Seefeldt Appointed Farm Census Crew Leader for County

APPLICATIONS FOR CENSUS TAKERS IN COUNTY NOW BEING ACCEPTED

Appointment of Alfred H. Seefeldt, Kewaskum, as a crew leader for the 1959 Census of Agriculture was announced today by Field Director Theodore F. Olson of the Census Bureau's regional office at Chicago.

Seefeldt will direct a force of census takers who will canvass all farms in Washington county. Before assuming his post, he will go to Oshkosh where he will receive five days of training by a member of the Census Bureau's staff. Topics to be covered include procedures for recruiting of census takers, census taker training, canvassing methods, preparation and submission of reports, and the supervision of census takers to insure a complete and accurate count.

The crew leader is one of the key people in the field operations of the Census of Agriculture. It is his responsibility to recruit and train the census takers and supervise their work; plan and allocate work assignments; review the work of the census takers and take remedial action where necessary, and to conduct difficult interviews.

After completing his training, Seefeldt will return to his district where he will spend several weeks recruiting census takers, and training them in preparation for the start of the field canvass on Nov. 4.

Applications for employment as census takers for the 1959 Census of Agriculture in Washington county will be accepted beginning Oct. 16, it was announced by Field Director Olson.

Persons interested in these jobs should notify Alfred H. Seefeldt at R. 1, Kewaskum, telephone 91-W.

Applicants for census taking jobs must be citizens of the United States, have a high school education or furnish evidence of comparable experience, be in good physical health and of excellent character, and be at least 18 years of age. They must have sufficient financial resources to sustain themselves for approximately four or five weeks from the date of appointment until they receive their salary check. Applicants with veteran preference who meet all requirements will be given priority over non-veteran.

Farm census job applicants must be licensed to operate and must provide a privately-owned automobile in good condition. Census takers will be paid 7 cents a mile for official travel.

Edward Schiltz Is Killed Accidentally By Shotgun Discharge

Edward Schiltz, 44, a well known town of Scott farm resident, was killed accidentally by the discharge of a shotgun near his home south of Beechwood on Sunday afternoon, Oct. 11, at about 4:30 o'clock.

It was reported that Schiltz had taken the shotgun into a field to shoot at a pack of stray dogs which had been chasing his farm animals. As he was hurriedly pulling the loaded gun from his car the hammer caught on some object, then sprung back against the firing pin, discharging the weapon. Schiltz received the full force of the blast.

Born Jan. 15, 1915, in the town of Scott, a son of the late Charles and Clara Schiltz, he was a lifelong resident on the Schiltz homestead in that township. His marriage to the former Martha Ebert took place on Jan. 27, 1934, at Trinity Lutheran church, Dundee.

His wife survives, together with one daughter, Dorothy, 21; five sisters, Viola (Mrs. Julius Gessner), R. 1, Kewaskum; Alma (Mrs. Alvin Backhaus), R. 3, West Bend; Mrs. Eleanor Wilm, Caledonia, Wis.; Goldie (Mrs. Fred Zellstra), Hales Corners, and Della (Mrs. Eugene Washburn), West Allis; one brother, Benjamin, Random Lake rural route; two half-brothers, Henry Schiltz, R. 1, Kewaskum, and Herman Rogendorf, West Allis, a half-sister, Mrs. Ernst Bethke, preceded him in death.

Mr. Schiltz was a member of the Beechwood Fire Department.

The body was in state after 2 p. m. Tuesday at Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum. Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday at Trinity Lutheran church, Dundee, the Rev. Norbert Mielke officiating. Burial was in the Beechwood cemetery.

Home Nursing Course On Care of Sick, Injured To Be Given in Village

The West Bend Chapter of the American Red Cross is making available the "Home Care of the Sick and Injured" home nursing course in West Bend beginning Tuesday evening, Nov. 3, and in Kewaskum beginning Tuesday evening, Nov. 10.

The seven two hour lessons will begin at 7:00 o'clock and close at 9:00 o'clock on Tuesday and Thursday evenings. Mrs. Harold Fischer, R. N. will teach the course in West Bend and Mrs. Roland Pledl, R. N. at Kewaskum. Both are authorized Red Cross instructors.

Classes in West Bend will meet at the Library building, second floor, and at Kewaskum in the municipal building, first floor. Registration should be made early with either of the instructors or with the Red Cross headquarters.

Topics for each lesson are as follows: When sickness comes, the patient goes to bed, the clean and well groomed bed patient, food and medication ordered by the doctor, simple treatments ordered by the doctor, home nursing and civil defense, and emergency nursing and survival.

Nearly every family has an illness or injury some time and much of the worry and confusion that often results can be reduced if some members of the family have the knowledge and skill required to give simple home nursing care to the sick or injured.

Doctors are recommending home rather than hospital care for many patients if conditions are favorable. This is especially true when constant attendance by an expert or the use of specialized equipment are not needed. Individual, personalized loving service in a familiar environment—the home—plays an important role in the recovery of the patient.
