Three Persons Killed in Week End Accidents

COUPLE LOSES LIFE ON HWY. 41, YOUTH KILLED NEAR CAMPBELLSPORT

A Hales Corners couple died in a two-car collision at the intersection of Hwys. 41 and 60 near Slinger at 5:45 p. m. Sunday. They were Mr. and Mrs. Steve Gabor, whose car collided with one driven by Emil Jorgensen, 63, Oshkosh. State police, who investigated, reported! Jorgensen was traveling north on 41 and the Gabors were heading east on 60, crossing 41, when the vehicles met.

Six of the seven other persons injured in the crash were in serious condition Monday at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, and St. Joseph's hospital, Hartford, where they were taken in ambulances. They are Leroy Gloede, 47, Milwaukee, and Mrs. Gloede; Jorgensen; Donald Jorgenson, 30, Peter Jorgensen, 66, both of Oshkosh, and Ralph Deuster, 47, Hales Corners. Lesser injuries were sustained by John J. Scheuer, 36, Oshkosh, who was cut and bruised. The fatalities were the second and third in Washington county for 1959.
