was instructed to discontinue the practice of hauling burnable trash for commercial and business places as the hauling of such materials is not included in the garbage ordinance.

The total of all claims as recommended and approved by the Finance Committee were as follows: Village General Fund \$84,626.37 Water Dept. 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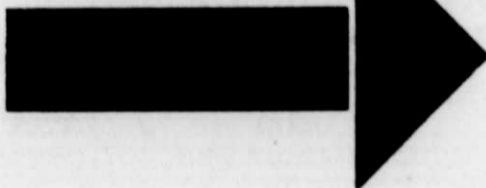

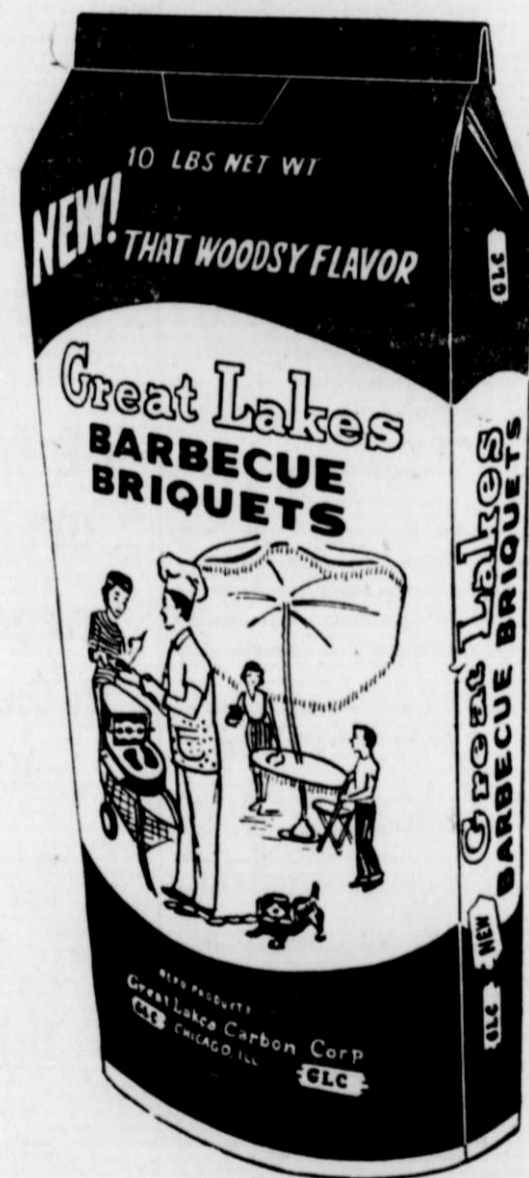
