## Kewaskum High Moves Up to Regional Tourney Competition

### Assigned to West Bend Meet, Faces Hartford Monday

#### ENROLLMENT JUMP SHOVS SCHOOL ABOVE DISTRICT TOURNAMENT LEVEL

Big news (or bad) for Kewaskum area basketball fans this year is that Kewaskum High school has moved up to Wisconsin Inter-scholastic Athletic association regional tournament competition for the first time in the school's history. Kewaskum formerly was in the district tourney level of competition but a sizable enrollment increase has shoved it into the regional bracket.

Also for the first time West Bend has been selected as a site for a WIAA sub-regional tourney and Kewaskum has been assigned to the West Bend meet, to be held next week in that school's spacious new gym. Only the large high schools in the state compete in the regional tournaments, while the smaller schools must win out in district tourneys first before reaching regional and sectional meets. The eight sectional winners advance to the state tourney at Madison.

The West Bend tournament will involve six teams on the nights of Monday, Feb. 29, Thursday, Mar. 3, and Friday, Mar. 4. The regional finals will then be played at Whitefish Bay on Mar. 5. Teams assigned to West Bend include Port Washington, Cedarburg, Mayville, Hartford, West Bend and Kewaskum. Port tied for the championship in the Braveland conference with Menomonee Falls, each having 10-3 records. Cedarburg placed fifth in the same loop with a 6-7 record. Mayville won the north half championship in the Little Ten conference with a 11-2 record. West Bend ended up fifth in the south half of the Little Ten with 6-7 and Hartford wound up sixth in the same loop with 4-9. So the competition will be very tough in the West Bend tournament, with Kewaskum competing against much larger schools.

The tourney schedule follows:  
Monday, Feb. 29—Game 1, 7 p. m., Cedarburg vs. West Bend; game 2 (20 minutes after first game), Hartford vs. Kewaskum. Losers of games 1 and 2 are eliminated.

Thursday, Mar. 3—Game 3, 7 p. m., Mayville vs. winner game 1; game 4, Port Washington vs. winner game 2.

Friday, Mar. 4—Game 5, 7 p. m., loser game 3 vs. loser game 4; game 6, winner game 2 vs. winner game 4.

Note—Port and Mayville, both being conference champions, are seeded entrants and therefore skip the opening round of play.

The new West Bend gym is capable of accommodating at least 1,250 spectators and there should be plenty of seats available. All tickets for Feb. 29 will be unreserved and will be sold at the box office only. All seats on the main floor will be reserved Mar. 3 and 4. Balcony seats are available at general admission prices. Prices on Feb. 29 will be \$1.00 for adults and 75 cents

## 52 Kewaskum Students Complete Driver Course

Announcement was made today by Principal Clifford Rose that 52 students at Kewaskum High school have just completed a classroom course in driver education. Student certificates indicating satisfactory completion of the program have been issued by the motor vehicle department. They are accepted in lieu of the knowledge test if application is made within one year for a permit to learn to drive.

The most important objective of a driver education course is to help young people become better citizens through the acquisition of knowledge and improved attitudes in relation to the proper use of motor vehicles under all conditions. Accident statistics reveal that the majority of traffic accidents are brought about by human errors," the principal said.

The instructor, Mr. LaMarche, has devoted many hours to acquainting the students with the rules of the road and good driving practices. Much time was spent on evaluating the physical, mental and emotional qualifications of drivers and understanding the application of these factors in safer driving.

## Sue Sengpiel Wins Homemaker Award

Sue Kathryn Sengpiel has been named the 1960 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow at Kewaskum Community High school.

She received the highest score in a 50-minute written examination on homemaking knowledge and attitudes taken by graduating seniors in her school. She will receive an award pin, manufactured by Jostens and representing the slogan, "Home is where the heart is." Her examination paper will be entered in competition with other high school winners to name the state Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. The test was prepared and judged by Science Research Associates of Chicago.

Total enrollment in the six-year-old \$110,000 General Mills sponsored scholarship program has neared the two million mark (1,800,152 girls). This year a record number of 279,018 girls enrolled in 12,397 high schools throughout the 50 states and the District of Columbia. This is an increase of 29,868 girls and 337 schools over last year. Alaska and Hawaii are participating for the first time.

Each state Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and an educational trip April 23-29 with her school advisor. The tour will include New York City and Colonial Williamsburg and will culminate with the American Table Banquet in Washington, D. C. on April 28, at the Statler Hilton hotel where the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be announced. The runner-up in each state will receive a \$500 scholarship. The school of each state winner will be given a set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica.

The scholarship of the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be increased to \$5,000. The second, third, and fourth ranking Homemakers of Tomorrow in the nation will receive \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 scholarships, respectively.

Candidates will be required to pass a selection test demonstrating their ability to understand written instructions and read maps. Persons who are presently or recently associated with law enforcement or tax assessing or collection agencies are not eligible.

Census takers will be paid on a piece price basis. A diligent

census taker should earn about \$12.00 per day, the district supervisor said. A \$10.00 training fee will be paid to census takers who successfully complete the course of instruction required before they start their rounds, and accept a census assignment.

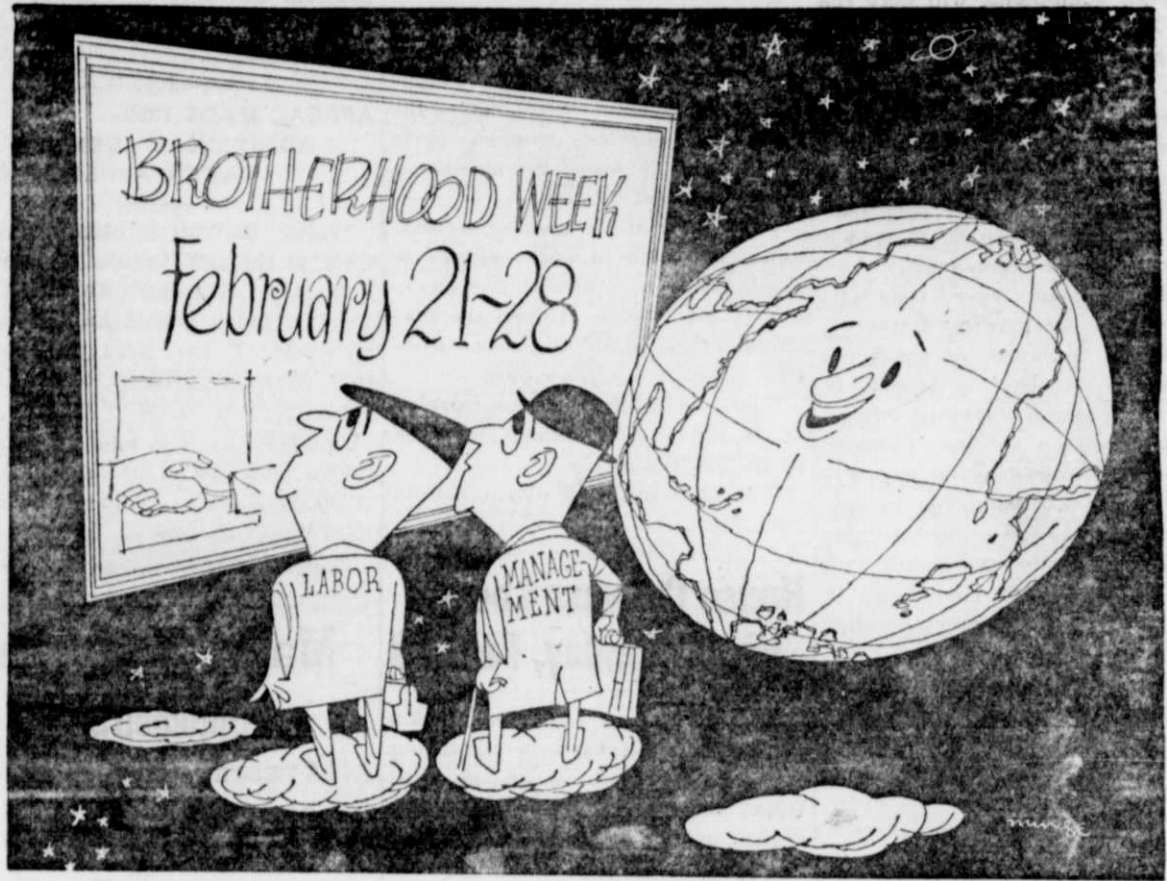

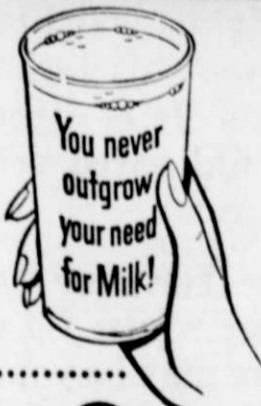

### Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

For the information of the sportsman who might wish to hunt or trap unprotected birds or animals, the following is the law: there is no closed season on coyote, wildcat, fox, opossum, skunk or weasel. In the event you wish to trap these animals, you must have a trapping license, and your traps be properly tagged.

There is no closed season on great-horned owls, crows, starlings, redwinged blackbirds, cowbirds, English sparrows, coturnix quail and chukar partridge. In the event you

wish to hunt these birds, you must first purchase a hunting license. The trapping of birds is prohibited.

#### WARNING

All fish shanties must be removed from the ice on or before March 5. We urge that all sturgeon shanties be removed at the end of the end of the sturgeon spearing season. There will be NO extension of the time when shanties must be removed.
