N. Fondy Trims Indians In Loop Opener, 27-0

The Kewaskum Indians absorbed a 27-0 thrashing in their Scenic Moraine conference opener Friday Jim Johl. The conference win was night on the Oriole gridiron as Loren Blosmore put on a one-man show for the winners.

The victory was Fondy's third in s row and the first in regular conference play. The setback was Kewaskum's second in three games, having been trampled by Kohler the week previous, 38-7, in a nonloop contest. Lacking scoring punch the Indians have scored only 7 points in their last two tilts.

Blosmore made the big difference for North Fondy as he racked SCENIC MORAINE STANDINGS up 122 of the team's 147 yards rushing and scored three of the four touchdowns in doing so. He scored from 19, 25 and 46 yards out on runs through Kewaskum's defense. The first TD of the game was scored by Frank Lamb on a 69yard pass play from Jim Hickey, who also made three of the extra points.

The Indians, a power in the loop last year, who dealt the Orioles two straight losses, didn't have a chance Friday. The team, with a good number of lettermen returning, was expected to be a contender again this season. Against Fondy Kewaskum managed to gain just 59 yards on the ground and 18 in

The North Fondy squad meanwhile put together a 147-yard ground game with 105 yards in the air for a 252-yard figure. Outstand-

ing on defense were Blosmore and the first for the Orioles since the league started last season.

There will be no letup for the Indians this Friday night when they host another strong opponent. the rival Campbellsport Bells, who also won their first two games. The Bells routed Waldo, 27-0, in non-loop action and beat Grafton last week, 19-13. Slinger will be Kewaskum's homecoming opponent on the following Friday, Oct. 16.






