Larry Jeske Killed in Headon Car-Truck Crash in Fog Tuesday

WAS VETERAN OF 20 YEARS IN NAVY; PRESTON PIERCE ALSO INJURED IN CRASH

Lawrence Jeske, 41, of the town of Auburn, R. 2, Campbellsport, residing several miles northeast of Kewaskum, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Erich Jeske of this village, was fatally injured Tuesday morning, Mar. 29, when his car collided almost headon with a semi-trailer truck. He was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, at about 8:40 a. m.

The crash occurred on Hwy. 45 just south of the Hwy. 60 intersection at Jackson. Jeske was driving south on Hwy. 45 and was reported to have attempted to pass another vehicle when his auto collided almost headon with a large truck driven by Don Miller, 42, of Kaukauna, who suffered a bruised left arm in the mishap. A heavy blinding fog at the time was held responsible for the crash. The fog caused numerous other accidents in the county although none of the others was of a serious nature.

Investigating officers reported that Miller swerved his truck into the ditch in a futile attempt to avoid the collision. The truck swerved back onto the roadway and came to a halt across the highway where it was struck by another car driven by George King, 47, Port Washington, who suffered possible chest injuries. One of two passengers in the King vehicle also was injured. He was Preston Pierce, Kewaskum, who incurred a bruised right arm and shoulder. Another passenger in the King car, not identified, was not injured.

Jeske and King and his passengers all were on their way to work. The semi-trailer was owned by the Clipper Transit Co. of Menasha. Jeske's death was the fifth fatality on Washington county highways this year. He was employed as assistant buyer in the electronics division of A. C. Sparkplug, Milwaukee.

Fire on Theusch Farm Destroys Barn, Stock

Fire early Friday morning at the Lawrence Theusch farm on R. 1, Kewaskum, completely destroyed a large barn, two heifers, 150 chickens and some hay stored in the barn. Loss in the blaze, which is partially covered by insurance, was estimated at between \$8,000 and \$10,000 by the owner.

The Theusch farm is located in the town of Farmington, about 3/4 mile south of the junction of Hwys. 28 and 144. Cause of the blaze was not immediately determined but it might have started from faulty wiring.

The fire was discovered by Vernon Weber, a passerby, who was returning to his home at Beechwood from work at the West Bend Aluminum Co. when he saw the blaze.

Three of Theusch's sons, Ken, 18; Don, 17, and Jerry, 16, were successful in getting 18 beef heifers and a milk cow out of the barn before the building was destroyed. Ken Theusch had also returned from work on the night shift at the Gehl Bros. Mfg. Co. in West Bend shortly before the blaze was discovered. He did not notice any fire at the time. Mr. Theusch, who is employed on the night shift at the West Bend Aluminum Co., arrived home shortly after the fire was discovered.

Firemen from Boltonville and Fillmore were called and although they were unable to save the barn, they kept the flames from spreading to neighboring buildings.

Spring Election Tuesday, April 5

LOCAL, JUDICIAL, PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY, REFERENDUM BALLOTS TO BE VOTED

Although some hot issues are to be decided and hot races expected in some neighboring cities, the spring election in Kewaskum next Tuesday, Apr. 5, is expected to be a quiet one. The polls at the municipal building will be open from 9 a. m. until 6 p. m.

The main interest locally will be for the three trustee offices. There are five candidates for the offices, including Arvin Merwin and Joseph Schwind, who are incumbents, and three newcomers, Harold Degner, John Geidel and Harry Heinecke. In the only other village office to be elected this year Robert G. Kroncke is unopposed for justice of the peace. All of the offices will be for two year terms.

In addition to the local contests Kewaskum voters will cast ballots for two county judges—for Branch 1 and the newly created Branch 2. Lester A. Buckley, who was appointed to succeed Judge Milton L. Meister when the latter took over his duties as judge of the newly created 25th judicial circuit of Washington and Ozaukee counties, is unopposed for the position of judge of Branch 1 of county court. Theodore W. Simester and Robert J. Stoltz, both West Bend attorneys, are seeking election as judge of the newly created Branch 2 of county court.

Voters will also cast their ballots for their presidential choices on the Republican and Democratic ballots and will choose delegates to the party conventions as well as for district delegates to the national convention. On the presidential ballot Richard Nixon is a candidate for president on the GOP ticket and is unopposed, while Senators Hubert Humphrey and John Kennedy are seeking the Democratic nomination for president. Voters are reminded that they cannot "split" their presidential preferential ballot.

On the state level a referendum will also be placed before the voters asking whether: "Shall section 10 of article VIII of the state constitution be amended to permit the state to make appropriations for the improvement of port facilities?"

Ralph Albrecht—Extemporaneous Reading.

Sharon Harbeck—Interpretative Reading.

Robert Kroncke—Four Minute Speech.

Carol Schladweiler—Memorized Declamation.

These four students will now take part in the state forensic contest to be held in Madison on Saturday, Apr. 9.

Some 500 speakers from northeastern Wisconsin high schools entered the district competition at Oshkosh State college Saturday with hopes of winning an "A" rating which would send them on to state level competition of the Wisconsin High School Forensic association. All were "A" rating winners at league levels.

A. F. Christ, New London, district director of the association, reported that students were entered in original oratory, non-original oratory, 4-minute speech, extemporaneous speaking, extemporaneous reading, interpretative reading, play reading and memorized declamation, both humorous and non-humorous.

Twenty-five judges were secured for the contest. In addition to judges from Oshkosh college, judges came from Marquette university, the University of Wisconsin, Ripon college, St. Norbert college, Carroll college and other area schools.

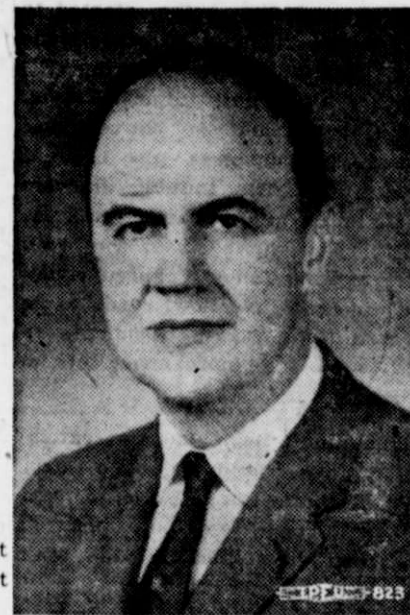

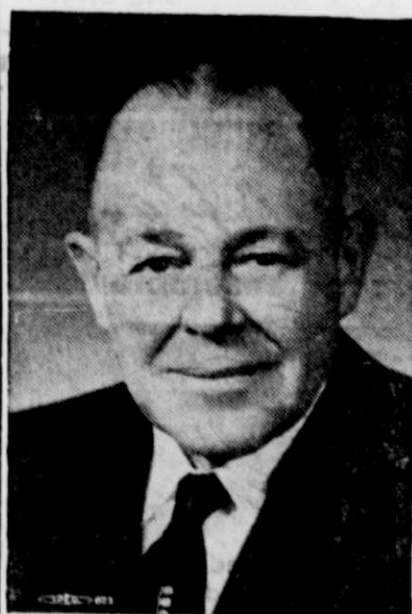
