WILL ENTER RACE IN FALL ELECTION TO SUCCEED RETIRING OFFICIALS

The fall election races in Washington county began to take shape this week with the announcement of candidates that they would seek election in the campaign.

Two county residents announced that they will enter the fall election for county offices as candidates to succeed County Register of Deeds Ed Pick and County Treasurer Paul Justman, who are retiring. They are Calvin J. "Kelly" Held, former operator of butcher shops in West Bend and Barton, who will seek the Republican nomination for register of deeds, and Robert J. Klein, Rockfield, who will seek the GOP nomination as county treasurer. It is reported that Her. bert Krantz, Allenton, will also seek the treasurer office. William John. son of R. 1. Slinger, announced on Tuesday that he will be a candidate for county sheriff to succeed Alvin Schmidt, who has served two terms in that office, and cannot be candidate for re-election.

Held, a West Bend native, is well known throughout the county. He started in the meat business in the employ of his father. Adam. and brother, Harvey, before going into the meat business with Wilmer Kirsch whom he later bought out. Kelly was in the meat business for 25 years for himself before retiring a short time ago.

Cheese Company Will Continue Operation at Kohlsville, St. Kilian

FIRM DENIES BANKRUPTCY PETITION FILED BY CREDITORS

Judge Kenneth Grubb, of the U. S. District Court of Milwaukee, approved the petition of the Kohlsville Cheese Company, which operates plants at Kohlsville and St. Kilian, to reorganize and continue operations.

Atty. C. J. Schloemer of West Bend was appointed trustee by the Federal Court and will conduct the business of the Kohlsville Cheese Company. He has posted a \$70,000 .-00 bond.

The Kohlsvillee Cheese Company has been in business for a number of years and manufactures Italian type cheese. John Lavarda has been president and will continue to run the plant under the supervision of

On Dec. 23, 1959 three creditors filed a petition in Federal Court requesting that Kohlsville Cheese Company be adjudicated a bankrupt. The company filed an answer denying bankruptcy. The petition now filed by it indicates that it wishes to reorganize and take advantage of the provisions of the corporate and reorganization sections of the federal law

Under the order appointing him, C. J. Schloemer. trustee. will 3.8 have the right operate the cheese company. and he indicated he intended to do so. As trustee, he will operate the plant under the supervision of the Federal Court. Schloemer indicated that he would advise all farmers to continue delivering milk to the Kohlsville plant and the St. Kilian plant, because they would continue to operate. Every effort will be made to restore the company to its former position as an important Washing. ton county industry.

After Schloemer has completed his investigation of the affairs of the Kohlsville Cheese Company, he will report to the court and submit Adolph a plan of reorganization which will
