368 in High School, 358 in Grades Set All-Time High Enrollment of 726 Pupils

Enrollment 65 Above Last Year; 103 Freshmen

The Kewaskum Community High school and public schools opened on Tuesday with another record enrollment of 726 pupils, which total far exceeds last year's figure of 661 by 65 pupils.

The enrollment in high school is 368, 32 over last year's total of 336. Enrollment in the grades is 358, 33 over last year's figure of 325. Attendance in both set new highs. The freshman class this year numbers 103 students, 11 fewer than last term's record 114.

The 726 pupils in the public schools, added to the 244 enrolled in Holy Trinity Parochial school, makes a total of 970 children attending school in the village, which is getting very close to the 1,000 mark.

The increase in the grades is partly a result of many pupils transferring to Kewaskum from outlying districts which have closed their schools. There is ample room for the increased enrollment in the new high school building, the grades in the former high school building, and the kindergarten pupils in the new kindergarten building.

The staff of 31 teachers, including eight new ones, was listed in a previous issue.

Following is a breakdown of the enrollment in each of the various classes in the high school and grades, together with the names of the freshmen, first graders, kindergarten pupils and new students who transferred from other schools:

Holy Trinity School Opens With Gain in Enrollment to 244

Holy Trinity Catholic school opened on Wednesday morning with another increase in enrollment to 244 pupils, a gain of four over last year's total of 240. On Wednesday, which was orientation day, there was only a half day of school and classes were dismissed at 11:15 a. m.

Twenty-nine children started school in the first grade, a decrease from last year's total of 37. There were three transfers to Holy Trinity from other schools.

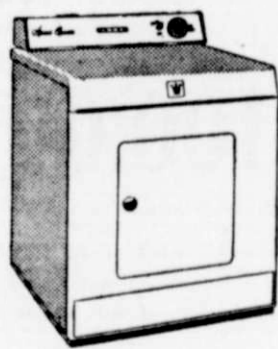

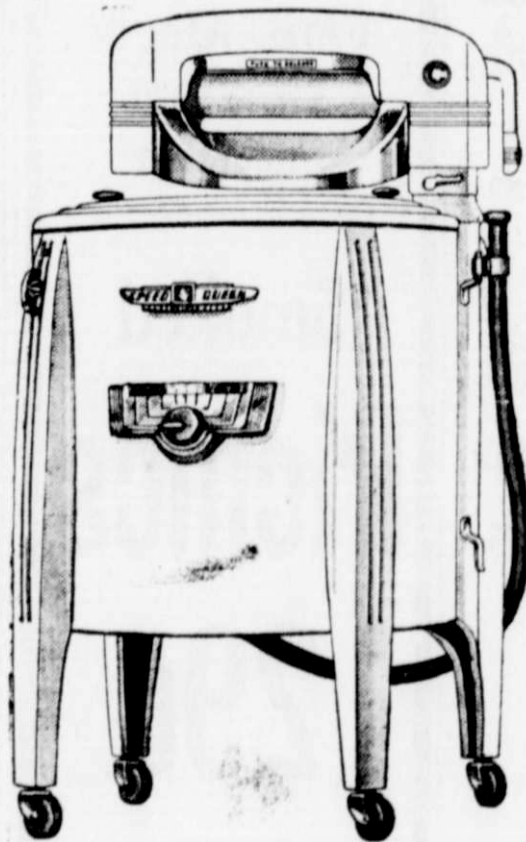
