## Miss Leonardelli Hurt In Crash Fatal to Youth

FOUR LOCAL PEOPLE AMONG SIX HURT IN ANOTHER CRASH NEAR VILLAGE

The youngest son of a family well known in Milwaukee labor and sports circles was fatally injured last Friday afternoon when the small foreign car in which he was riding crashed into a parked car in the 7200 block of W. Appleton ave., Milwaukee. Owner and apparent driver of the car, Cheryl Leonardelli, 18, of 4402 N. 76th st., Milwaukee, was seriously injured. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernie Leonardelli, formerly of Kewaskum, who moved to Milwaukee from here within the past year. Ernie was formerly employed at A. G. Koch, Inc.

Fatally injured in the crash was Jerome J. Allen, 17, of 1539 N. 49th st., who died of head injuries at County General hospital, Milwaukee shortly after the accident. Another passenger, Sandra Lee Sorce, 18, of 1906 E. Capitol Dr., suffered possible internal injuries.

Allen was the son of Robert K. Allen, coordinator of union affairs for Local 9, AFL-CIO United Brewery Workers. He was a brother of Bob Allen, publicity director for the Milwaukee Braves, who was a former outstanding cross country runner at Marquette university.

The mishap, which occurred at about 4:10 p. m., came as Miss Leonardelli, Miss Sorce and Allen were enroute to their jobs at Mark's Big Boy, a hamburger restaurant. The young people had spent the day on a horseback riding outing at Lake Beulah.

Miss Leonardelli and Allen were unconscious when they were rushed to the hospital. Miss Sorce told police she was asleep in the back seat of the auto at the time of the accident. Police said Miss Leonardelli regained consciousness briefly at the hospital, then lapsed back into unconsciousness. Miss Sorce told police Miss Leonardelli was driving when the trio left the lake and was still at the wheel when Miss Sorce woke up briefly about 30 minutes before the crash. Witnesses said that after the accident they saw Allen slumped over the wheel and the Leonardelli girl in the front seat next to him.

Young Allen would have been a senior in September at Washington High school. Like his four older brothers, he was a trackman, specializing in cross country and the mile run.

Six persons were hurt at 12:45 a. m. last Thursday in a two car crash on Hwys. 45 and 28 at the north village limits. The mishap happened at a barricade on the highway when a northbound car driven by Harold W. Gudex, 31, of Campbellsport swung around the barricade on the highway and collided with a southbound auto driven by Leonard E. Rindt, 39, of Kewaskum.

Injured in the crash were Daniel Rindt, 16, Clintonville, bruises on leg; James Rindt, 12, Kewaskum, bruises; Jack Rindt, 8, Kewaskum, bruises; Florence Rindt, 36, Kewaskum, injuries to mouth and teeth; Harold Gudex, bruises, and Leonard Rindt, bruises.

## Chest X-Ray Survey to Extend County-Wide

MOBILE UNIT WILL VISIT KEWASKUM OCT. 7-8

Washington county public health nurse, Miss Veronica Frigo, announced Monday that the State Board of Health mobile unit will make its free chest x-rays available to all adult citizens of the county at the end of its West Bend schedule, which will continue there until Sept. 3. Stops will be made throughout the county as shown by the program listed below. Certain of the larger industrial plants will also be visited.

Miss Frigo emphasized that the free chest x-rays and the service of taking of blood pressure will be offered to all who visit the centers with older age groups particularly encouraged to participate. All adult county citizens may visit the bus when it arrives in their district or may come to the open centers to be held in West Bend, if that is more convenient. In cooperation with the National Foundation, pamphlets will be distributed reminding citizens to obtain protection against polio with the Salk vaccine.

### Class in Mother, Baby Care Opens Sept. 21

The West Bend Chapter of the American Red Cross, which conducts classes in mother and baby care three times a year, is now taking applications for the next class which opens Monday evening, Sept. 21, at 7:30 o'clock. The meeting place will be the Red Cross headquarters, Library building, second floor, West Bend.

There is no fee for the classes which are open to mothers, prospective parents, or anyone interested in learning more about mother and baby care. The course is made possible through contributions to the Red Cross at fund campaign time.

The September class conducted in cooperation with the public health nurses of Washington county and the city of West Bend, covers six two hour periods. Related movies through the State Department of Public Health will be shown.

Mrs. Harold Fischer, registered nurse and authorized instructor will be in charge of the class. Subjects covered during the 12 hour period will include Care of the Mother, Reasons for Early Medical Care, Hygiene and Nutrition, Prepara-

tions for the Baby's Birth, General Care of the Infant, and Growth and Development.

It is suggested that persons interested register soon. In the spring class 17 mothers were enrolled. Mothers are advised to talk to their family doctor about the class.

Enrollment may be made by phoning Miss Veronica Frigo, Washington county public health nurse, FE 4-5158; Mrs. Louise Hoy, West Bend city public health nurse, FE 4-2179; Mrs. Harold Fis-

cher, instructor, FE 4-3175, or the Red Cross headquarters, FE 4-5687.

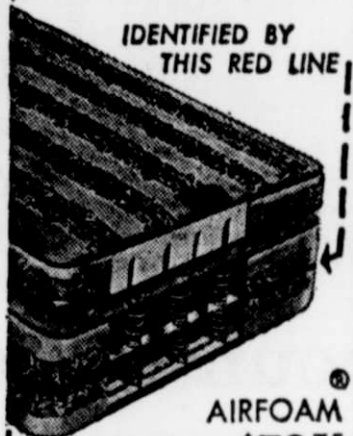

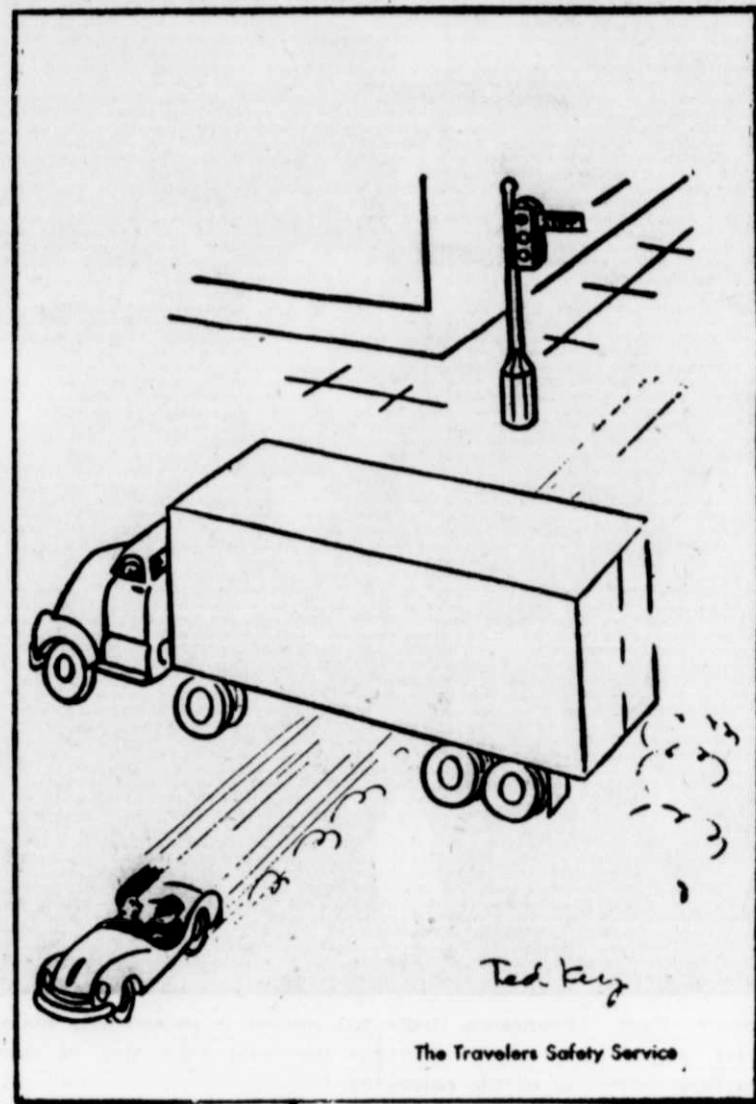

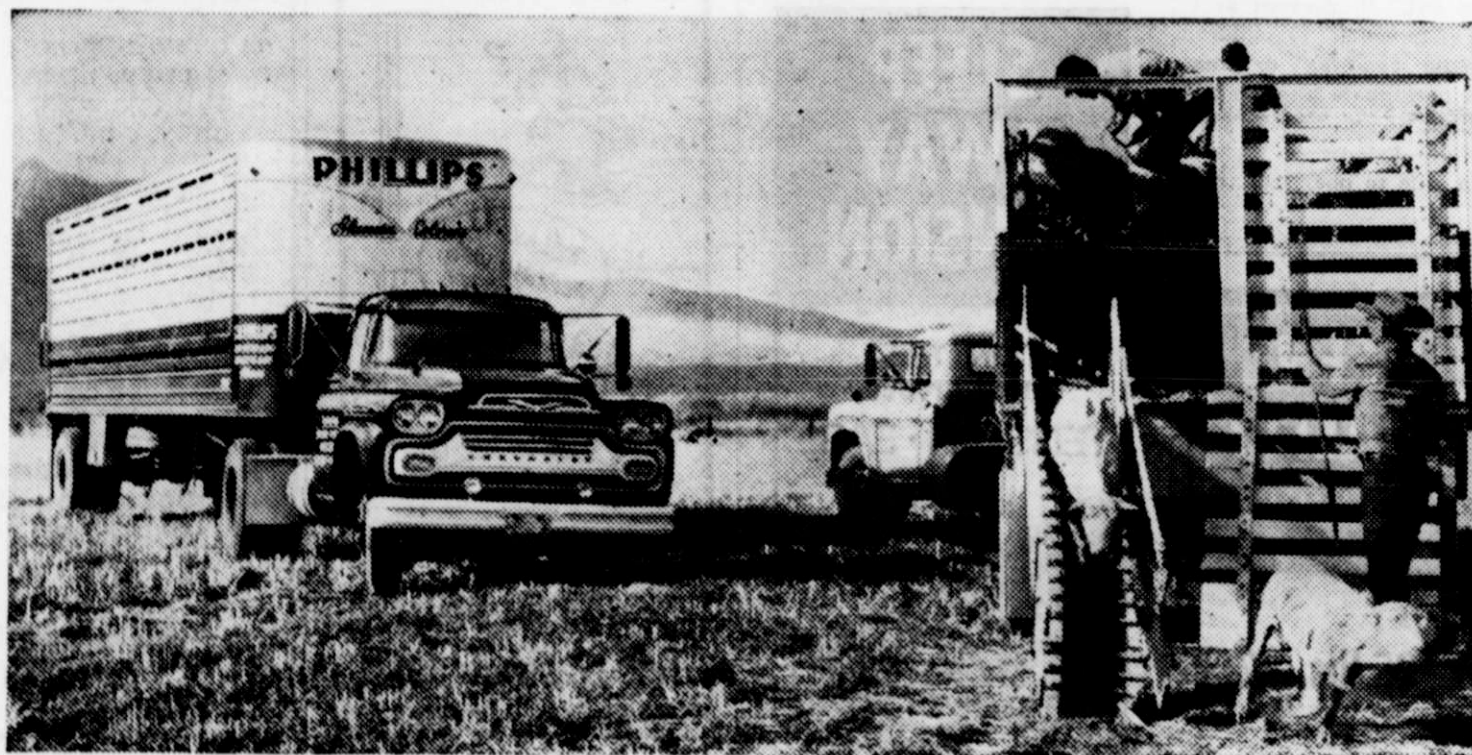

## Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

Mrs. Erwin Justman of Hartford informs me that most of the young martins starved to death this summer in that area because, of cold, wet weather and a very poor hatch of insects. Apparently the old ones had all they could do to keep alive.

The Kettle Moraine Sportsman club, Kewaskum, and the Richfield club released their pheasants this past week.

Pheasants hatched in the wild and Hungarian partridge are hard to find, apparently that last bad storm in the month of March destroyed some of the breeding stock. It did one good thing, however, brought the number of opossum in the county to a new low.

As of today, thirty-five deer have been killed by train or car on the highway this year. This would not include those reported hit on the road and never found.

A number of skunks are reported wandering in the cities of the county. This is the time of year they dig for grubs on well sprinkled lawns.

The time is at hand to purchase hunting licenses as current hunting and sportsman's licenses all expire on Aug. 31.

So you are sure to purchase the

proper license, we call your attention to the following:

1. To be eligible to buy a resident license, you must have been a resident of Wisconsin for at least 12 full months next preceding the date of application.
2. If you do not qualify as above, it may be possible for you to buy a settler's hunting license if you have resided in Wisconsin for at least 60 days and either purchased or rented property and intend to make Wisconsin your legal residence. The fee for settler's hunting license is the same as resident licenses. There is no settler's fishing license available.
3. Sportsman's licenses which cover small game hunting, big game hunting, fishing and trapping, all in one license, are available for a minimum fee of \$19.00. Any applicant may, at his option, pay an additional fee.
4. The fee for resident small game hunting license is \$3.00, resident deer hunting license \$4.00, resident fishing license \$2.00 and trapping license \$2.00.
5. It is unlawful for anyone to charge or accept any additional fee for his services in issuing any license.

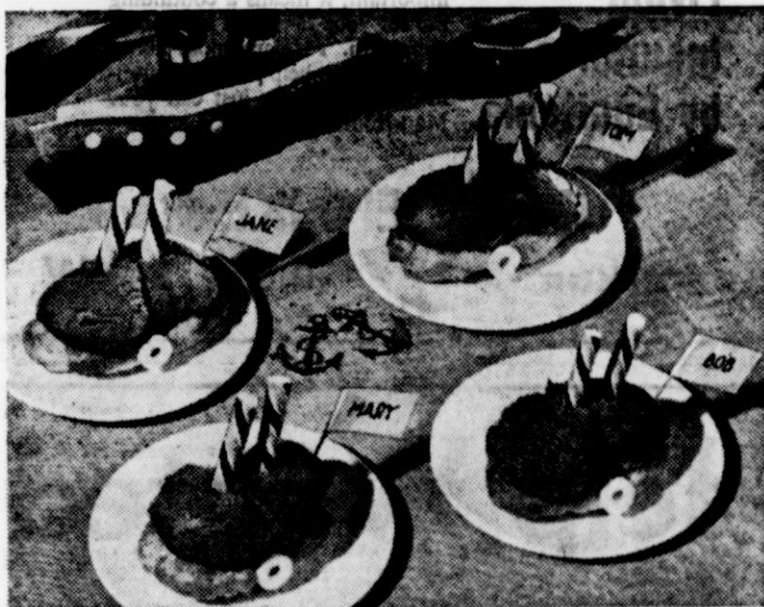

## ICE CREAM FILLED ECLAIRS LEND NAUTICAL TOUCH TO KIDDIE PARTY



Lives there a child who doesn't love boats?

Whether it's a boat to float in the bathtub or food shaped like a boat, the idea of watercraft goes over big with the kiddies.

These chocolate eclair boats are wonderful refreshments for a children's party. The whole affair can be built around a nautical theme. It is a motif suitable any time of year.

Boat-shaped eclairs are easily formed with the aid of a table-spoon or spatula. Instead of shaping the pastry into circles as for cream puffs, shape the portions into long, slender rectangles.

There are two keys to success in making eclairs. One is in the cooking—be sure to have the water mixture boiling when the flour is added. Stir well until flour-water mixture forms a ball.

The other is in the beating. Add the eggs one at a time and beat well after each addition. Be certain each egg is beaten in completely before adding another. Proper beating incorporates sufficient air in the batter.

The recipe yields 12 eclairs. Each eclair may be cut in half lengthwise to make two boats. Any extra eclairs can be frozen and kept for a future dessert.

Chocolate ice cream is the perfect filling for the light, delicate eclairs. Youngsters love

ice cream and chocolate ranks as a favorite flavor.

Besides, how could a kiddie party be a success without ice cream?

### CHOCOLATE ECLAIR BOATS

12 eclairs

- 1 cup water
- ¼ cup butter
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 1 cup sifted flour
- 4 eggs

Chocolate ice cream  
Peppermint stick candy  
Peppermints

Combine water, butter and salt in a saucepan. Bring to a boil. Add flour all at once and stir until blended and the batter stays in the shape of a ball and clings to the pan in one piece. Remove from heat. Add eggs, one at a time, mixing well after each addition. Shape into long rectangles on a well greased cookie sheet, using a table-spoon or spatula to shape the batter. Bake in a pre-heated 450° oven for 10 minutes, then reduce heat to 375° and bake 20-30 minutes longer or until the eclairs are puffed up and browned. Remove from oven, slit to allow steam to escape and cool on a cake rack. When ready to serve, cut eclairs in half lengthwise and fill each half with chocolate ice cream. Stick peppermint candy sticks into the ice cream for the smokestacks and place a peppermint on each side. Flags with the guests names may be stuck into the ice cream also.

## EFFICIENT FEEDING AND LIVESTOCK MANAGEMENT



By Dr. Gustav Bohstedt  
Emeritus Professor of Animal Husbandry

### Salt And Nature Beat The Heat

Nature provides an important safeguard against heat sickness during hot weather in the process of perspiration. It helps cool the body through evaporation of moisture from the skin.

If all sweat pores of an active person were suddenly closed, a feverish temperature would soon develop. The fever would not be merely uncomfortable but actually dangerous to the health of the individual.

While protecting the body from dangerous fever, perspiration carries a lot of salt out of the body and can lead to serious salt-deficiency. There are nearly three grams of salt in every pint of perspiration—that would be for every pound loss in weight. Hard workers, such as farm workers and athletes can easily lose 4 or 5 pounds in perspiration during a few hours, therefore nearly half an ounce of salt. If the salt is not replaced the body functions are distinctly below par.

Symptoms of salt-deficiency heat exhaustion are dizziness, nausea, fatigue, and muscle cramps.

With these disabling symptoms it is no wonder so many men working on scaffolds during the construction of Hoover Dam in the desert of Arizona lost their lives because of salt deficiency in their bodies. These tragic accidents were stopped when the cause was determined and generous amounts of salt were supplied to the workers.

In the case of farm workers, construction workers and athletes, the hot weather salt-loss is drastic and usually must be remedied by means of salt tablets, salted drinking water, or very heavy use of salt with meals.

Persons engaged in less rigorous work, however, should also take care to avoid salt deficiency. A little more salt with meals should suffice.

As I said in last year's warning against dangers of heat exhaustion, let us take our cue from the horse, a sweating animal, and use the kind of horse sense demonstrated in a Michigan State University test where 12 horses averaged less than one ounce of salt daily per head during the more or less idle and cool season but increased it voluntarily to more than three ounces of salt during the summer harvest season.

Incidentally, a fine little booklet "Salt In Your Diet" gives a rather complete explanation of this subject. If you would like a copy of the booklet just mail your request to me at 221 North LaSalle St., (Room 507), Chicago 1, Illinois. The booklet is informative, interesting and there is no charge.

**Question:** Should steers on pasture be full-fed or limited-fed corn for most profit?

**Answer:** With good pasture you may feed limited amounts of corn. In Nebraska tests the cattle that got a half feed of grain on pasture gained as rapidly and more economically than did control lots that were full-fed on either pasture or in dry lot. They sold slightly lower and dressed slightly lower, but made the most money considering costs.

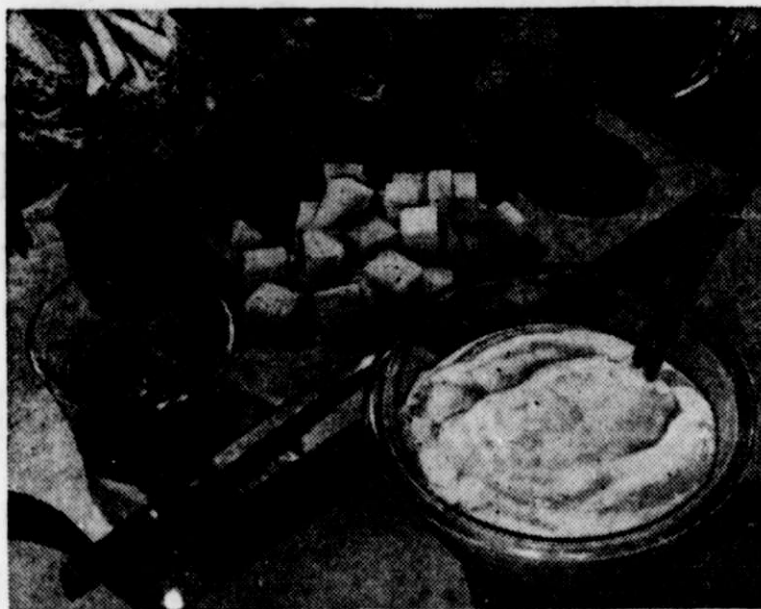
