State Club Week is an annual event held for the purpose of recognizing outstanding 4-H leadership, opening new areas of interest, widening horizons, and challenging 4-H members with decision-making facts. Much time is spent to develop a better understanding of the importance of leadership training and education in preparing for future tasks and living.

The theme of this year's club week was "Preparing Today for Tomorrow," a common interest career exploration. A great variety of speakers, including Governor Gaylord Nelson, devoted themselves to the explanation of career areas and the importance of getting an early start in the field that is chosen. Fireworks Here on Beaver Dam Youth Firemen Win \$56 Friday Night, July 3 Drowns at Mauthe At Badger Tourney Lake on Sunday

KEWASKUM RESCUE SQUAD ASSISTS IN RECOVERY. WORKS OVER VICTIM

Leslie David Huettl, 18, of R. 1. Beaver Dam, one of three Dodge county residents who drove to Mauthe lake seven miles northeast of Kewaskum for a few hours of swimming fun Sunday afternoon, drowned in the lake about midaf-

According to Fond du Lac county authorities Huettl was swimming with his companions about 3 p. m. when he dove into the lake and never came to the surface. Described as having been a good swimmer, the youth apparently suffered from cramps. Authorities who investigated said the group was swimming in about 25 to 30 feet of water outside the protected beach area. Huetti's body was recovered about two hours later.

Alarmed when the youth did not come to the surface, his companions notified park authorities who called the Kewaskum fire department rescue squad and notified Fond du Lac county authorities. Members of the rescue squad sped to the scene in the Kewaskum equipment truck and ambulance and assisted in the operation to recover the body.

Huettl's body was recovered in approximately 25 feet of water by Walter Ormann, a member of the West Bend rescue squad, who was at the lake at the time, in a boat owned by a Milwaukeean, Norman Laskey. Efforts to revive him proved futile. The local rescue squad members worked over the body until a Campbellsort physician pronounced him dead. Members of the Mauthe lake park patrol, the Fond du Lac courty highway patrol. Kewaskum rescue squad and other volunteers all aided in the search for the youth. It was the first drowning of the year in Fond du Lac county.

Huettl had gone to the lake with Frederick Nell, 27, R. 1, Juneau, a farmer for whom the youth worked, and William Lindert, 15, Beaver Dam. Coroner Frank H. Decker of Fond du Lac county said that Huettl swam out beyond a roped off saw him go under once but thought he was fooling. They swam to shore believing he was headed there also. A lifeguard said he saw the youth go under but could not locate the boy.
