Record Deer Kill in County, More Than 200 **Registered Wednesday**

NUMEROUS LOCAL HUNTERS SUCCESSFUL IN COUNTY. NORTH WOODS

A new record deer kill, far more than double that of last year, had already been achieved in Washington county Wednesday when reports indicated that more than 200 deer had been killed during the first five days of the season in the county, with four more days of the season remaining.

Monday morning reports indicated that 106 deer were registered at the sheriff's office on the opening week end and this number increased over the 200 mark by Wednesday. Mostly bucks were bagged with does running close behind and a smaller number of fawns were taken. Washington county has an "any deer" season this year.

Bob Lake, conservation warden for this area, said that in addition to the legal kill during the present season, he has already recorded 60 deer killed by automobiles in the county this year. Last year \$7 deer were shot in the county and 50 were reported killed by cars. The two year report indicates that the county deer herd is growing rapidly and this is by far the most successful season ever.

Many farmers, who have reported crop damage from the deer, attest to the growing herds as the year progressed. Deer along highways in fields and swamps are becoming a common sight in the area. With the season continuing through Sunday, many more animals will be taken before the shooting ends.

Hunters who went to the north woods also report a heavy population of the animals and most of them reported success in bagging deer. This season should find the largest deer kill ever in the state. Below is a list of some of the local hunters who were successful in their quest for deer. Many, many more were successful but we are publishing only the names of those who reported to the Statesman so far.
