Indians to Open Cage Season With Cedar Grove Here Tonight

BELLS, ORIOLES FAVORITES IN SCENIC MORAINÉ CONFERENCE

The Kewaskum Community High school Indians will play their 1959-60 basketball season opener in a non-conference game against Cedar Grove here tonight (Friday). An 18-game schedule will be played which includes 12 Scenic Moraine conference tilts and six non-conference contests. Tuesday Oostburg is here. Pre season favorites in the conference are Campbellsport and North Fondy. The Bells, who took the championship last year with a 9-1 record, and advanced into district play in the WIAA tourney before losing out to East Troy, lost only one regular, Phil Schlaefer, the loop's leading scorer. Back are seven lettermen. North Fondy boasts only four lettermen but has a core of experienced juniors back. The Orioles placed second last season with 7-3.

Kewaskum's coach, Walt Bade, has six letter winners back from a team that won only three and lost seven last year and split two other outside games. Most effective of the returnees is Norm Rodenkirch, a senior all-conference forward, who dropped in 162 points in loop play last season to finish fourth in scoring.

Others back include Kons Sadownikow and Tom Bartelt, two juniors who played a good share of the time last year, and three others who played only sparingly—Ken Johnson, Terry Koch and Bob Berg.

Slinger, which finished third with 6-4, has just three experienced boys back. Grafton, which finished fourth, has seven lettermen back and should improve its standing. Germantown's cellar dwellers have their ace scorer, Dick Strack, second high in the loop, and four other letter winners back, plus two new transfers. Pewaukee, new entrant, has just two lettermen back.

The conference has experienced more growing pains with the addition of Pewaukee for basketball. Next fall the loop will be full grown with Random Lake filling out the eighth spot. The league has a short history of fast growth, starting with four teams, North Fondy, Campbellsport, Kewaskum and Slinger. Last season Grafton and Germantown joined the loop and by next year the league will have grown to eight teams.

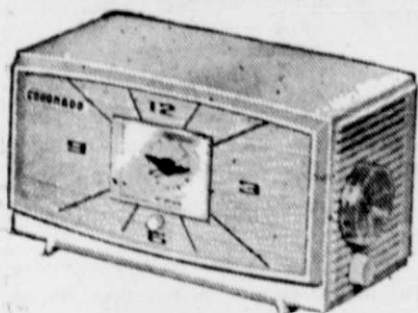

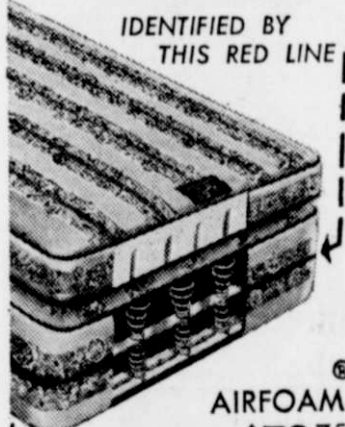

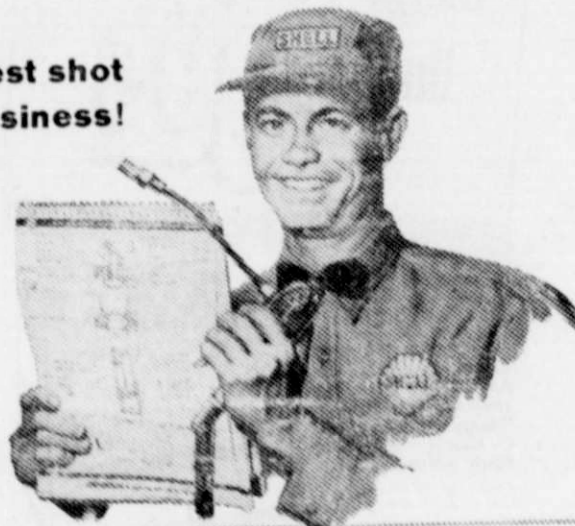

Washington County Conservation Warden and area headquarters at Oshkosh

The deer season opens south of Highway 8, Saturday, Nov. 21. Purchase your hunting license and party permit before midnight of the 20th.

Party permit hunting is prohibited in Washington county. We have an any deer season here.

Deer killed in Washington county must be registered at the Hartford Police Department or the office of the Washington county sheriff. Do not transport deer out of this county until they are registered. Party permit deer killed in Dodge, Fond du Lac, Sheboygan or Ozaukee counties must be registered before they are transported into Washington county. Registration stations are set up at Horicon, Mauthe lake and the office of the Ozaukee county sheriff.

Shooting at deer in the water or on the ice is illegal.

Hunting deer within 200 feet of the center line of any federal, state or county highway is prohibited.

All hunters in Washington and Ozaukee counties must wear red clothing, Nov. 21 to Nov. 29 inclusive. Due to the fact that we have an any deer season in Washington county, it is more important than ever. In the event we are able to prevent the killing or wounding of just one hunter, we feel justified in enforcing this regulation.

Read your hunting regulations before you start your hunt.

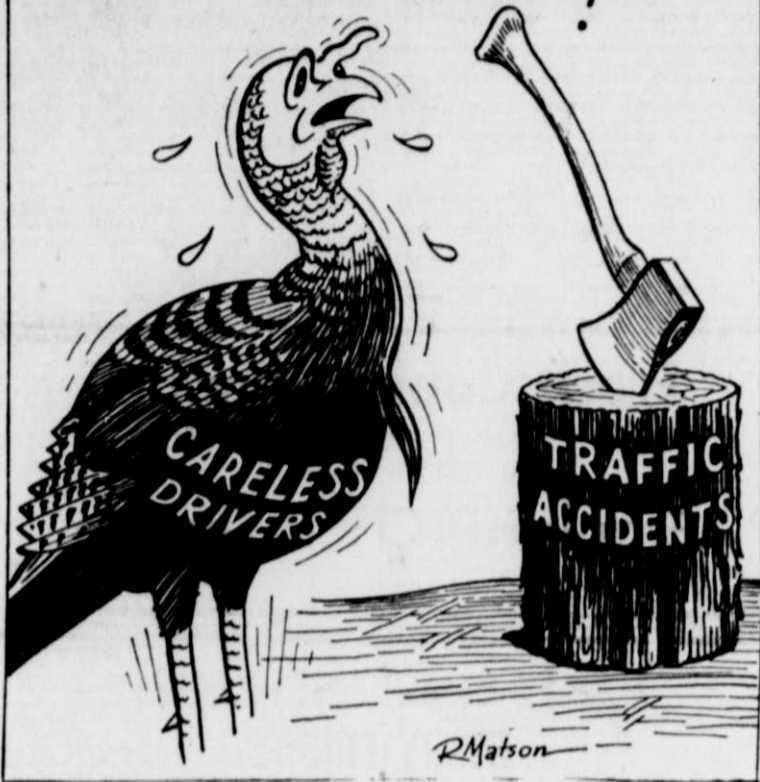
