Local Students Leave For Rose Bowl Game

Seven young people from Kewaskum, five of them students at the University of Wisconsin, left Saturday for Pasadena, Calif. to attend the Rose Bowl football game and pre-game pageant festivities on New Year's Day. The Badgers, Big Ten champions, will meet Washington of the west coast in the annual bowl game, which is the major one in the country.

The local group was among 800 students of the university who left Madison Saturday on a special student train bound for California. The train arrived in Los Angeles Tuesday. The students, in tune with the weather there, wore straw hats with a banner reading: "We're the Badgers from Wisconsin." Other special trains pulled out of Madison, Milwaukee and Chicago over the week end carrying alumni, rooters and other Rose Bowlers across the country. Still others flew to the west coast for the spectacle.

Those from Kewaskum who left for the game included Dave, Jerry and Mary Carol Oppenorth, Gwen Edwards, Pam Nolting, Sue Sengpiel and Bob Sparks, a member of the University of Wisconsin band, with which organization he will play at the game and parade. Students are scheduled to return to the campus Jan. 3.

The Rose Bowl parade will be shown on television at 11 a. m. New Year's Day and the game will be on TV at 3:45 p. m. our time. Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

Washington County Conservation Warden

Applications for the registration of sail and motor boats have been received by the county clerks. They may be picked up at his office or at any fishing license depot. Boats must be registered by April 1.

The raccoon season closes on Dec. 31, 1959. The serving of raccoon in a hotel, restaurant or tavern after that date is prohibited.

Upon conviction, the license holder of such an establishment could receive a fine of from \$200 to \$500. The selling or serving of venison in the above mentioned places is prohibited at any time of the year, with one exception, that purchased from the Wisconsin Conservation Department.

Until the weather turns colder, test the ice before you decide to go fishing, many of our lakes are not safe. Pick up your new 1960 fishing license by Jan. 1, 1960.

The bow and arrow season for deer will close on Dec. 31, 1959. Those who wish may hunt rabbits and squirrel until Jan. 31.

The bill restoring payment of bounties on fox and coyote has been signed by the governor. The effective date was Dec. 25. Animals must be brought to the office of the county clerk not later than five

days after the animal was killed. Hunters must be prepared to show either the county clerk or the warden where such animal was shot or trapped. There are heavy penalties for fraudulently making claims to the state for the payment of such bounties.

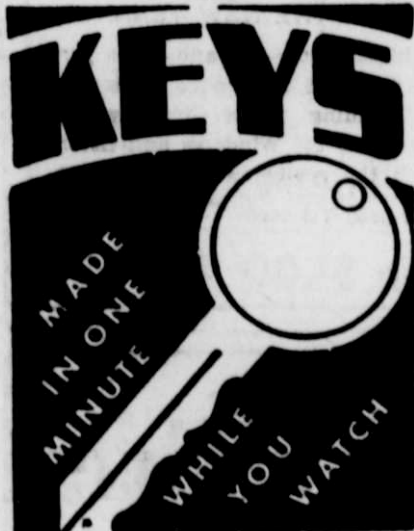
