Annual Kiwanis Club Live Turkey Shoot at Bar-N Ranch Sunday

40 INDIAN DANCERS TO CAMP IN TEPEES ON GROUNDS; TROUT FISHING, OTHER EVENTS TO BE HELD

The Kewaskum Kiwanis club will sponsor its seventh annual live turkey shoot on Sunday, Sept. 20, at the Bar-N Dude Ranch, 6 miles northeast of Kewaskum on County Trunk GGG, the beautiful Kettle Moraine Drive.

Patterned after the historic turkey shoots which were so popular in frontier days, this fascinatingly interesting annual event has become an outstanding attraction. Thousands of men, women and children from all over the state, coming from as far as 100 to 125 miles, attend as participants and spectators. Last year the event had nearly 2,500 shooters and over 250 birds were taken home.

The turkey shoot is handled as follows: large live tom turkeys are protected behind an earthen bunker at the end of the rifle range with only their heads exposed to the marksman. For a fee of \$1.00 for three shots (four shots on advance sale tickets) the marksman attempts to hit the turkey's head from the firing line, using a .22 rifle. The turkey he hits is the turkey he gets for the family larder. Rifles and ammunition are furnished.

The live trout fishing contest that proved to be so popular at the 1958 event, will be repeated with improved facilities. Not only will there be prizes for those catching the largest fish, but the fisherman will be allowed to keep all the fish he catches.

Other events include trap and deer rifle target shooting. Sportsmen desiring to enter these events bring their own shotguns, rifles and ammunition. An authentic cross-bow direct from Switzerland will be used in a target event. Here's an opportunity for you Robinhood admirers to test your skill. In addition, there are games for every member of the family to enjoy. Shelter, hot and cold food and beverages will be available.

Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

Washington County Conservation Warden and area headquarters at Oshkosh

Ollie Marx, operator of a shooting game farm in Sheboygon county, lost a number of pen raised pheasants. After a number of dead birds were examined, he found they were eating the flower from the burdock. The burdock would become stuck between the crop and the gizzard and the bird died of starvation. I wonder how many die in the wild that way?

The bear season will open in eight northwestern counties on Sept. 19 and continue until Oct. 15. In addition to your license, a permit is required to carry a rifle in these counties during that season. I have such permits and will be glad to issue them at any reasonable hour. Purchase your hunting license first.

John Thiermann, R. 5, Thiensville, reports that a mink killed sixty of his chickens in one night. Needless to say the animal was destroyed.

Jack Wilson, Fredonia, had a chance to watch a weasel attempt to catch recently released pheasants near the club pens.

Morning doves have started their migration. Flocks of ten to twenty each can be seen feeding in the stubble fields daily. On one-half mile of town road south of Allenton, over one hundred birds were counted sitting on the electric

lines. It seems a shame that with the possibility of a poor hunting season the Wisconsin hunter has never requested a season on this sporty shooting and fine eating game bird. Particularly, since the U. S. Fish and Wildlife allows a season each year, and the bird is legal game from the time it crosses the Wisconsin-Illinois line to the Gulf of Mexico.

The early bow and arrow season this fall will be from Sept. 19 through Nov. 10. These dates are similar to those of last year. The late season this year is from Dec. 5 through Dec. 31 and this, too, is statewide. Hunting hours for deer are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

Each year more bow and arrow hunters are finding themselves in difficulty with the law. The three laws most violated are as follows:

1. It is unlawful to carry a bow and arrow in or on any automobile or vehicle unless it is unstrung or enclosed within a carrying case.
2. It is unlawful to have in possession or under control, a bow and arrow, in or on any vehicle or automobile while shining any wild animal.
3. It is unlawful to have in possession or under control any gun or firearms at any time while hunting, killing, or pursuing game with bow and arrow during the open season for hunting deer with bow and arrow only.

The time is again with us when hunters will be looking for a place to hunt waterfowl and some will be building their blinds. A few words of caution are in order.

Wisconsin regulations prohibit

the hunting of any ducks, geese, coot, rails or gallinules from open water. Open water is defined as any water outside or beyond a natural growth of vegetation extending over the water surface and of such height as to offer partial or whole concealment for the hunter. Therefore, if you build your blind in open water, you will be in violation to hunt from it. Also, if you build your blind where there are very few weeds and these weeds die or freeze down, you will be in violation to hunt from it.

Another word of caution. If you build a blind on the water, it is also your responsibility to remove it at the end of the hunting season.

Section 29.288 of the Wisconsin Statutes prohibits the placing or leaving of any solid waste material in any waters or on the ice. Violation of this section carries a fine of up to \$100.00 plus revocation of all licenses for one year.

Waterfowl hunters in Wisconsin will have a 50-day duck season this year with dates set for Oct. 7 through Nov. 25. It was announced today by the Wisconsin Conservation Department.

Bag limit will be three daily and six in possession. The limit may include one wood duck but the aggregate limit may not include more than one of the following species: canvasback, redhead and

Village Board Accepts New Group Insurance Plan for Employees

Adjourned Meeting
September 2, 1959

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in adjourned session with President Reigle presiding. Trustees Merwin, Schwind, Eberle and Tessar were present. Trustees Becker and Wietor were absent.

Mr. Patrick May presented a proposal for hospitalization and surgical group insurance under the Wisconsin Physicians Service of Madison, Wis.

Upon motion by J. Schwind, seconded by A. Merwin and duly carried, the Board went on record as follows: (1) That the village cancel its Associated Hospital Service group insurance and in its stead accept the proposal of the Wisconsin Physicians Service for hospitalization and surgical group insurance. (2) That the premium shall be based upon the following conditions: (a) hospital room and board \$12.00 per day, (b) maternity care ten (10) times selected room benefit, (c) no schedule surgical benefits up to \$1000.00, (d) outpatient radiation therapy. (3) That the Village pay the full premium for single person policy for all full time employees. If an employee wishes a family group policy, the additional premium shall be paid by employee. The Village shall pay one-half (1/2) of the single person policy premium for all part time employees, including librarians. Additional premium for family group policy to be paid by employee. (4) Temporary employees shall not be eligible for group insurance.

The letter of L. Rosenheimer concerning village policy and their objections to changes to be made for the surfacing of streets was presented to the board and placed on file.

Because of the Labor Day holiday, the regular monthly September meeting of the Board will be on Tuesday, September 8th.

Upon motion made, seconded and duly carried, the Board ad-

Upon motion by J. Eberle, seconded by C. Wietor, the Board approved the purchase of approximately 1400 ft. of 24" asphalt covered metal storm sewer pipe from Bark River Culvert & Equipment Company at a cost of \$4.88 per foot.

Upon motion by J. Schwind, seconded by H. Becker and duly car-

ried, the Board approved the purchase of approximately 2000 ft. of cast iron mechanical joint water main from the James B. Clow Co. at a cost of \$2.02 per foot.

Upon motion by A. Merwin, seconded by J. Eberle and duly carried, the Board approved the purchase of approximately 1400 ft. of 16" vitrified clay pipe and 1200 ft. of 8" vitrified clay pipe including necessary wyes from the Streator Drain Tile Co.

The claim of Arnold Butzke for damages to auto tires was tabled.

The renewal of a lease with Louis Klein on a portion of his farm land upon which a Village welcome sign is located, was approved upon motion by J. Eberle, seconded by H. Becker and duly carried.

The Board went on record as favoring the installation of four street lamps on north Fond du Lac Avenue in the area between Miller's Furniture Warehouse and the north village limits.

Upon motion by J. Eberle, seconded by J. Schwind and duly carried, the following applications for operator's license were approved pending the filing of a doctor's physical report with the Village Commissioner:

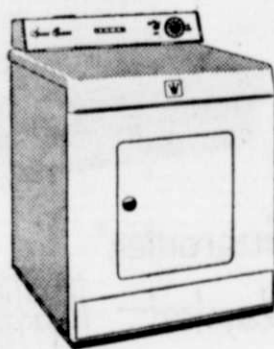

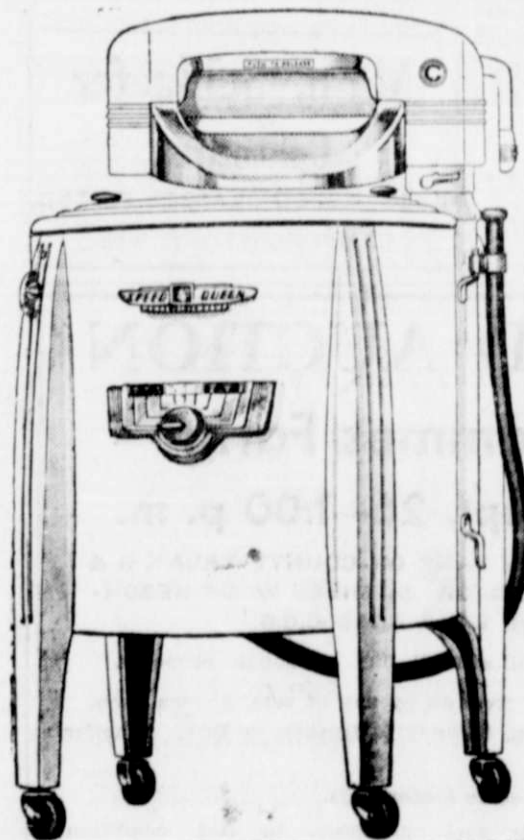

ruddy duck.

The goose season also will open Oct. 7, and like that of last year, will continue for 70 days through Dec. 15. Bag limit on geese will be five daily and five in possession, provided that such limit include not more than two Canada geese or its subspecies.

The Oct. 7 opening is the earliest allowed by the federal government, which sets the framework within which the Wisconsin regulations are fixed. The daily shooting hours of sunrise to sunset (except for a noon opening on the first day) also are the maximum permitted under federal regulations this year.

The Wisconsin waterfowl seasons were set via a telephone poll conducted by Conservation Director L. P. Voigt, among members of the Conservation Commission who unanimously approved the regulations recommended by the Con-

servation Department. Prior to polling the commission, Voigt had received approval of the recommendations from Ed Morse, Jr., of Lancaster, chairman of the Conservation Congress.

The duck season was curtailed from that of the past several years by the Federal Government because of a reduced duck crop brought about by drought in the Canadian nesting areas.

Seasons on jacksnipe and woodcock also were set, with the snipe season to be Oct. 7 through Nov. 5, and woodcock to be Oct. 1 through Nov. 9. Limits on snipe will be eight daily and eight in possession, and for woodcock, four and eight. Shooting hours will be the same as those for waterfowl.

A warning against unauthorized stocking of fish in public waters was issued by Dr. Edward Schenberger, superintendent of the Wisconsin Conservation Department's Fish Management Division. All stocking of fish in public waters is conducted by department personnel, and persons who take it upon themselves to stock fish are liable to arrest. Permits for stocking fish in private waters may be obtained upon application to the department.

Here's a tip for motorists from the AAA Wisconsin Division: Bumper-hugging is a common cause of holiday traffic accidents. Allow one full car length between vehicles for every 10 miles per hour of speed. This will give you plenty of distance to stop in the event of an emergency. Don't forget: following too closely causes more accidents than drinking and speeding combined.

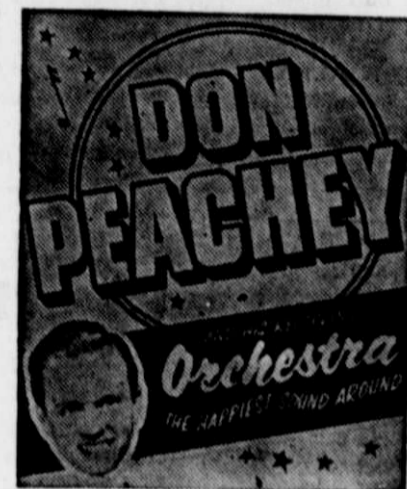
