## Held, Johnson, Klein Announce Candidacy For County Offices

WILL ENTER RACE IN FALL  
ELECTION TO SUCCEED  
RETIRING OFFICIALS

The fall election races in Washington county began to take shape this week with the announcement of candidates that they would seek election in the campaign.

Two county residents announced that they will enter the fall election for county offices as candidates to succeed County Register of Deeds Ed Pick and County Treasurer Paul Justman, who are retiring. They are Calvin J. "Kelly" Held, former operator of butcher shops in West Bend and Barton, who will seek the Republican nomination for register of deeds, and Robert J. Klein, Rockfield, who will seek the GOP nomination as county treasurer. It is reported that Herbert Krantz, Allenton, will also seek the treasurer office. William Johnson of R. 1, Slinger, announced on Tuesday that he will be a candidate for county sheriff to succeed Alvin Schmidt, who has served two terms in that office, and cannot be candidate for re-election.

Held, a West Bend native, is well known throughout the county. He started in the meat business in the employ of his father, Adam, and brother, Harvey, before going into the meat business with Wilmer Kirsch whom he later bought out. Kelly was in the meat business for 25 years for himself before retiring a short time ago.

## To Begin Tearing Down Former Eberle Tavern

Starting on Monday, Feb. 1, wrecking operations will begin at the former Joe Eberle tavern building in Kewaskum. Persons interested in purchasing items may call between 3:30 and 4:30 p. m. daily and contact Reuben Schultz.

The former Eberle buildings and property, which runs from Main st. back to First st., were purchased by the Peace United Church of Christ in October of 1958. Last summer the congregation resold the buildings at a public sale. Carroll Haug purchased the tavern and residence building as well as the barn at the rear of the property. Joe Gruber purchased that part of the building housing two bowling alleys, which have been out of use for years. The tavern was operated by Syl and Susie Serwe until July 1, 1959, when the license was discontinued.

The Peace congregation has completed plans for the erection of an educational building at an estimated cost of \$80,000.00, furnished and equipped, on the First st. portion of the property purchased from Eberle. Present plans are to utilize the Main st. portion as a parking lot for church activities. The parish also purchased an adjoining lot at the rear of the church, on Main st., in 1958, which is now in use as a parking lot.

## Jac. Reiland Crushed to Death in Farm Accident

Jacob H. Reiland, 54, of the town of Barton, who has a daughter, sister and brother living at Kewaskum, was crushed to death Sunday morning at his farm home in that township when he was pinned against a trailer by a runaway tractor in a farm shed.

The accident occurred when Reiland attempted to crank a tractor and it suddenly started while in gear, pinning him against the trailer. He suffered internal injuries and a crushed chest.

Reiland was born in the town of Barton on Oct. 11, 1905 and lived there all his life. He was married to Evelyn Koelings in St. Mary's church, Barton, on June 17. She survives him together with three children, Gloria (Mrs. Virgil Weinreich) of Fillmore, Georgiana (Mrs. Howard Kirchner) of Kewaskum and Jacob Jr. of Barton; four grandchildren, two sisters, Mrs. Ed. Junk (Adeline), R. 2, Kewaskum, and Mrs. Edwin Knoeck (Helen) of New York City, and a brother, Martin Reiland of R. 2, Kewaskum. Funeral services were held Wednesday at St. Mary's church, Barton, at 9:30 a. m., Father O. Ullrich officiating. Burial was in the parish cemetery.

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present.

The minutes of the previous meetings were approved as presented upon motion by J. Eberle, seconded by H. Becker and duly carried.

The first order of business was the opening of bids for a new police car.

Two bids were submitted prior to the meeting. The chair then asked if any one else wished to submit a bid. Since no one so indicated, the chair proceeded with the formal opening and public reading of the bids.

Upon motion by H. Becker, seconded by C. Wieter and duly carried, the commissioner was authorized to place an order for one Ford Fairlane automobile equipped with the above optional equipment to be used as a police car with Service Motors, Fond du Lac, for a cost of \$1692.70.

## Cheese Company Will Continue Operation at Kohlsville, St. Kilian

FIRM DENIES BANKRUPTCY  
PETITION FILED  
BY CREDITORS

Judge Kenneth Grubb, of the U. S. District Court of Milwaukee, approved the petition of the Kohlsville Cheese Company, which operates plants at Kohlsville and St. Kilian, to reorganize and continue operations.

Atty. C. J. Schloemer of West Bend was appointed trustee by the Federal Court and will conduct the business of the Kohlsville Cheese Company. He has posted a \$70,000.00 bond.

The Kohlsville Cheese Company has been in business for a number of years and manufactures Italian type cheese. John Lavarda has been president and will continue to run the plant under the supervision of the trustee.

On Dec. 23, 1959 three creditors filed a petition in Federal Court requesting that Kohlsville Cheese Company be adjudicated a bankrupt. The company filed an answer denying bankruptcy. The petition now filed by it indicates that it wishes to reorganize and take advantage of the provisions of the corporate and reorganization sections of the federal law.

Under the order appointing him, C. J. Schloemer, as trustee, will have the right to operate the cheese company, and he indicated he intended to do so. As trustee, he will operate the plant under the supervision of the Federal Court.

Schloemer indicated that he would advise all farmers to continue delivering milk to the Kohlsville plant and the St. Kilian plant, because they would continue to operate. Every effort will be made to restore the company to its former position as an important Washington county industry.

After Schloemer has completed his investigation of the affairs of the Kohlsville Cheese Company, he will report to the court and submit a plan of reorganization which will also be submitted to creditors for approval.

A meeting of creditors has been set for March 7 at 2:00 p. m., in the Federal Courthouse in Milwaukee. Creditors must also file their claims with the clerk of the Federal Court within three months. Evan C. Schwemer, attorney, at Milwaukee, was appointed to represent Schloemer in the reorganization proceedings.

## Marching Mothers to Collect Facts, Funds

"If you can answer no to the questions inside, be thankful! If you must answer yes, take hope!"

American mothers will carry this message to over 30 million homes this month. The mothers, volunteers in the annual Mothers' March for the New March of Dimes, will be seeking information and support for The National Foundation's fight against birth defects, arthritis and polio. These cripples, initial targets in The National Foundation's campaign to prevent crippling disease, affect the lives of one of every four American families.

### Two Million in March

An estimated two million women will join the nationwide mothers' appeal for facts and funds. In most communities the mothers will march Thursday evening, Jan. 28, bringing to a climax the New March of Dimes January campaign.

The mothers will present each household with a copy of "Door Count," a concise fact-finding folder in which a family may indicate if any of its members has a birth defect, arthritis or polio and how many have had three or more Salk vaccine shots. Each family record will be confidential.

### Salk Shot Reminder

The Mothers' March door count will focus family and community attention on the majority of Americans still without Salk shot protection against paralytic polio. It will remind the unvaccinated to start shots in time for summer polio protection and it will help communities plan local programs to further encourage

Although the house-to-house poll is in no way planned as a statistically valid survey, the sum of information taken in the door count will provide a working estimate of the number of persons suffering from arthritis; the number born with birth defects and the number who have been victims of paralytic polio. This tabulation will help guide National Foundation county chapters in formulating local programs to aid the disabled.

Mothers making the house-to-house door count will also seek contributions to the New March of Dimes for its attack on birth defects, arthritis and polio. The New March of Dimes is combating these disabling disorders with the same effective weapons used to conquer paralytic polio: medical scientific research to find causes, cures, preventives; patient aid for medical care; and training for medical workers needed to treat the sick and disabled.

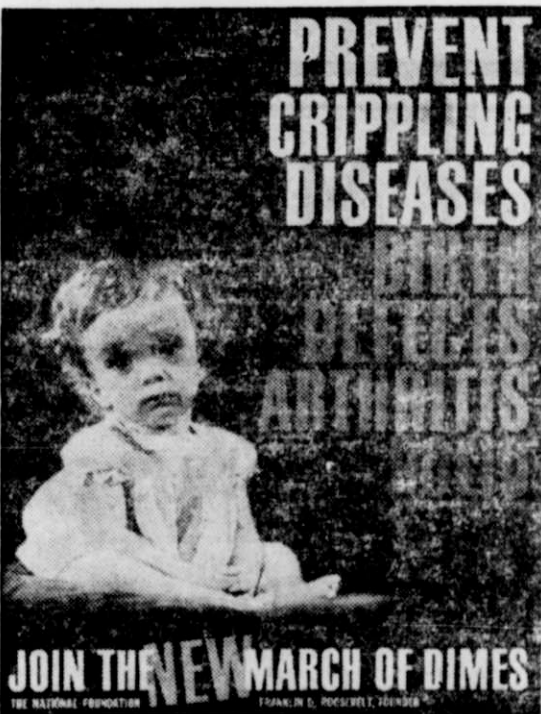
