50 Area Union Leaders Meet at Labor Center

More than 50 trade union leaders in the Kettle Moraine area of Wisconsin held a meeting at the Labor Center in Kewaskum last Saturday and set as their goal "100 per cent voter participation in the 1960 election."

The group ratified a constitution for the Sixth District Committee on Political Education (COPE), pulling together some 50,000 AFL-CIO unionists in six counties. Frank Wallick, representative from Wisconsin State AFL-CIO, presided at the meeting and was the main speaker.

Among the Washington county union officials attending the group were: Giles Wierman, Kewaskum; Victor Plzak, West Bend; Leo Duehninc, Slinger; Walter Gau and Joe Kolkema, West Bend, and Marvin Martin, Kewaskum.

Wierman, a member of the Wisconsin State AFL-CIO executive board, told the group in Kewaskum: "We in labor must not be a narrow, self-centered pressure group. Our record in the past shows that we have supported legislation and candidates based on the public interest. Let's always keep it that way."

Clothing Collection in Schools to End Monday

Students of the Kewaskum High and grade school will bring their Save The Children Federation Bundle Day Clothing Collection program to a close on Dec. 14 of next week.

Responding to the urgent clothing needs of children at home and overseas, faculty and student leaders have asked parents and friends to join with them and Save The Children Federation in this 18th annual nationwide humanitarian project of children helping children. "The enthusiasm of our students is inspiring," states Mr. Rose, "and I strongly urge everyone to empty clothing storage areas of good, used garments and, through their supporting cooperation, help bring the total collection to a grand high point."

Donated clothing should be sent to school this week by students or brought to school directly in bags or cartons.

Blankets and sheets, in addition to good, used winter and summer garments for children, babies and adults are urgently requested. Low-heeled shoes and overshoes are especially needed.

Each year thousands of children are enabled to attend school in the southern mountains by the distribution of clothing through SCF Clothing Centers where clothing is made available at very low prices to a poor but proud people who prefer not to accept free clothing. However, to those who cannot afford to pay, clothing is also made available without charge through county welfare and attendance officers.

In addition to its use in the Southern Mountains, clothing is stockpiled for free distribution to victims of disaster at home and overseas.

Haymaker, 100 Ton of Hay Lost in Fire at Pamperin Farm Sunday

KEWASKUM FIREMEN HELP FIGHT BLAZE 5½ HOURS; LARGE BARN SAVED

A haymaker and its contents of about 100 ton of hay were destroyed by fire at the John Pamperin farm about 1½ miles west of Kohlsville early Sunday evening. The loss is estimated at approximately \$5,500. Pamperin's son, Walter, operates the farm.

The blaze in the haymaker, a 50 foot high, metal silo type structure, was discovered about 4:45 p. m. by Ray Pamperin, another son. He made an attempt to put out the fire with a hand extinguisher but the flames had already gained too much headway.

Walter called the Kohlsville and Allenton fire departments and later Wilmer Herman, Kohlsville chief, summoned the Kewaskum fire department to help. Kewaskum firemen received the call shortly after 5:30 p. m. and remained at the scene to help fight the blaze for about 5½ hours, returning to the fire station around 11 p. m. Kohlsville firemen, the home department, remained at the scene until early Monday to keep the flames under control.

While the hay in the haymaker was burning out, firemen concentrated their efforts on saving the large barn only a few feet away and other buildings. They kept the barn soaked almost constantly and the cold weather came to their assistance as ice formed on the roof of the barn and prevented it from catching fire. The barn was saved from fire damage, fortunately, and only the haymaker was burned out and its contents of hay destroyed. Only slight water damage was suffered in the blaze.

Tank trucks from the Kohlsville Cheese Co., Stella Cheese Co. of Campbellsport, Wayne-Madison Co-op of Allenton and Regal Ware, Inc. of Kewaskum all assisted in hauling water to the scene and succeeded in keeping an adequate supply on hand. Without this water supply the barn no doubt could not have been saved.

It was believed that the fire started from a light bulb in the haymaker. A hole was cut into the bottom of the haymaker by Kewaskum firemen with the department's torch to help remove the burning hay and give it more of a draft so it would burn out quicker and lessen the danger to the barn.

Many persons were attracted to the scene by the smoke and flames, which were visible for miles.

To make your cookies really special, as cookies for Christmas deserve to be, use these recipes that call for butter as the key ingredient. Butter enriches the cookies, and it has an incomparable natural flavor that improves their taste.

- NOEL COOKIES**
7 dozen cookies
- 400° oven
10-12 minutes
¾ cup softened butter
1½ cups sugar
1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
2½ cups sifted cake flour
1½ teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
¼ cup candied cherries, finely chopped
Few drops red food coloring
1 square baking chocolate, melted
¼ cup finely chopped pecans
2 tablespoons coconut, chopped
½ teaspoon almond extract
Cream butter and sugar. Add egg and vanilla and mix well. Sift dry ingredients and add to the egg mixture. Divide the

- dough into thirds. To one part add the chopped cherries and red coloring; to the second add the chocolate and chopped nuts, and to the third add the chopped coconut and almond extract. Line a small bread pan (7½x2x¾") with waxed paper. Put the cherry batter on the bottom, then the chocolate, then the coconut. Cover with waxed paper and chill for several hours or overnight in the refrigerator. Cut in ¼ inch thick slices and cut each slice into thirds. Bake on an ungreased cookie sheet for 10-12 minutes in a 400° oven. Cook on cake racks.
- CHOCOLATE NUT CLUSTERS**
50-60 cookies
- 350° oven
10 minutes
2 squares baking chocolate, melted
1 cup sifted flour
¾ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon baking powder
½ cup softened butter
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
2 teaspoons vanilla
2 cups coarsely chopped pecan meats
- MINT FROSTING:**
¼ cup softened butter
2½ cups sifted confectioners sugar
½ teaspoon peppermint extract
2-3 teaspoons milk or cream
Few drops green food coloring
Melt chocolate. Sift dry ingredients. Cream butter and

- sugar. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add vanilla and melted chocolate, then sifted dry ingredients and nuts. Drop from a teaspoon onto a greased cookie sheet and bake in a 350° oven for 10 minutes. When cool frost with green mint frosting.
- MINT FROSTING:** Cream butter and half of the sugar. Add mint extract and remaining sugar. Add enough milk or cream to make the frosting of spreading consistency, then tint a pale green with food coloring. Spread on the chocolate cookies.

- CHRISTMAS CHERRY COOKIES**
5 dozen cookies
- 350° oven, 12-15 minutes
1½ cups sifted flour
½ cup sugar
2 teaspoons baking powder
½ cup softened butter
1 egg, beaten
1 tablespoon milk
½ teaspoon almond extract
½ cup chopped almonds
Candied cherries
- Sift flour, sugar and baking powder together. Combine with butter until the mixture resembles meal. Mix egg, milk, and almond extract and add. Fold in chopped almonds and chill the dough in the refrigerator until it can be handled. Form the dough into small balls and place on greased cookie sheets. Press a candied cherry in the center of each and bake in a 350° oven for 12-15 min. Cool on cake racks.

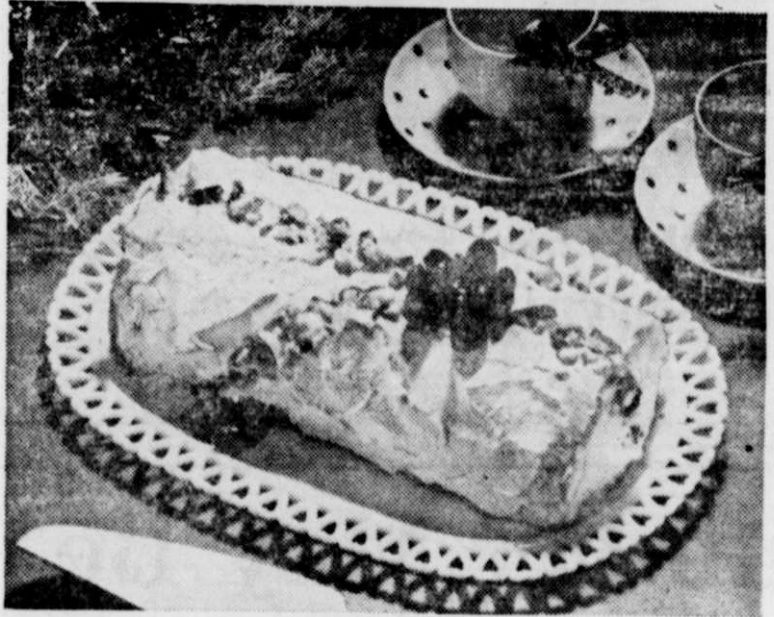

DELICIOUS CHRISTMAS EGGNOG ROLL



It's gift wrapping season again and amid the swirls of ribbon and wrappings, you might find time to devise your own special package—a bright Christmas Eggnog Roll.

Granted, it is not one of those items you can whip up in a few moments, but the end product shows true workmanship and skill.

The most important part is to mix your cake roll batter properly and to generously butter the waxed paper and pan for ease in removing the baked cake. As soon as the cake is taken from the oven, it must immediately be removed from the pan and the paper stripped off.

Have a clean towel, amply sprinkled with confectioners' sugar, in readiness. Then trim off the crusty edges of your cake and swiftly, but gently roll it up in the towel. The secret here is to roll tightly at first and then gradually loosen it as you come to the end. Then let it cool while you cook the eggnog filling which is really rather simple to make. The eggnog you can purchase from your local dairyman. Combine it with cornstarch and vanilla and cook. While your eggnog mixture is cooling, you can measure out crushed pineapple, quartered maraschino cherries and coconut. These will top the eggnog filling. Then gently unroll the cooled cake, lavishly cover it with the eggnog mixture and scatter the pineapple, coconut and cherries over the top.

Roll the cake up and chill it. While your concoction is chilling, you might find time to whip the cream and tint it green. Chip some peppermint candy into little chunks too.

You'll see that your delectable Christmas Eggnog Roll was well worth the effort.

CHRISTMAS EGGNOG ROLL
10 1/2 x 15 Jelly roll pan
Preheated 375° oven

CAKE ROLL

- 3/4 cup sifted cake flour
- 3/4 teaspoon baking powder
- 4 egg yolks
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 4 egg whites
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Butter pan well; line the bottom with waxed paper and butter top of paper. Sift the flour and baking powder together. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Add sugar gradually and beat until well blended. Add vanilla. Blend in flour until smooth. Beat egg whites to frothy stage. Add salt and beat until stiff. Fold stiffly beaten egg whites carefully into batter mixture. Spread carefully and evenly in prepared jelly roll pan. Bake in a preheated 375° oven for 13-15 minutes. Turn out immediately on a clean towel which has been generously sprinkled with confectioners' sugar. Quickly pull off waxed paper. If edges are crusty, trim. Roll cake up with the towel and place on cake rack to cool.

EGGNOG FILLING

- 1 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 1 1/2 cups commercial eggnog
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 9 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained
- 3/4 cup quartered maraschino cherries
- 1/4 cup coconut
- 1 cup whipping cream
- Green food coloring
- Crushed peppermint candy

Blend cornstarch with a little of the eggnog; stir into rest of eggnog in a saucepan. Stirring constantly; cook over low heat until thick. Add vanilla. Cool. Unroll cake and spread with filling. Sprinkle pineapple, cherries and coconut over filling. Roll. Refrigerate until chilled. Whip cream and tint green. Frost chilled cake roll. Decorate with crushed candy and maraschino cherries to look like a Christmas package.
