Also for the first time West Bend has been selected as a site for a WIAA sub-regional tourney and Ke. waskum has been assigned to the West Bend meet, to be held next week in that school's spacious new gym. Only the large high schools in the state compete in the regional tournaments, while the smaller schools must win out in district tourneys first before reaching regional and sectional meets. The eight sectional winners advance to the state tourney at Madison.

The West Bend tournament will involve six teams on the nights of Monday, Feb. 29, Thursday, Mar. 3, and Friday, Mar. 4. The regional finals will then be played at Whitefish Bay on Mar. 5. Teams assigned to West Bend include Port Washington, Cedarburg, Mayville, Hartford, West Bend and Kewaskum.
