PLAY OPENING CONTEST AT RANDOM LAKE



The goose season also will open Oct. 7, and like that of last year, will continue for 70 days through Dec. 15. Bag limit on geese will be five daily and five in possession provided that such limit include not more than two Canada geese or its subspecies.

The Oct. 7 opening is the earliest allowed by the federal government, which sets the framework within which the Wisconsin regulations are fixed. The daily shooting hours of sunrise to sunset (except for a noon opening on the first day) also are the maximum permitted under federal regulations this year. The Wisconsin waterfowl seasons were set via a telephone poll conducted by Conservation Director L. P. Voight, among members of the Conservation Commission who unanimously approved the regulations recommended by the Con-






