Two Lose Lives in Area Crashes Over Holiday Week End

A Campbellsport man and a Milwaukee woman were killed in two fatal crashes which occurred in the surrounding area over the Memorial day holiday week end. The dead are:

Royal W. Streaun, 29, R. 3, Campbellsport.

Carol Sobieszcyk, 26, Milwaukee. Streaun was killed at 11:50 p. m. Sunday when his car and one driven by Andrew P. Heltemes, 38, Campbellsport, collided head on on County Trunk V approximately three-quarters of a mile south of Campbellsport or six miles north of Kewaskum. Heltemes suffered critical internal injuries and his passenger, Ivan W. Vorderbruggen, 27, Campbellsport, received minor injuries. Both were removed to St. Agnes hospital, Fond du Lac, by ambulance.

Fond du Lac county police reported the crash occurred in the northbound lane of traffic used by Heltemes' car. This is a straight stretch of road. The impact was so powerful that the Streaun car bounced back across the road and struck an embankment with its rear section and then flipped around a utility pole. Heltemes' auto skidded off the road in an opposite direction and hit another utility pole.

It was the fourth crash of the year in the Campbellsport area in which a fatality has been recorded. The crash scene was near one on May 3 in which a R. 2, West Bend, youth was killed.

Streaun was born Dec. 5, 1929 at Two Rivers, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Streaun, and married Dorothy Schultz on Dec. 17, 1949 in Campbellsport. He was employed by the West Bend Aluminum Co. He is survived by his widow, a daughter, three sons, his parents, two brothers and two grandmothers. Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday in Emanuel Lutheran church, Campbellsport, with burial in Union cemetery.

Miss Sobieszcyk was killed at 10:08 p. m. Sunday in a one-car mishap about 1 1/2 miles north of Allenton on County Trunk W. She was riding with two other passengers in a car driven by Gene Schroeder, 22, Milwaukee, when it left the road, skidded into a ditch and rammed into a tree.

Injured were Schroeder, fractured right ankle and cuts; Dennis Sobieszcyk, 22, brother of the victim, abrasions and shock, and Dorine Welber, 22, Milwaukee, sprained ankle and abrasions. All were taken to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend. The death was the fifth of the year in Washington county.

There were numerous other crashes and injuries in Washington and Fond du Lac counties over the week end but none of them occurred in this area or involved local persons.

Two School Districts In Town Auburn Closed

PUPILS TO BE TRANSFERRED TO CAMPBELLSPORT AND KEWASKUM SCHOOLS

Order of dissolution and attachment was issued last week by the Fond du Lac county school committee after a public hearing was held at Campbellsport high school for abandoning two school districts in the town of Auburn and combining the areas with the villages of Campbellsport and Kewaskum.

Districts 1 and 9, the Five Corners and Lake Fifteen schools of the town of Auburn, would increase enrollment in the Campbellsport and Kewaskum schools by 33 pupils. Auburn District 1 voters previously decided to close their school and no opposition was heard from either of the two areas. Both Kewaskum and Campbellsport were receptive to the program.

Area involved in Campbellsport is Joint District 13 and in Kewaskum the school territory is known as Joint District 1. The plan will be put into action when classes are resumed in September.

A lesson learned in his class at St. Michael's Catholic school, St. Michaels, helped save the life of Clifford Bales, 11, of R. 1, Kewaskum, last Friday evening, it was reported.

The boy was cleaning up the yard at his home and was burning rubbish when sparks from the bonfire ignited his trousers. He had spilled gasoline from a power mower on his trousers, which quickly ignited. His trousers ablaze, the youth threw himself on the ground and rolled over and over until the flames were extinguished.

Bales stated that they had been taught in school to put out a fire in this way and his quick thinking probably saved his life. The attending Kewaskum physician reported that the boy, whose legs were badly burned, was recovering nicely at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend. His parents were not at home when the mishap occurred.

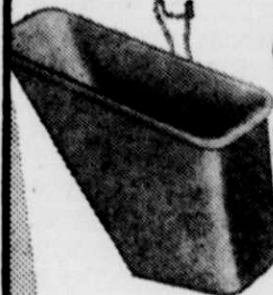

DA Warns Against Sale, Use of "Cracker Balls"

District Attorney Deane Bascom this week issued a warning that the sale and firing of so-called "Cracker Balls" in Washington county is a violation of state statutes prohibiting the use of fireworks.

Bascom described the "Cracker Balls" as being composed of vari-colored round balls, about the size of a large pea, enclosed in a pack. About 10 of the colored balls constitute the larger "Cracker Ball." When the ball is hurled against a sidewalk or other solid object, it explodes, sending the vari-colored contents in all directions.

Chief of Police Roland Pledl of Kewaskum reported that some of these balls have been sold in the Kewaskum area recently and also exploded in the village. Some local youths were found with them in their possession and the balls were confiscated.

Bascom cautioned merchants against selling the potentially dangerous balls and urged parents to prohibit their youngsters from purchasing or exploding them under possible penalty of prosecution.

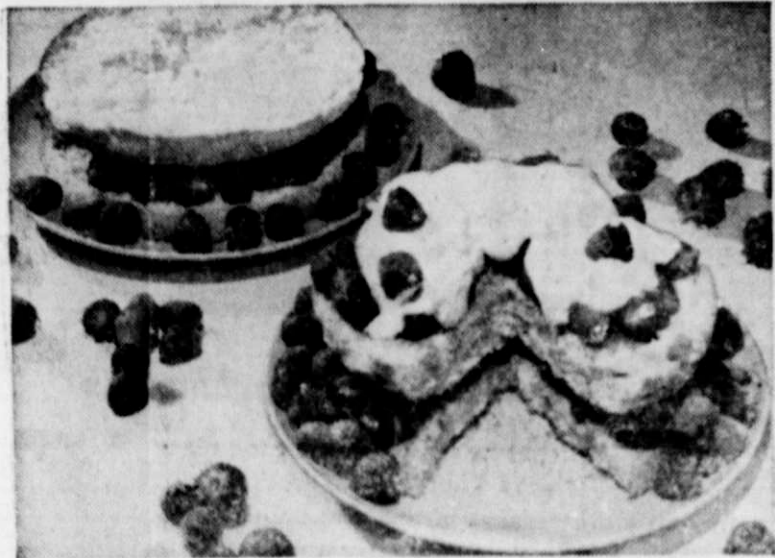

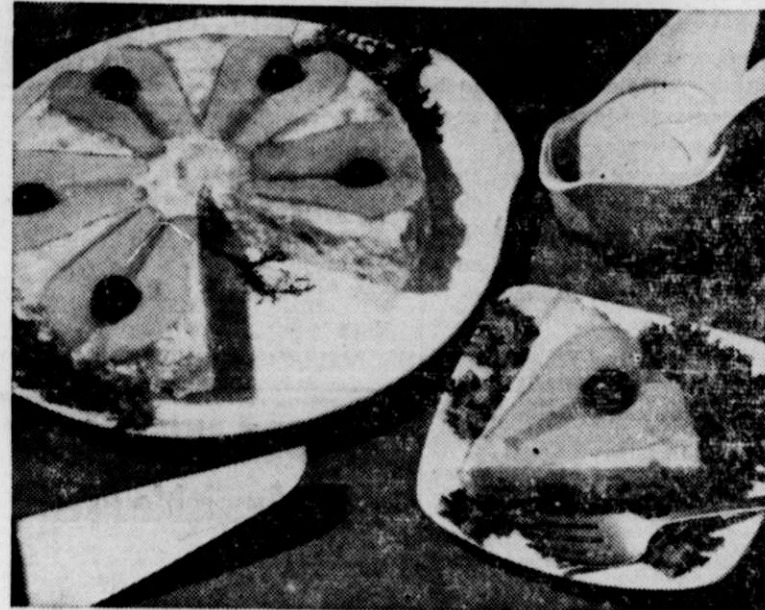

1/2 cup crushed pineapple, undrained
1 cup Cottage Cheese
3 or 4 maraschino cherries
Salad Greens

Dissolve gelatin in hot water; blend in lemon juice. Cool. Pour a thin layer (about 1/4 cup) into a round 8-inch cake pan which has been lightly oiled; allow to set. Cool remaining gelatin until syrupy. Drain pears and blot dry with paper towels. Arrange pear halves, cut side down; on layer of gelatin. Fold crushed pineapple and cheese into remaining gelatin in bowl. Pour over pear halves and chill until firm. Unmold upside down and serve on salad greens. Garnish each pear center with half maraschino cherry. Yield: 6 to 8.
