## Public Schools to Open Sept. 8 with Record Enrollment of 350 in High School; 104 Freshmen Registered

### 8 New Teachers On Staff of 31 Engaged for Term

#### SECOND TEACHER EMPLOYED FOR LARGE FIRST GRADE OF 50 STUDENTS

The Kewaskum Public schools will open on Tuesday, Sept. 8, at 9:00 o'clock, with a record enrollment expected. The grade and high school cafeterias will start operating on Wednesday, Sept. 9. Lunches for the remaining three days of the first week of school will be 75c and must be paid for on Tuesday, the first day of school.

It is the hope of the administration that parents will insist that their children be in regular attendance. It is only through regular attendance that children maintain a high interest in school and school activities. Regular attendance usually reflects a higher degree of performance.

Parents of children who will be attending kindergarten and who have not registered for them are asked to do so on or before Sept. 1. Parents of kindergarten youngsters will be informed which session children will be assigned to attend.

The kindergarten and grades one, two and split grade three will be housed in the new grade school building. All others, grades three through eight, and special education will be housed in what was formerly the high school building.

Due to increased enrollment in grade one a second teacher will be employed for that grade. It is expected that at least 50 students will be enrolled in first grade. The elementary staff for the coming year is as follows:

The new people in the elementary school are Bethel Ebersold, who has been teaching in the elementary grades at Slinger the past two years, and will teach the combination grade two and three; Carl Rosenau, who replaces Richard Guse as teacher of grade six; Thomas Larsen, who replaces James Morrissey as teacher of grade eight, and Mrs. Mildred Larsen, who replaces Geraldine Sinclear as teacher in the special education room.

The new teachers in the high school are Clyde Brehm, a graduate of the University of Wisconsin, who has been teaching in the Black Earth schools the past two years, replacing Theodore Sinclear as instructor of instrumental music in the grades and high school; John Lutz, a graduate of Concordia college of River Forest, Ill. and who spent this past year working on his master's degree in London, England, will teach vocal music in grades and high school; Richard Kirk, a graduate of Northern Illinois university and who for the past two years has been teaching in the high school in Wichita, Kansas, will teach English and direct the dramatics program. Mr. Kirk is an additional teacher on the staff. Veronica Nelson, a graduate of the Wisconsin State college at Oshkosh, replaces Mrs. Guse as librarian and teacher of English.

## Reuben Schultz Jr. Killed When Auto Hits Bank

### SIX YOUNG LADIES BOUND FOR STATE FAIR ALSO INJURED IN CRASH

Reuben Frederick Schultz, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Reuben P. Schultz of the town of Kewaskum, who reside on a farm about four miles northeast of the village, died of injuries he sustained early last Friday, Aug. 21, in an auto accident at the intersection of Hwy. 45 and County Trunk Highway H about 1½ miles south of Kewaskum.

According to the sheriff's report of the accident, Schultz was traveling west on CTH H when he apparently fell asleep at the wheel of his car. The vehicle ran across Hwy. 45 at the intersection, hit a ditch and plunged into an embankment, then bounded into a potato patch near the Leroy Muckerheide home where it came to a stop right side up on its wheels. There were no skid marks at the scene.

Being some distance off the road, the car was not discovered until morning, several hours after the mishap, when it was seen by a passing motorist who found Schultz' body in the wreckage. The young man suffered head, chest and internal injuries and lost a large amount of blood. Schultz was pronounced dead at the scene and his body was brought to Miller's Funeral home in the firemen's ambulance. The front, underside of the car was damaged.

Schultz' death was the ninth traffic fatality in Washington county this year.

Schultz was born at Milwaukee on July 25, 1937 and graduated from Kewaskum High school with the class of 1954. He served in the U. S. Navy two years and was employed at the West Bend Aluminum Co. at the time of his death. The young man lived with his parents on R. 1, Kewaskum.

Surviving are his parents, a sister, Carole Jean, 17; a brother, Richard, 10; his maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Klein, Sr. of R. 1, Kewaskum; his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry J. Schultz of Kewaskum; uncles, aunts, cousins and many other relatives and friends.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral home from 2 p. m. Sunday until 11 a. m. Monday and at St. Lucas Lutheran church from 12 noon until 2 p. m. Monday when services were conducted by the Rev. Donald Bitter. During the service Wallace Cudnehoske sang a vocal solo, "Asleep in Jesus." Burial was in Lutheran Memorial Park. The Robert Romaine American Legion post of Kewaskum conducted military services at the grave.

## 25 Years Ago

Two of the young men had gone down twice before Jaeger reached them. First aid revived them. Cyril Wietor clung to Mrs. Jaeger's neck while Mr. Jaeger dragged her to safety. "I knew Mr. Jaeger would save his wife so I hung onto her. I wanted to be saved, too," Cyril told witnesses.

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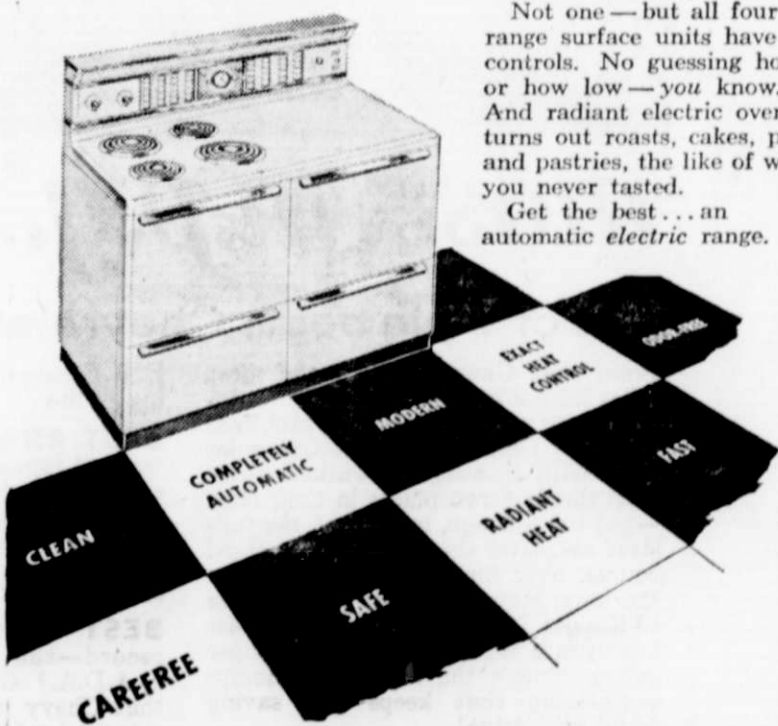

Camp Wawbeek's final group of campers this summer arrived Aug. 23 for a two week stay. The camp's last period is reserved for severely disabled people who come to the camp with attendants. About 60 handicapped teenagers and adults made the trip to the Wisconsin Dells' Camp.

A fully equipped craft shop and photo lab, recreation rooms, picnic and camp-out grounds, game courts and a specially designed swimming pool are among the facilities which help make the campers' vacation active and varied.

Over the summer about 600 physically handicapped children and adults spend two weeks at the camp.

Operated by the Wisconsin Easter Seal society and financed mainly through funds received during the annual Easter Seal drive, Camp Wawbeek has been a vacation spot for the handicapped for twenty-two years.

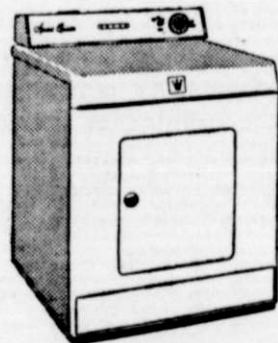

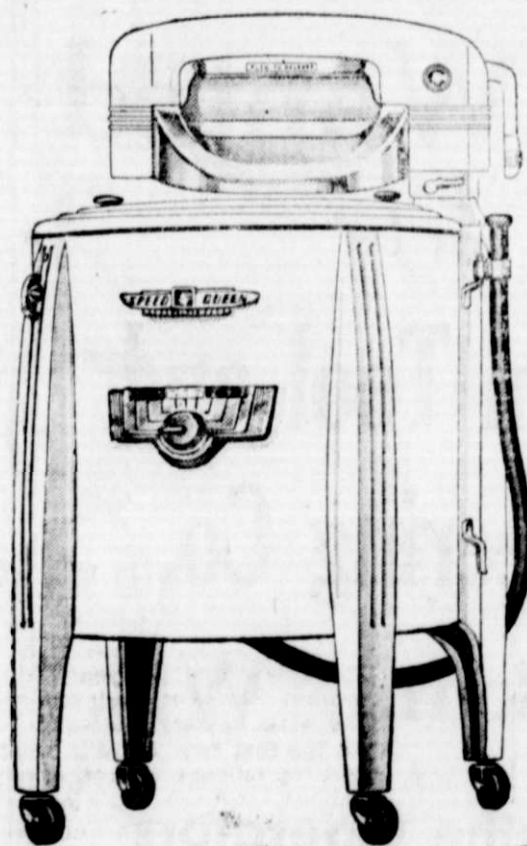

Homer Schaub, representing the local Sportsmen's Club, opposed the lowering of the river level in conjunction with this proposed project unless a suitable screen be provided to prevent the fish life from being carried down stream. The Sportsmen's Club was assured such a screen would be provided.

Mrs. Marie Del appeared to request an extension of the tavern closing hour to 2:00 a. m. during daylight saving time. When discussion disclosed that nearly all of the surrounding communities had extended the closing hour as provided by state law, the following

ordinance was introduced by Trustee Tessar:

ORDINANCE NO. 59-3  
THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM, WASHINGTON COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 11.01 (19) (c) (3) is hereby amended to read as follows:

"No premises for which a retail Class "B" Liquor and Malt Beverages license has been issued shall be permitted to remain open for the sale of liquor or malt beverages or for any other purpose between the hours of 2:00 A. M. and 8:00 A. M. during daylight saving time, and 1:00 A. M. and 8:00 A. M. during central standard time, as said time is adopted by the State of Wisconsin, except on January 1, when the closing hours shall be between 3:00 A. M. and 8:00 A. M."

Ordinance No. 59-3 introduced and its adoption moved by Trustee J. Eberle and seconded by Trustee H. Becker.

Upon roll call of the vote hereon by Ayes and Nays the result was follows: Votes Cast 7, Voting Aye 7, Voting Naye 0.

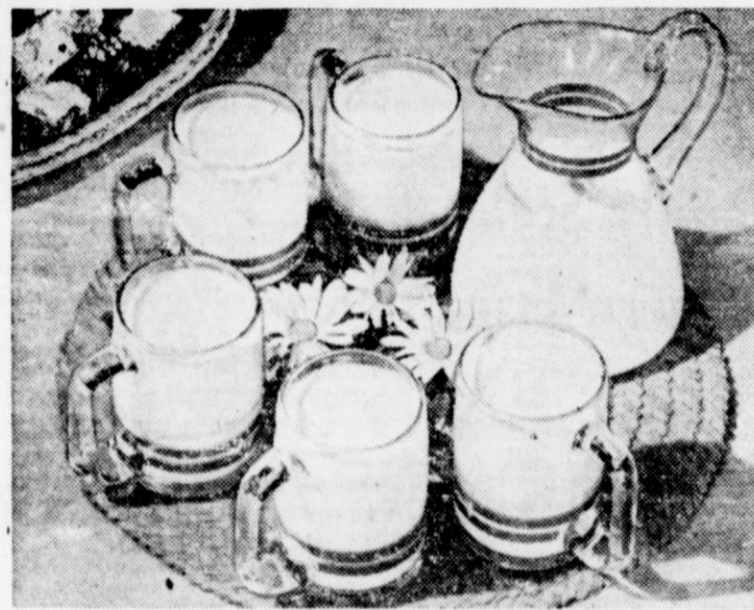
