9 Students Chosen to Represent Local High School at County Day

In an all-school election on Tuesday, April 5, nine students were chosen to represent Kewaskum Community High school at County Day in West Bend, April 27.

Candidates for the offices were chosen at a primary election. Each candidate was associated with either the Federalist or Nationalist party with the exception of judge and county superintendent of schools, which were non-partisan.

There were contests for all offices except clerk of court in which the winner, Nationalist Sharon Harbeck, was un-opposed.

For county judge, Timothy Coulter defeated Donald Theusch. Ralph Albrecht won the position of county superintendent of schools from Judith Theusch.

The Nationalists won six of the seven political offices. The only Federalist victory was in the district attorney vote where Robert Kroncke won over Gerald Dreher.

Other Nationalist winners were Sue Sengpiel, who defeated Leon Guntly for county clerk; Joanne Kempf, county treasurer elect who won over Diane Becker; Marianne Schmidt, who won the position of register of deeds over Catherine Pesch; Konstantyn Sadownikow, elected county sheriff, defeated Patricia Edwards, and Elaine Bruessel who won the county board of supervisors post from Mariel Seefeldt.



Around the Town

The old timers who are still with us have many a pleasant memory of the days of the nickel beer, free lunch and 15 cent pail of beer put out at the tavern, the fun on the two bowling alleys 50 and more years

ago, the favorite German lunches like hassempfeffer, sauerbraten, wiener schnitzel, homemade sauerkraut and many others served by Joe and his wife and his father and mother before him, which made the beer garden known throughout the state; the beagle hound trials and shows which attracted dog men from many states. Eberle's was always sports headquarters for dog men and women, bowlers, baseball and basketball teams, hunters and fishermen, and card games whether it was hi, lo jack in the game, poker, schafskopf, skat or what have you? Like the tavern, most of the old customers are also now gone. The business passed through the eras of two or three wars, the prohibition days, disappearance of the horse and buggy and appearance of automobiles, the slot machines, ticket jars, punch boards, poultry raffles, etc., etc. There were many good times and pranks pulled but sometimes there were scuffles, too. Quite a few "famous" expressions which are still talked about originated there. But how do we know, we weren't even born yet when the "saloon" was in its heyday?

The property now belongs to the Peace church and as soon as the buildings were gone work was

started immediately this week on the parish's new \$80,000 educational building addition. Work on the foundation of the building is already well along.

burg this past Sunday evening. Renewal applications have been received by the cities of West Bend and Hartford, villages of Slinger and Fredonia, for their children's fishing ponds. Fish will be distributed some time in May. This year the department plans to plant a fair number of large size catfish in addition to the usual amount of panfish.



Problems of Aged to Be Studied in Classes

As a result of many studies and surveys, it has been learned that with a few basic health hints many oldsters and their families can overcome obstacles which had seemed insurmountable.

Beginning Wednesday, April 27, at 7:30 p. m. a series of five free classes will be offered on "How to Care for the Oldster in the Home" to give families in this area the opportunity to bring their problems and discuss basic health hints. These classes are being sponsored by the Washington county public health nurses, St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, and the Cedar Lake Home for the Aging.

All of the sessions will be held at the Cedar Lake Home for the Aging and will include information in regard to general attitudes of and general helps for living with the oldsters; general health and safety practices including cleanliness, activity, and diet; nursing care including pointers on skin care, dental care, and other helpful suggestions; and general information in regard to lifting, bed positioning, adaptations of simple exercises; plus ways to keep the oldster occupied with purposeful activity.

The Cedar Lake Home for the Aging is located about two miles west of West Bend on Highway 33, then south on County Trunk Z about 2 1/2 miles.

We hope that you will be able to take advantage of one or all of these sessions beginning Wednesday, April 27.
