The home service department of the utility sponsored its annual contest under the direction of Miss Viola De Jong and Mrs. Dorothy Gresbach. The contest was open to 5th and 6th grade girls of the Girl Scouts, Pioneers and Washington county 4-H girls.

Winners of the contest were announced at a party for all contestants at the Electric Company hall last Wednesday evening. First place in the 5th grade division went to Lois Geib, a Barton Girl Scout.
