## Dairy Day Here March 19 to Offer One of Finest Programs Ever Made Available in County

Van Pelt of the 6th congressional district. During the afternoon a program will also be given for the ladies in the high school cafeteria, including a food demonstration, style and dress revue.

Following songs by the high school chorus at 7:15 p. m., the evening program will get underway

at 7:30 o'clock with a discussion, "Russian Agriculture," by Milo Swanton of the Wisconsin Council of Agriculture. "Miss Wisconsin," who is Mary Alice Fox of Sheboygan, will be on the program during the afternoon and evening and will crown Kewaskum's new dairy queen. A home talent program will be conducted, Kiwanis club conservation awards will be presented, the village and Businessmen's association presidents will speak briefly, and there will be numerous exhibits by businessmen of Kewaskum for the entire public to see.

A free noon lunch, over 50 prizes valued at over \$650.00 to be given away, and a look at Washington county dairying are all a part of this program. Free movies will be shown at 1:15 p. m. for the youngsters at the Kewaskum theatre.

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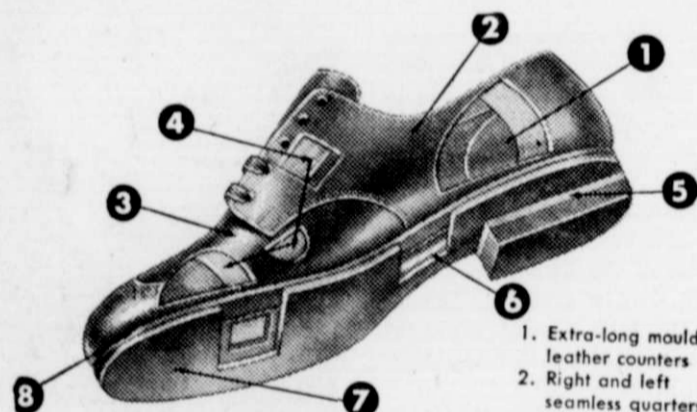


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## Around the Town

Sift dry ingredients together. Cream butter; gradually add sugars and mix thoroughly. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with buttermilk. Pour into three buttered and lightly floured eight inch layer cake pans. Bake in a preheated 375° oven for about 25 minutes. Cool on cake racks

When cool, split all three layers. Allow ½ cup lemon medley to spread between the six layers. Frost with lemon medley icing.

### LEMON MEDLEY ICING

½ cup lemon medley  
3 cups confectioners' sugar  
1½-2 tablespoons light cream or milk

Beat sugar and cream into lemon medley until fluffy and of spreading consistency.

### SPICY LEMON ICED COOKIES

2 dozen large cookies  
375° preheated oven  
5 cups sifted flour  
1½ teaspoons salt  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 teaspoon baking soda  
1½ teaspoon ginger  
¼ teaspoon cloves  
¾ cup (1½ sticks) butter  
1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed  
½ cup milk  
1 cup molasses

Sift dry ingredients together. Cream butter; gradually add brown sugar and cream together until fluffy. Mix together milk and molasses. Alternately add dry ingredients in fourths, molasses mixture in thirds, to creamed butter and sugar. Mix well after each addition. Wrap dough in waxed paper and chill in refrigerator 1½ hours. Remove ¼ of dough at a time. Roll ¼ inch thick on a floured board. Cut with a floured 3 inch cookie cutter. Using a pancake turner, place cookies about 2 inches apart on cookie sheets. Bake at 375° about 10 minutes. Cool on cake racks. Frost with Lemon Medley Icing.

### LEMON MEDLEY

Yield: 1 quart

4 lemons, washed and dried  
2 cups sugar  
¾ cup (1½ sticks) butter  
4 eggs, slightly beaten

Grate finely the yellow rind of lemons. Squeeze and strain juice. Place lemon juice and rind, sugar and butter in saucepan and cook over low heat until butter is melted and sugar is dissolved. Remove from heat. Stirring vigorously, slowly blend in eggs. Return to low heat and cook, stirring constantly until mixture coats the back of a spoon. Cool. Put up in jars and keep in refrigerator from 3-6 months

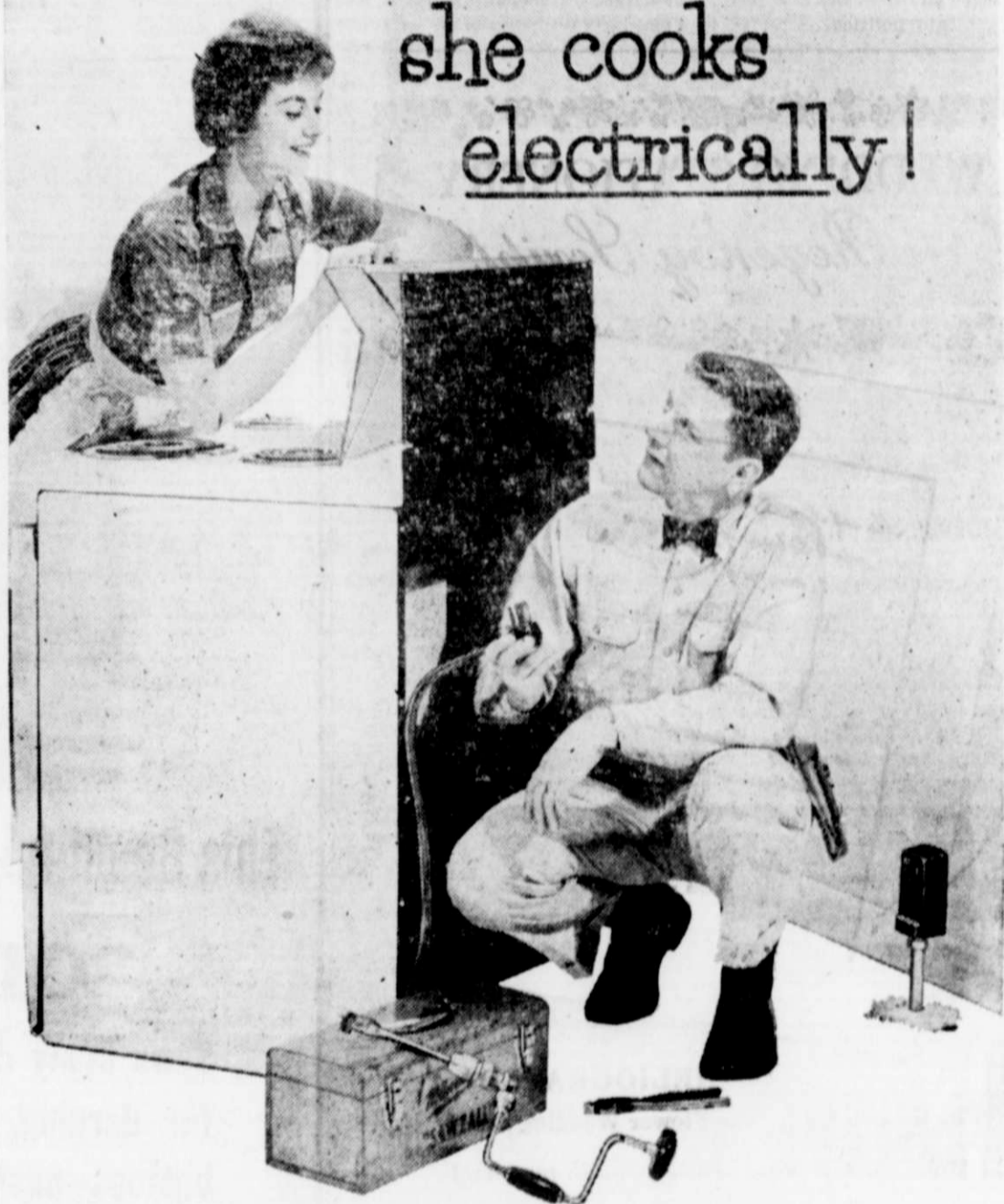

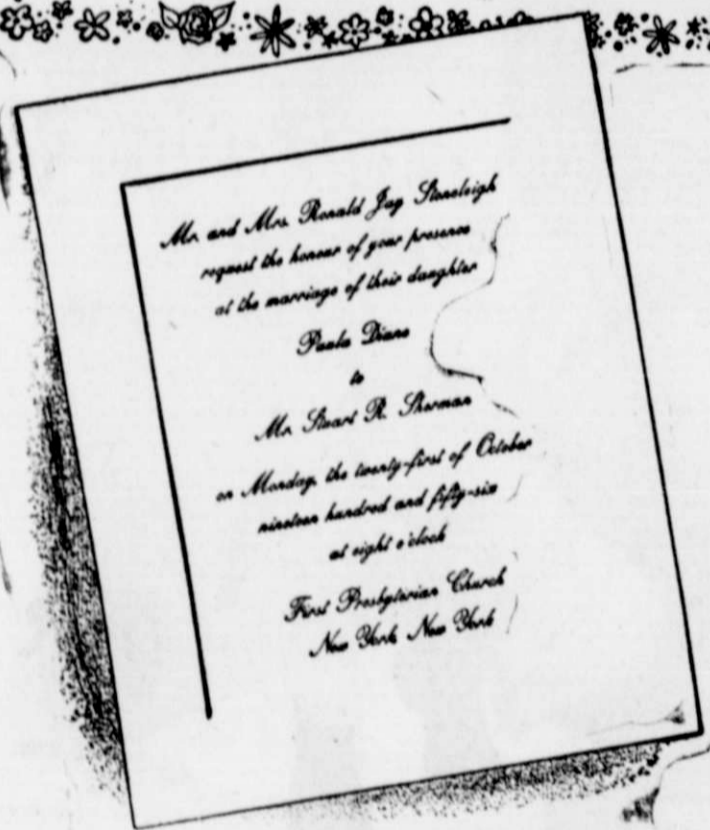

## Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

Let the buyer beware; now that the Lenten season is at hand, there are a few people who like to make a fast buck.

This as a rule is the procedure, an old panel truck (no name on the side) or an older model car with dirty license plates, drives into the farm yard or stops at the country tavern. The driver has fish for sale.

There is an ocean fish (trade name pollock) sells over the counter as a fillet at about thirty cents a pound, looks a great deal like a Lake Erie walleyed pike. Pike sell round at about seventy cents a pound, as a fillet one dollar ten cents a pound. Nice profit when you can get it.

Many times the seller indicates he has a five pound box of ocean had-dock for sale at fifty three cents a pound. The five pound box of pollock can be purchased over the counter for about twenty eight cents a pound. Another nice profit.

The party peddling from door to door is required to have a peddler's license. Those selling to eating establishments should have a wholesale fish dealer's license.

The time when you will be using your boat a great deal is getting

very close. If you have not registered your boat, it is imperative that you get your application in at once. All motorboats or sail boats must be registered by April 1 if they are to be used.

All fishing shanties must be removed from the ice in Washington and Ozaukee counties on or before midnight of March 5.

Excellent catches of fair size bluegills were taken on Big Cedar lake the last week of February; cisco fishing has just been fair.

I have seen but two flocks of Hungarian partridge this winter, however, the group of about fifteen that are on the western edge of the city of West Bend have now started to pair off.

As of March 1, 1959 I had picked up eight deer, railroad and car kills. This year it is two.

The spearing of any game fish, except sturgeon during the open season, is very definitely illegal.

In fact, the possession or control of any gun, bow and arrow, spear or similar device that might be used for the purpose of taking, catching or killing fish on any inland waters or shores of inland waters is illegal in many counties from March 2 to April 20. Those counties in the East Central area where this regulation is in effect are Brown, Calumet, Door, Kewaunee, Manitowish, Outagamie, Ozaukee, Portage, Washington, and Winnebago (except Waukau Creek).
