Indians Win 1st Scenic Moraine Baseball Title

COP FIVE STRAIGHT WITHOUT LOSS, THREE IN PAST WEEK; MARX HURLS NO-HITTER; SCORE 79 RUNS

Coach Walt Bade's Kewaskum Indians are the first baseball champions of the new Scenic Moraine conference. The team tucked away the title by blasting three opponents very convincingly the past week to run their victory string to five straight without a defeat in bringing the season to a close.

Playing three games in seven days, Kewaskum drubbed Slinger here last Thursday, 17-6, outslugged Campbellsport there Monday, 22-10, to clinch a tie for the title, and then proceeded to win the undisputed crown by trouncing Washington High of Germantown there Wednesday in a makeup game, 16-3.

In taking the championship the Indians established a terrific scoring record that should stand up for years to come in the conference. They scored 79 runs in just five contests, an average of close to 16 runs per game. No opponent even came close to them with the exception of North Fondy, which lost by three runs. Their opponents scored: Kewaskum 9, Grafton 0; Kewaskum 15, North Fondy 12; Kewaskum 17, Slinger 5; Kewaskum 22, Campbellsport 10; Kewaskum 16, Germantown 3.

The Indians unleashed a 15-hit attack last Thursday in clobbering Slinger, 17-6. Jim Marx pitched the team to the win as he allowed four hits and fanned nine. John Machacek was the loser. Ken Theusch paced Kewaskum with three hits in four trips. Dan Coulter continued to be murder at the plate with two hits in four at-bats. Ray Wiedmeyer tripled. The winners tallied 8 runs in the first frame to coast to victory.

In Kewaskum's resounding 22-10 victory over Campbellsport Monday Marx was again given credit for the win as he, Tom Smith and Dan Coulter tripled. Gene Pieper hit a homer for the Bells. Ken Hundertmark was the losing pitcher. The Indians scored at least 3 runs in every inning but the 2nd. They had four 3-run frames and two 5-run innings. The victors slashed out 16 hits to the losers' 7.

Senior Jim Marx ended his high school career in brilliant fashion on Wednesday as he tossed a no-hit game in his team's 16-3 win over Germantown. But Jim was wild, giving up 8 walks. These, with several errors by his mates, allowed the Warhawks to score 3 runs. Kewaskum collected 12 safeties. The score was respectable at 6-3 until the final inning when the Indians staged a big rally and pushed 10 runs over the plate. Glen Remmel was the leading hitter with three singles. There were no extra base hits in the tilt.

Homemade Ice Cream Sodas Live Up Any Party

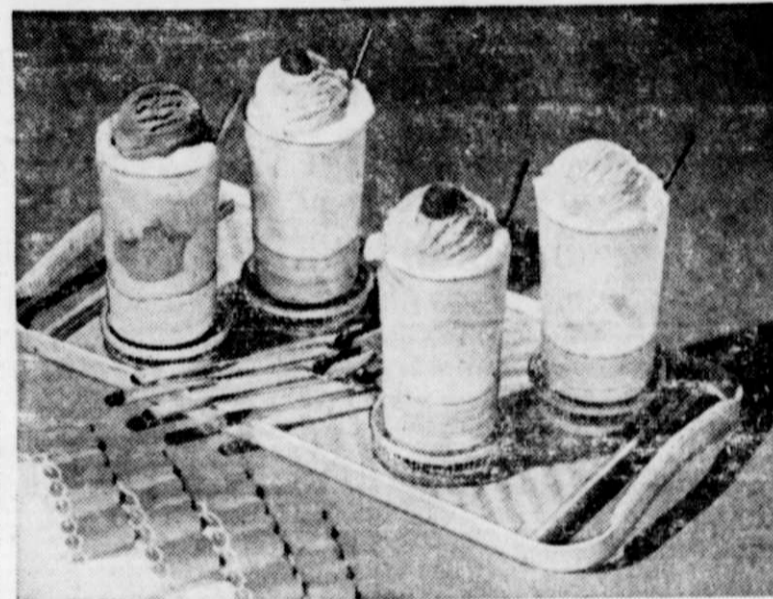
Homemade Ice Cream sodas are just the thing to serve for party refreshments these spring days. They're sure pleasers. Young folks will love the novelty of it, the grown up too. To make it even merrier, let each one make his own favorite soda—just have the "fixin's" ready.

Ice Cream sodas are so easy to make at home—just a few simple steps to follow to obtain real professional results. First you need tall glasses, straws, and long handled spoons to make it fun. Ingredients for the soda would include chilled sparkling water or carbonated beverages of your choice, a variety of flavors and fruits and, of course, plenty of ice cream in the freezer.

To make an ice cream soda as bubbly and frothy as the best, be sure that the bottled soft drink used is well chilled and freshly opened. The small sized bottle of carbonated beverage is ideal for this reason. The procedure to follow is very simple. Into a tall soda glass first put crushed fresh or frozen fruit or syrup. Stir into this a spoon full of ice cream, whipped cream or one-half cup light cream. Fill the glass three-fourths full with chilled carbonated beverage. Float into the carbonated mixture two dippers or two full tablespoons of ice cream and then add more carbonated beverage to fill to the top.

Pineapple Royal Soda (Serves 1)
1 tablespoon canned, crushed pineapple
2 tablespoons Ice Cream or light cream
Carbonated water
1 or 2 scoops Vanilla Ice Cream
Pour fruit syrup, then light cream or ice cream into a glass and stir to mix. Fill glass 3/4 full with chilled carbonated water, add ice cream, then more carbonated water to fill to the top.

Raspberry Soda (Serves 1)
2 tablespoons frozen raspberries
2 tablespoons Ice Cream or light cream
Plain or fruit-flavor carbonated drink



1 or 2 scoops Raspberry Ice Cream
Pour fruit syrup, then ice cream or light cream into a glass and stir to mix. Fill glass 3/4 full with chilled carbonated drink, add ice cream, then more carbonated drink to fill to the top.

Peach Cream Soda (Serves 1)
1/2 cup crushed, sweetened ripe, frozen or canned peaches
1/2 cup light cream or 1 tablespoon Ice Cream
Scoop Vanilla Ice Cream
Carbonated water
Stir gently and serve

Plum Soda (Serves 1)
3 tablespoons plum syrup (from canned plums)
2 tablespoons light cream or Ice Cream
Carbonated water

1 or 2 scoops Vanilla Ice Cream
Pour fruit syrup, then light cream or ice cream into a glass and stir to mix. Fill glass 3/4 full with chilled carbonated water, add ice cream, then more carbonated water to fill to the top.

Strawberry Soda (Serves 1)
2 tablespoons frozen strawberries (defrosted)
2 tablespoons Ice Cream or

light cream
Carbonated water*
1 or 2 scoops Strawberry Ice Cream

Pour fruit syrup, then light cream or ice cream into a glass and stir to mix. Fill glass 3/4 full with chilled carbonated water, add ice cream, then more carbonated water to fill to the top.

*Good also with cream soda or Kola-type beverage.

Orange Frosted (Serves 1)
1 cup orange juice, fresh, frozen or canned
2 scoops Vanilla Ice Cream

Blend orange juice and ice cream with egg beater, electric beater, malted milk machine or blender until ice cream is dissolved and serve.

Black and White Soda (Serves 1)
3 tablespoons chocolate syrup
1 tablespoon Ice Cream
Carbonated water

1 or 2 scoops Vanilla Ice Cream
Pour syrup into glass, then add a spoonful of ice cream and blend into syrup. Slowly fill glass 3/4 full with chilled carbonated water, add ice cream. If glass is not full add more carbonated water to fill to the top.

25 at High School Take Merit Scholarship Test

More than 25 students at Kewaskum Community high school took the National Merit Scholarship qualifying test, Clifford Rose, principal, announced. The test was administered at the high school at 9:00 a. m., Tuesday, April 28.

The test is the first step in competition for merit scholarships provided by some 90 corporations, foundations, professional societies and individuals, as well as by the National Merit Scholarship corporation itself.

The National Merit Scholarship qualifying test is a three hour measure of educational development and college aptitude. Emphasis is on broad intellectual skills, and on understanding and ability to use what has been learned, rather than on sheer knowledge of facts.

Some 10,000 semifinalists, the highest scorers in each state, will be named early next fall. Each semifinalist will take a second examination. Those who repeat their high performance on the second examination will become finalists. Further evaluation of their grades, citizenship, and extra-curricular achievements will follow, and the winners will be announced in the Spring of 1960.

Each merit scholarship carries a stipend based on the need of each individual winner, and is renewable annually without further competitive examination. The average sti-

pend in past years has been \$700 per year. The minimum award in the 1959-60 program will be \$100 a year and a maximum will be \$1500 a year.

About 700 merit scholars, winners of the 1958-59 competition were named on April 29. They are winners in the fourth merit program which began last April.

The National Merit Scholarship corporation directs the annual competition. It was founded in 1955, on grants of \$20 million by the Ford Foundation and \$500 thousand by the Carnegie Corporation of New York.

1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
1 cup granulated beet sugar

Add cream of tartar to egg whites, beat just until frothy. Continue to beat while sprinkling beet sugar, a tablespoon at a time, over egg whites. Continue vigorous beating until meringue is very stiff and glossy.

To make heavenly pie shell—spread beaten meringue over bottom and up sides just to rim of

very well-greased 9-inch pan. Make bottom 1/4-inch thick and sides 1 inch. Sprinkle rim of meringue with coconut or nuts, if desired. Bake in very slow (250° F.) oven 1 1/2 hours. Cool. Fill with a creamy chocolate filling. Chill several hours.

To make meringue layers—cut four 8-inch circles out of brown wrapping paper; grease well; place on cookie sheet. Spoon beaten meringue onto paper; spread evenly to within 1/2 inch of edge. Bake in very slow (250° F.) oven 30 minutes, or until done. Lift off brown paper, cool on racks. Put meringue layers together with a lemon filling. Refrigerate overnight. To serve cut into wedges, top with whipped cream, if desired.

To make daisy meringues — drop "petals" of meringue by teaspoonfuls onto well-greased brown paper on cookie sheet. Start with center, then place 7 petals around it. (Or shape into hearts or shamrocks, according to season.) Keep 2 inches apart. Bake in very slow (250° F.) oven about one hour. Remove at once from brown paper to cooling racks. Makes 12 daisy shells. To serve fill with ice cream and top with sauce or fruit.
