Two Local Residents Injured in Car Crash

Two residents of Kewaskum, Arnold Garbisch, 50, and Mrs. Frieda Holzmann, 62, were injured, the latter seriously, in an auto accident at the intersection of Hwy. 45 and County Trunk Highway H south of the village Tuesday night.

The mishap occurred when a car driven by Garbisch, traveling west on CTH H, skidded through the stop sign and across Hwy. 45 and plunged into the ditch on the west side of the highway, striking an embankment. Garbisch was thrown clear of the vehicle, which was badly damaged. Both of the injured were removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance.

Another car, driven by Sylvester Wondra, 28, of R. 2, Kewaskum, traveling behind the Garbisch auto, also braked as he neared the intersection and his car skidded and spun, going into the left ditch at the southeast corner of the intersection of Hwy. 45 and H.

Another accident occurred at the same spot last Friday. William F. Seltrecht, 59, of R. 3, Campbellsport, suffered head injuries when his car traveling west on CTH H, skidded 186 feet on wet pavement across the railroad tracks and went through a stop sign, across Hwy. 45 and into the ditch.

There have been three accidents at this intersection in a short time, one of which proved fatal to a young man from Kewaskum.

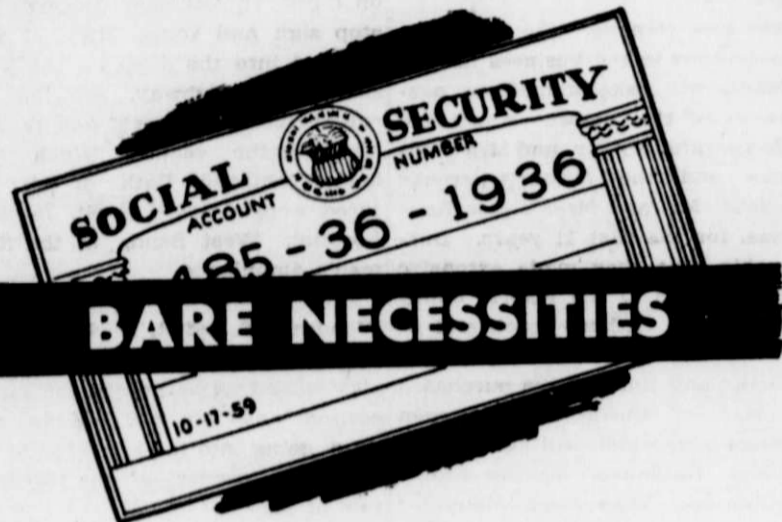

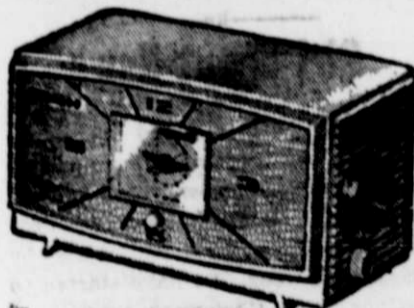
