Fire Causes \$10,000 Damage At Steve & Mary's Minor Bar

Found Not Guilty of Indecent Exposure By County Court Jury

Oscar Pfeifer of the city of Fond du Lac, was, on May 11, found not guilty by a jury in the county court of Washington county at West Bend of the charge of indecent exposure. Pfeifer was arrested by Chief Roland Pledl of the Kewaskum Police Department on Jan. 14, 1959, and on the basis of testimony presented at a preliminary hearing on Jan. 31, before Robert G. Kroncke, justice of the peace of the village of Kewaskum, was bound over for trial to the county court of Washington county.

Previously, on Jan. 24, 1959, Pfeifer had been convicted on a charge of disorderly conduct before Justice Kroncke in connection with his conduct at the Kewaskum Community theatre on Dec. 27, 1958, an appeal from which conviction is now pending in the circuit court.

Blaze Early Sunday Morning Damages Interior & Fixtures

A fire which swept Steve and Mary Rahn's minor bar and lunch room on Hwy. 45 about three-quarters of a mile north of Kewaskum early Sunday morning caused damages estimated at more than \$10,000 to the interior and fixtures of the building. The brand new building was just built last fall and all work on it was not yet completed.

The entire interior of the minor bar was damaged by the flames, smoke and heat as well as the upstairs living quarters. About 10 to 12 feet on the west side of the circular bar burned, a rinsing tank and cooler were destroyed, four bar stools burned and others were damaged, a spot in the ceiling was charred, an ice cream cooler and other fixtures were damaged, several windows cracked and doors warped from the heat, the walls and ceiling were damaged by smoke and heat in bar room, kitchen, rest rooms and store room. The upstairs rooms and furniture, carpeting, clothing and other possessions also suffered smoke damage.

Mr. and Mrs. Rahn and their two daughters, Judy 17 and Jean 11, were asleep upstairs when the fire broke out at approximately 2:45 a. m. Sunday. Awakened when her throat was dry, apparently from the smoke which filled the upstairs rooms, Judy noticed the smoke and heat from the blaze and awakened the rest of the family.

Steve then summoned the members of the Kewaskum fire department, who extinguished the blaze. The firemen found it difficult to get into the building because of the heavy smoke but after opening the doors and putting a smoke ejector into use they were able to reach the source of the flames. Fire Chief Harry Schaefer reports that he believes the fire started in a cardboard carton under the bar, possibly from a cigarette.

Regular Meeting
May 4, 1959

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all Board members present.

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as presented upon motion by W. Tessar, seconded by A. Merwin and duly carried.

Mr. Clifford Stautz of the School Board met with the Board to secure estimated costs for the black-topping of streets, sidewalks, curbing and storm sewers.

The committee reported that the recreation program was being formulated and that an applicant for a director had been interviewed.

The following ordinance was introduced by Trustee Tessar:
Ordinance 59-2

An ordinance adopting amendment "A" to the official map.

The Village Board of the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, do ordain as follows:

(1) Amendment "A" to the of-

ficial map, as prepared by the State Planning Board is hereby adopted as provided by Section 62.23, subsection (6), paragraph (b) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

(2) This ordinance shall be in effect and in full force upon passage and publication.

(3) Dated this 4th Day of May, 1959.

Motion by J. Eberle, seconded by H. Becker that said ordinance shall be adopted. Upon roll call vote, all members present voting "aye", said ordinance was so adopted.

The offer to purchase the William Opgenorth property just to the east of the Municipal Building was discussed by the Board. After viewing the property, the Board felt that the asking price of \$8500.00 was too high. Upon motion by

C. Wietor, seconded by J. Schwind and carried by a 6 to 1 vote, the Commissioner was authorized to offer a bid of \$4500.00.

The application of Eugene Gnanski for an operator's license was approved upon motion by J. Eberle, seconded by A. Merwin and duly carried and the Commissioner was authorized to issue the proper license upon payment of the required fee.

The complaint about the noise from the exhaust steam at Ours Dry Cleaners was referred to the proper committee for investigation.

The installation of an electric hot water heater at the Municipal Building was duly authorized by the Board.

The Board went on record as establishing the fee for mileage at 7c per mile.

Payment of these claims, as recorded in the official record, was authorized upon motion by A. Merwin, seconded by J. Schwind and duly carried.

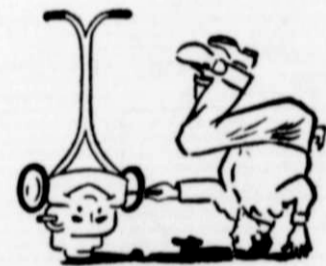

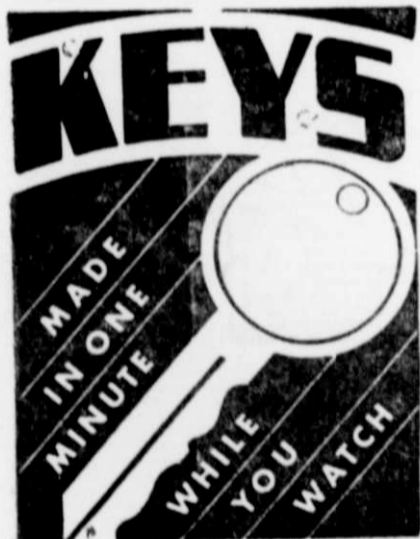

Wearing Poppy Pays Tribute to War Dead

Poppy Day, Friday, May 22, has one outstanding purpose—to honor the nation's war dead by wearing a memorial poppy! This is the purpose which should be given the major emphasis as we tell the story of the poppy to the people of America again this year.

A successful Poppy Day brings other great benefits—money to help support rehabilitation and child welfare programs—beneficial employment for disabled veterans—but let's remember that the little red flower comes to us from "between the crosses, row on row," to help keep bright the memory of those who gave their lives in defense of America.

Let's make the people of our

communities understand that wearing the poppy is the important thing, not the money given. Of course, Poppy Day contributions help perform valuable services for the disabled veterans and needy children of veterans, but Poppy Day is not a "tag day" to raise funds. Too much emphasis on money tends to place the poppy in the category of charity appeals, which many people think belong under the United Fund.

Let's make sure that everyone understands the principal purpose of the little red flowers is to pay tribute to the nation's fallen defenders—that by wearing a poppy over the heart we show that we remember with heartfelt gratitude those who died that free America might live.

We ask our poppy-wearers to think of the living who also sacrificed—the disabled veterans and

needy children of veterans—and aid with a cash contribution those still within reach of their aid. But we should make it clear that we place no price on our poppy—that a flower of such significance is beyond price.

Sift flour and remaining dry ingredients together. Cream butter. Add sugar gradually, mixing well. Add eggs, vanilla and sour cream. Blend in the sifted dry ingredients. Drop teaspoons of the dough onto a buttered cookie sheet and bake in a pre-

heated 400 degree oven for 8-10 minutes. Yield: 6 dozen.

Creamy Chocolate Butter Frosting

½ cup butter
1 1-pound package confectioners' sugar, sifted
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
½ teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon milk or cream
2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted
Cream the butter until smooth. Add ½ of the sifted confectioners' sugar and cream thoroughly. Add the salt, milk and vanilla. Blend. Add unbeaten egg and melted chocolate and beat until smooth. Add remaining amount of confectioners' sugar. Beat until smooth. If frosting is a little thick, more milk or cream may be added.

**ORDINANCE NO. 14
ORDINANCE RELATING TO
TOWN DUMP AND DUMPING
GARBAGE AND RUBBISH
IN THE
TOWN OF KEWASKUM**

The Town Board of the Town of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, does ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or municipality to accumulate, dump, transport or deposit any garbage, rubbish or other refuse, of any kind, in or into the Town of Kewaskum, except as hereinafter provided.

SECTION 2. No person or municipality residing or located outside of the Town of Kewaskum shall transport, bring or dump any rubbish or other refuse in or into the Town of Kewaskum unless a license or permit therefor is first obtained from the Town Board of the Town of Kewaskum.

SECTION 3. Only the residents of the Town of Kewaskum shall have the right, without a permit, to dump or deposit their rubbish or other refuse at the Town Dump designated by the Town Board of the Town of Kewaskum.

SECTION 4. No person shall start any fire in or adjacent to the Town Dump except under the supervision and control of the person or persons supervising such Town Dump.

SECTION 5. No person shall discharge any gun or firearm in or within One Hundred (100) feet of such Town Dump.

SECTION 6. No person or municipality shall obtain a permit from the Town Board for transporting or bringing any rubbish or other refuse into the Town of Kewaskum until such person or mu-

nicipality has made a contract with the owner of the Town Dump for the use of such Dump and has paid to the Town Clerk a permit fee of Ten Dollars (\$10.00).

SECTION 7. The Town Board, from time to time, shall have the right to adopt and post rules and regulations for the use of such Town Dump.

SECTION 8. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance or of the rules and regulations referred to in Section 7 hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall forfeit not less than Five Dollars (\$5.00), nor more than One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), and in default of payment of the forfeiture and the costs of prosecution shall be imprisoned in the County Jail until such forfeiture and costs are paid, not more than six (6) months.

SECTION 9. The terms and provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed severable; and if any provisions of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the ordinance and the application of such provisions to any person and circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 10. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the terms of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 11. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and posting.

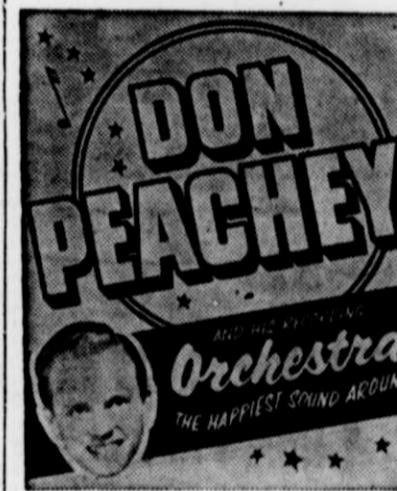

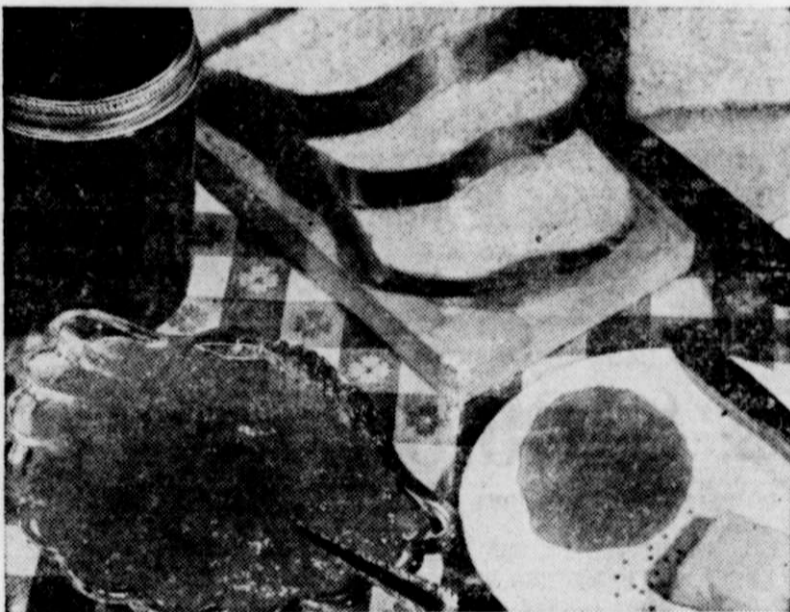

**RECIPE FOR PEACH JAM
THAT'S QUICK TO MAKE**



You can make this peach jam any time

This quick peach jam is made from frozen peaches—either commercially packaged or sweetened home-processed fruit. So it is truly a jam that has no season—one that may be made at your leisure. And it's quick—no peeling or slicing of the fruit; and by using fruit pectin to jell the jam, you eliminate the long cooking time required for some jams.

This recipe—
from Nancy Haven of Western Beet Sugar Producers, Inc.—calls for peaches but you may use frozen red raspberries or sliced strawberries. However, if you substitute one of the berries, Nancy says not to add the lemon juice the recipe calls for.

As you know, when fruit is frozen some sugar is added for its preservative as well as sweetening qualities. So it is important that the recommended proportions of all the ingredients in the recipe are followed accurately.

QUICK PEACH JAM

Defrost and measure into large saucepan:

2 3/4 cups peaches and juice
(3 packages of the 10-oz. size will yield almost exactly the right amount; 2 packages of the 12-oz. size will yield less, add water to make 2 3/4 cups.)

Crush peaches partially, add:
2 teaspoons lemon juice
Measure and stir in:

4 tablespoons powdered fruit pectin

Place over high heat and stir until mixture comes to a hard boil.

At once stir in:
2 1/2 cups beet sugar

Bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Ladle into sterilized glasses or jars. Seal. Makes about 5 six-ounce glasses.
