Man Shoots, Kills Father and Self, Also Wounds Wife

KEWASKUM MAN DISCOVERS
BODIES ON KAHNT FARM
ON R. 2, WEST BEND

Double tragedy struck Monday evening at the Marvin Kahnt farm, R. 2, West Bend, when Frank Kahnt, 82, was killed and his son, Marvin, 59, apparently took his own life and in doing so accidentally shot his wife, Anna, 72.

Washington county authorities did not learn of the mishap until 7:48 a. m. Tuesday when Philip Marquardt, 57, R. 1, Kewaskum, arrived at the Kahnt farm where he leases a barn. He arrived early to care for the cattle he keeps there when he found Frank Kahnt lying in the yard near the rear porch with a shotgun wound in the left cheek.

Marquardt entered the house and found Marvin dead in the pantry and Mrs. Kahnt lying in the front room, barely able to move and bleeding from wounds in the back of her neck. She had lain there all night, bleeding and partially paralyzed. She was taken immediately to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend.

County coroner, Dr. James Albrecht, made a preliminary investigation along with Sheriff Alvin Schmidt. Dr. Albrecht theorized that Marvin Kahnt mistook his father for a prowler, shot and killed him, and after discovering what he had done, killed himself in remorse. The tragic double death apparently took place at about 5:30 p. m. Monday after Marvin and his wife had arrived home from a feed mill which they operate in Young America near Barton, about three miles away.

Mrs. Kahnt was preparing supper when she heard Marvin say something about a prowler. He went out the back door and killed his father, who lived with Marvin and wife. Mrs. Kahnt told authorities she did not see Marvin shoot the gun. She had her back turned when he re-entered the house and administered a fatal wound to his head. Several pellets were deflected and struck Mrs. Kahnt in the back of the neck and paralyzed her. She fell to the floor, stunned and later crawled in the front room and remained there until Marquardt found her.

Augusta Brockman, 97, Oldest Resident Dies

Mrs. Augusta Brockman, Kewaskum's oldest resident, passed away at the age of 97 years on Friday morning, Dec. 18, at the home of her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Braun, on Fond du Lac ave. Death was caused by complications attributed to old age.

A daughter of the late William and Dorothy Gritzmacher, Mrs. Brockman was born Nov. 3, 1862 in the town of Wayne, where she resided many years. Her marriage to William Brockman took place May 31, 1891 in the Ev. Lutheran church near Kohlsville. He predeceased her Dec. 6, 1933.

Surviving are two sons and a daughter, William Brockman of Barton, Erma (Mrs. Walter Braun) and Otto Brockman of Kewaskum; four grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

The body was in state at Miller's Funeral Home after 3 p. m. Sunday and at St. Lucas Lutheran church from 12 noon until the time of funeral services at 2 p. m. Monday. The Rev. Donald Bitter officiated and burial was in St. Lucas cemetery.
