Picnic Draws Record Crowd, Huge Success

MORE THAN 5,000 HAMBURGERS, 9,000 BOTTLES OF BEER CONSUMED; PARADE BEST EVER

The annual Firemen-Legion picnic held in Kewaskum Saturday night and Sunday was the "biggest and best" ever held here with several thousand persons attending. Not only did the event attract record crowds but it was the most successful financially in many years and set new highs in the amount of food and refreshments sold.

For an example, over 800 pounds of hamburger meat, which amounted to more than 5,990 hamburgers were sold, added to which were 457 pounds of bratwurst, or around 2,000 bratwurst sandwiches. Between 9,000 and 10,000 bottles of beer, almost 400 cases, were consumed along with 17 half barrels of beer at the tap beer stand. More hamburgers could have been sold but the supply of meat and buns ran out Sunday evening. Bread was rounded up from local stores and when the hamburger was all gone bratwursts were skinned and patted out like hamburgers. Before the picnic ended only bread crusts were left to serve them on and even these were sold.

Cool weather Saturday evening kept the crowd down somewhat but the attendance was more than made up Sunday when huge throngs jammed the park from end to end both in the afternoon and evening. The park was a mass of people and even during the usually quiet supper hour it was well filled.

Saturday evening's entertainment included a rescue demonstration by the Milwaukee Metropolitan Target Area Fire Rescue Service and music by Les Schneider's orchestra.

Sunday's parade was one of the most interesting, colorful and largest ever held here and among the finest seen anywhere in this area this summer. Numerous very favorable comments were received from parade witnesses. Main street from Fond du Lac ave. to the park was jammed with people on both sides to watch the line of march. There were more children entered this year with their specialties and decorated vehicles. Other parade highlights included bands, Lakeland college drill team, visiting firemen and Legion units and men, floats, old cars, novelties, 4-H clubs, organizations and other units.

Sportsmen Oppose Lowering River Level

The monthly meeting of the Kettle Moraine Sportsmen's association of Kewaskum was held Tuesday night at Heisler's tavern and was followed by a lunch.

The main discussion by members was about the lowering of the river level in the village for bathing beach purposes. A vote was taken and the club decided unanimously against allowing the water level to be lowered for bathing or any other purpose. The reason is that the club planted many fish in the river the past year or two and removing the dam gates would allow the fish to escape, ruining their program to improve fishing in the village by cleaning out the river, growing cover and feed for the fish and raising the water level.

The club also discussed their pheasant raising program and decided to release the birds within the next few weeks. Close to 700 birds are being raised in the club's pens just north of town. Membership buttons for 1959 have been received and can be obtained from Leroy Bier. Members favored holding a dance this fall and further announcement on this will be made later.

Raymond Jaeger Dies Of Accident Injuries

Raymond W. L. Jaeger, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester "Spitz" Jaeger of Fond du Lac, formerly of Campbellsport, died at 1:30 a. m. Sunday at St. Agnes hospital in that city of internal injuries he suffered at 1:15 a. m. Saturday when his car left Hwy. 45 near Lake DeNeveu, sideswiped one tree and overturned, striking a large oak tree and uprooting it. The 1954 model convertible was demolished. The young man was a nephew of Raymond Jaeger, Wayne barber.

The car failed to make a curve where 45 intersects with a town road. Gravel marks showed the car was off the road for 54 feet, then on the shoulder for 36 more feet before sideswiping the first tree and continued 24 additional feet to the second.

Jaeger was born Apr. 2, 1937 in the town of Eden. He graduated from Campbellsport high school, where he was a member of the baseball team, and was a senior at Oshkosh State college. His father is well known locally as a former baseball and basketball player with Campbellsport teams.

Funeral services were held at St. Matthew's church, Campbellsport, Wednesday at 10 a. m. Burial was in the parish cemetery.

A car driven by Peter C. Dehler, 22, R. 1, Kewaskum, collided with the rear of an auto driven by Ebba Nelson Geiger, 60, Milwaukee, on Hwy. 45 at Paradise drive at 1:30 p. m. Friday.

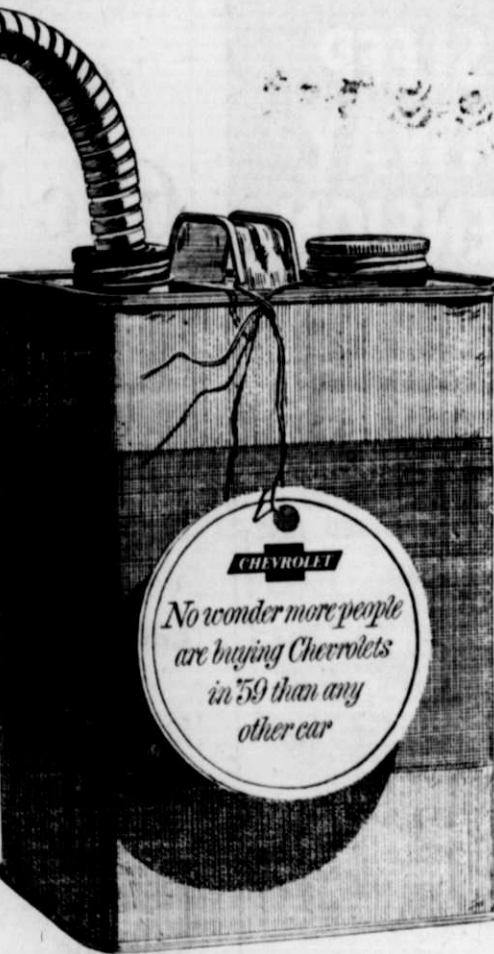

In the annals of Wisconsin leaders, no name shines more brightly than that of Rufus King.

King distinguished himself as a journalist, an educator, a statesman, and a general

He began his career as editor-publisher of the old Milwaukee *Sentinel*, and his pungent editorials helped mold that frontier settlement into a budding metropolis. As Milwaukee's first superintendent of schools and as a University of Wisconsin regent, King made his mark on Wisconsin education. Then he became United States minister to Rome.

When the Civil War broke out, King organized and led Wisconsin's

famed "Iron Brigade," by all odds the outstanding unit in the Union Army.

It is not given to many of us today to be a public servant on the scale of Rufus King. But each of us in our own way can find community tasks that need our time and talents. Community development is an "all hands" job. Only broad public interest and support for a development program can bring sure, sound growth to our city.

Let's "talk up" and "build up" our community. We can't ask George — or Washington — to do it. We're the links in the chain of local progress.

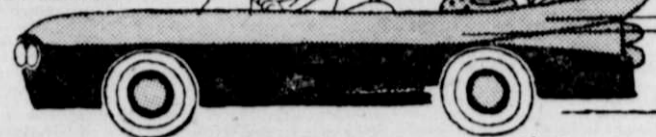

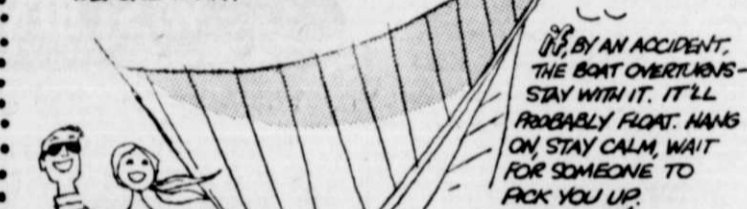
