MSGR. PETER K. FLASCH

Funeral services for the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Peter K. Flasch, 78, a native of St. Kilian, who was founder and pastor of St. Catherine's church, 5101 W. Center st., Milwaukee, was held at 10:30 a. m. Friday, June 5, at the church. Burial was in Holy Cross cemetery.

Msgr. Flasch died in his sleep at the rectory Tuesday morning. Heihim, and a sister, Mrs. Walter had been suffering from a heart ailment. Born Jan. 12, 1881, at St. St. Kilian, he was one of six children. Following his father's death, Msgr. Flasch and the family moved to Milwaukee, where he attended St. Augustine's school.

As a youth Msgr. Flasch worked at Gimbels and the Schwaab Stamp & Seal Co. before entering the seminary of St. Francis in 1896. He was ordained there June 10, 1906, by Bishop Fox of Green Bay, who officiated in the absence of Milwaukee's Archbishop Messmer.

Fr. Flasch was first assigned as curate at St. Michael's parish, Milwaukee. A year later he was transferred to St. Anthony's and in 1910 he was made pastor of St. Rose's parish in Fredonia. Fr. Flasch was assigned to build a new parish at the St. Catherine site in Milwaukee in 1922, which was completed in 1929. A convent was added in 1931, a rectory was built in 1936 and the permanent church was dedicated in 1950. The next year Fr. Flasch was elevated to the monsignori as a domestic prelate by the late Pope Pius XII. Under his leadership, St. Catherine's parish grew from 100 to 1.500 families.

A requiem mass was said at the church at 10 a. m. Thursday and was attended by the grade school children. The office of the dead was read at 10:30 a, m. Friday Archbishop Cousins read the requiem mass at 11 a. m. Friday.





Why? Because James Doty had the foresight to present a plan completely surveyed and platted for what is now Madison. His competitors had promises, but no plans.



Wonderful Strawberry Dessert


Strawberries come in with a bang once the season starts. California and our southern states' berries are at their height during May and the bountiful season for northern berries is June, right up until the fourth of July.
