Swimming Beach To Be Provided At River Here

WORK ON PROJECT WILL BE UNDERTAKEN THIS WEEK END; HELP NEEDED

At the village board meeting Monday evening the project sponscred by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club to provide a swimming beach on the west side of the Milwaukee river in the park area was discussid and board members decided to allow the Kiwanians to go ahead! witt this project.

Work will be undertaken this week end and the beach is expected to be ready for public use almost immediately. Because of the lateness of the swimming season, bath houses will not be constructed anymore this summer. It was also decided against a pier being built. But a raft will be floated, the weeds will be removed, the muck will be blown out with fire hoses and by other means, and sand will be dumped into the river and onto the beach. The Kiwanis club will provide supervision at the beach for the remainder of the swimming

The river water has been tested by the State Board of Health and found to be excellent for swimming. This is partly as a result of a project undertaken by the Kewaskum Sportsmen's club a couple of years ago as part of their fish stocking program. They lowered the water level, removed the debris and weeds, planted wild rice for feed, then raised the river level again before planting thousands of fish. Just last week many more bluegills, perch and crappies removed from Random Lake were planted in the river here. Another reason the water is so clean is because waste from industrial plants no longer flows into the river.

This Saturday and Sunday have been set aside for the preparation of the swimming beach for the children (and adults) of the area. Work will begin and is expected to be completed this week end. All persons interested in helping in this worthy project are urged to lend supervision and physical help. Work shall begin at 9 a. m. Saturday and again at 1 p. m. Sunday. Come if at all possible.

This project is being completed in agreement with the Sportsmen's club and with the approval of the village board with no expense to the village treasury. This is a public beach for you and your family.


