PROPOSED BUDGET ADOPTED; TAX LEVY FOR OPERATING EXPENSES OF \$125,970.00

July 20, 1959

The budget hearing was called to order by Melvin Riley, director of the Board of Education, with 35 electors present.

The proposed budget was read and explained to the electors.

A motion was made by L. N. Peterson and seconded by Henry Weddig to adopt the proposed budget with \$10,000 taken from the desired bank balance of \$26,660.03, reducing it to \$16,660.03. Motion carried.

It was moved by Henry Rosenheimer and seconded by Marvin Martin to adjourn the budget hearing. Motion carried.

Annual Meeting
July 20, 1959

The annual meeting was called to order by Melvin Riley with 124 electors present.

Mr. Riley called for nominations for chairman of the meeting. Melvin Riley was nominated. It was moved by E. E. Miller and seconded by Elmer Plaum that nominations be closed and that the clerk cast a unanimous ballot for Melvin Riley. Motion carried.

Minutes of the 1958 annual school meeting were read, and on motion by Charles Miller, seconded by William Martin, and carried, were accepted as read.

The auditor's report, prepared by Kannenberg and Marx, was presented by Ralph Marx.

It was moved by Allen Tessar and seconded by Ray Bales to dispense with the reading of the clerk's report. Motion carried.

It was moved by Allen Tessar and seconded by Isadore Stahl to dispense with the reading of the treasurer's report. Motion carried.

The following resolutions were adopted:

Nolting, Kewaskum, visited the University of Wisconsin campus during the past two weeks to register for UW studies to be started with the opening of the university's school year in September. Nancy and Pamela were taking advantage of the UW's advance registration program for new freshmen, now in its third week for this summer. Purpose of the program is to help young people make their transition into university life easier both for themselves and their parents, according to Paul Trump, UW registrar.

This summer's advance registration-orientation program continues through August 14. Under it, the young men and women visit the campus for at least a day, often with either their mothers or fathers or both parents, arrange for their housing if that is not already done, take some placement tests, meet some student leaders and faculty members, and register for their coming university studies designed to lead them into their life careers. They can also make use of the UW's valuable student counseling services.

The new students will return to the UW campus Sept. 9 to continue their orientation and complete their registration for studies. Their classes begin on Monday, Sept. 14.

Mrs. Veronika Raubunas, 61, nee Becalis, who with her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Raubunas, operated Forest Lake resort, R. 2, Campbellsport, under a partnership, passed away on Saturday, July 18, at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, following an illness of one month with carcinoma.

Born Oct. 25, 1897, in Lithuania, Mrs. Raubunas came to this country in 1912. Her marriage to Victor Raubunas took place in Chicago and she was a resident of that city for 38 years before coming with her husband to take over Forest Lake resort in 1949. He died six months later.

Minor 'Twister' Sweeps Through Area Near Here

Persons residing in the area between Kewaskum and Barton reported this week that a minor tornado swept through the area south of the village Saturday afternoon. Heavy rain, but of short duration, accompanied the high winds.

Three trees were uprooted on the William Otten farm, formerly the Roman Strupp farm, southwest of Kewaskum, and corn stalk leaves in the field were shredded by the wind. The "cone" traveled southeast and tore a roof off a playhouse at the John Kuester residence east of the West Bend-Barton Sportsman club before blowing itself out.

The Edward Dorn family, neighbors of the Ottens, also reported seeing the cone in the sky and the wind. Pieces of corn stalks and other debris were reported visible in the cone.

Working on the West Bend-Barton Sportsman's club grounds, Harold Kniekelbein said he saw the cone. He ran for the clubhouse basement for shelter. The cone passed to the north and east of the clubhouse apparently, and struck the Kuester property in passing. Kniekelbein said the cone appeared black from a distance but was of a grey color when it approached closer.

The storm and high wind did not hit Kewaskum and local residents were surprised to hear of the twister sweeping over the nearby area.

RESOLUTION NO. 5—Be it resolved that the salaries of the members of the school board of this district be fixed at \$200.00 per annum.

It was moved by Harvey Janssen and seconded by Ray Bales to adopt resolution No. 5. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 6—Be it resolved by the electors of School District No. 2 or the Kewaskum Community High School that there be furnished free text books to all high school students for the ensuing year, 1959-1960.

It was moved by Alfred H. Seefeldt and seconded by Walter Liepert to adopt resolution No. 6. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 7—Be it resolved by the electors of School District No. 2 or the Kewaskum Community High School that any amount of the \$10,000 in the budget

for site improvement unexpended at the end of the year be set aside in a special reserve fund.

It was moved by Allen A. Tessar and seconded by John R. Tessar to adopt resolution No. 7. Motion carried.

Discussion was held concerning taxes lost through state purchase of farms. It was recommended that electors notify their representatives in the Assembly and the Senate of the problem. The chair then asked for nominations for a school board member to succeed Melvin Riley. Melvin Riley, Dr. Charles Ogi and Allen Tessar were nominated. Dr. Ogi asked to have his name withdrawn. It was moved by John Stellpflug and seconded by Cyril Wietor to close nominations. Motion carried. Melvin Riley was elected to the office.

A vote of thanks was given Mr. Stautz for the years of service he has contributed to the district.

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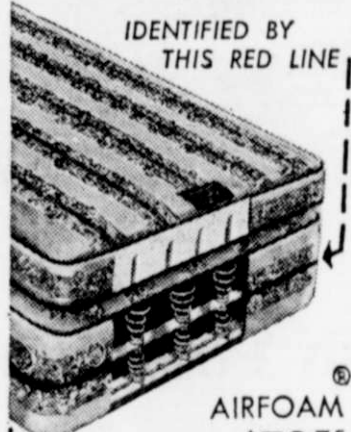
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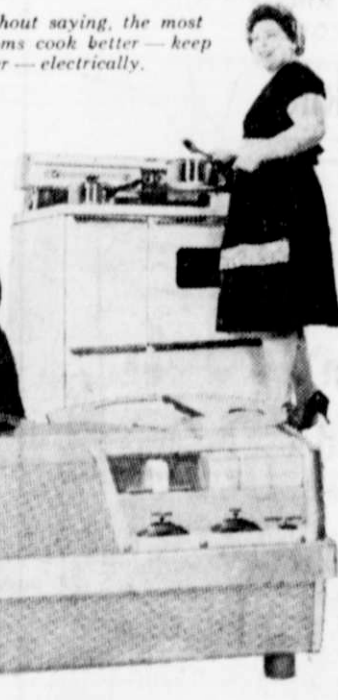

Senate Approves Bill For 2nd County Judge

Unanimously passed by the state senate recently by a vote of 23 to 0 was Bill No. 832A, introduced in the state assembly by Assemblyman Elmer Schowalter at the request of the Washington County Bar association. The bill now requires only the signature of the governor before it becomes effective.

The bill asks additional jurisdiction for the Washington county judge and also requests hiring of an additional county judge for the

county to handle all traffic cases and all ordinance violations in the county.

Establishment of the second branch of the county court to handle traffic cases would eliminate the present procedure of handling such cases by justices of the peace.

1 cup grated Cheddar Cheese
Melt the butter, add green pepper and onion and cook for 3 minutes. Stir the flour into this mixture until blended. Slowly add milk and cook until the sauce is thick, stirring. Add flaked crab meat, from which cartilage has been removed, salt, red pepper, Worcestershire sauce and cheese. Cook and stir these ingredients until the cheese is melted. Fill the tomato cases with this mixture. Bake in 350 degree oven for 10-15 minutes.

PECAN SLICES

9" square pan 375° oven
First Part
1/2 cup (1 stick) butter
1 cup flour
2 Tablespoons water
Mix these ingredients, spread out about 1/4" thick on the pan. Bake at 375° for 15 minutes.
Second Part
1 cup chopped pecans
1 cup coconut, chopped fine
1 1/2 cups brown sugar
2 Tablespoons flour
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
2 eggs (beaten)

Mix all the above ingredients together and spread on crust and bake in 375 degree oven for 25 minutes.

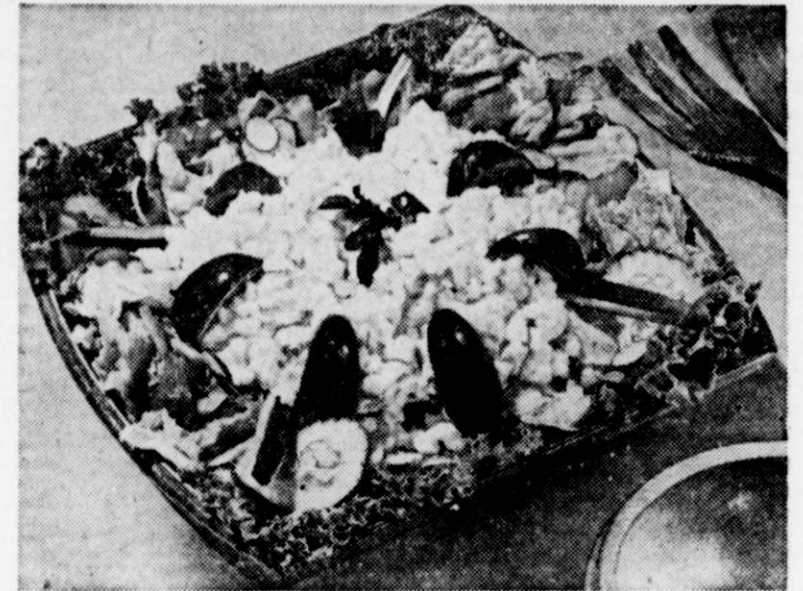
