Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

The 1959 deer registration in Washington county was as follows: Hunters in the gun season, 340; highway car kills, 47; railroad kill, 8; illegal woods kill, 3, and dog kill 1; total 399.

The picture in Ozaukee county is not complete. I do not have the record of the number of deer picked up by Warden Voss from Jan. 1 to Aug. 31. However, there were 42 deer registered there this past season. I picked up 16 car kills and 1 illegal woods kill, to total 59.

The law provides that rabbits may be killed any time of the year by a person on his property. Discharge of firearms is prohibited in

the cities and villages so the use of box traps to catch the rabbit is permitted.

For the information of the lady of the house who will be complaining next April about the rabbit damage to flowers and shrubbery, now is the time to have Dad start trapping.

Plans for a box trap may be obtained from Game Manager Armin Schwengel, R. 2, West Bend.

New fresh wet snow on top of thin ice can be dangerous; ice fishermen should know where they are walking. Two of our local lakes have some open water.

I wish to again remind the sail and motor boat owner and resort owner that they should apply for their boat registration number as soon as possible. In the event they wait until the last minute, many boats may be tied up when the fishing season opens. Application forms may be obtained at the office of
