Village Opens Bids on Proposed Street Improvement Program

9 Bids Received; Contracts to Be Awarded Friday

PROGRAM WILL INCLUDE NEW SIDEWALK, CURB & GUTTER, STORM SEWERS, STREET LIGHTS, STREET WORK

The Village Board of Kewaskum, at its meeting on Monday evening of this week, held the formal opening and public reading of bids on the proposed street improvement program.

A total of nine bids were received with six contractors bidding on the sidewalk, curb and gutter, storm sewer and street work and three contractors bidding on the street lighting proposal.

All bids received were substantially lower than the engineers' estimates.

Formal awarding of the contract will be at 7:30 p. m. Friday, April 22, after all bids have been tabulated and checked for errors.

The scope of the work involved under these proposals is as follows:

MAIN STREET—

New sidewalk is to be built on each side from Fond du Lac avenue to the end of the present walk near the east village limits, with the exception of about 300 ft. in front of the church and on the north side of the street from the river to River View drive. Some of the sidewalk is being replaced because it does not meet the grade of the new curb and not on account of its condition.

Curb and gutter will be installed from River View drive on the north and the river on the south to the east village limits. The roadway width will be 44 ft.

Storm sewer and catch basins will be installed from the railroad to Stark street.

On the east side of the river, the street will be graded and graveled between the present pavement and the new curb and gutter.

New street lights will be installed the entire length of the street.

STARK STREET—

Keller street north: Curb and gutter both sides.

Habeck street south: Curb and gutter west side.

Main Street to Highland: Curb and gutter, grade and gravel.

KEWASKUM STREET—

Highland street south: Curb and gutter, grade and gravel.

HIGHLAND STREET—

Kewaskum street to east end of street: Curb and gutter, grade and gravel. Present curb and gutter to remain. Install catch basins at Highland and Stark intersection.

RIVER VIEW DRIVE—

Main street north: Replace 340 ft. of sidewalk on east side. Curb and gutter on east side from Main to Habeck street and on west side to end of present curb. Roadway width to be 40 ft. Grade and gravel approximately 4 ft. strip along each gutter.

Award Bernard Murray Science Fellowship

Bernard A. Murray, agriculture teacher at Kewaskum High School, has been awarded a National Science Foundation fellowship to a summer institute at Wisconsin State college at River Falls.

The institutes, supported by the National Science Foundation, are designed for high school instructors who are teaching a combination of agriculture and science or mathematics courses. Two four-week institutes will be conducted: June 13 to July 9, and July 11 to Aug. 6. Murray has been selected for the first institute.

To be eligible for the programs, a participant must have taught at least two years, must be teaching agriculture and at least one class in science or mathematics, and must not be more than 55 years old.

Approximately 60 fellowships have been awarded to men selected from a group of more than 400 applicants.

Each participant will be paid a stipend of \$75 a week, in addition to an allowance of \$15 a week for each dependent, up to a maximum of four. Participants will not be charged tuition or fees.

Courses of the institutes are intended to bring agriculture teachers up to date on latest developments in the applied and basic sciences. The following courses will be offered: Recent chemical advancements in agriculture, and selected basic concepts in chemistry.

Mrs. Edward F. Miller now is enjoying her retirement, living with her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Mehring in West Bend. The oldest daughter is Sister Mary Aquin, who is superior at Cardinal Stritch college, Milwaukee.

In 1928 Edward E. Miller, better known as "Pat," and his wife Maye entered into partnership with "Pat's" parents and since that time the latter has managed the business. Maye has been his lady assistant at the funeral home all this time.

Later his brothers, Joe and Fred, became active in the business. Joe is still with Miller's, being active at the store and funeral home. Fred now is in the home furnishings decorator business at Apple Valley, Calif.

Mary Ellen, oldest daughter of Maye and Pat, was active in the business until her marriage to John McElhatton. Two other daughters, Joan (Mrs. Paul Dean) and Isabelle are both active in the firm, doing a fine job assisting ladies and newlyweds with their home furnishing problems. Edward J., the oldest son, is also active at the store and funeral home. He is now serving as apprentice funeral director and embalmer. Ted and Clare are the youngest members of the Miller family and both are attending Kewaskum High school. They are also beginning to help at the store.

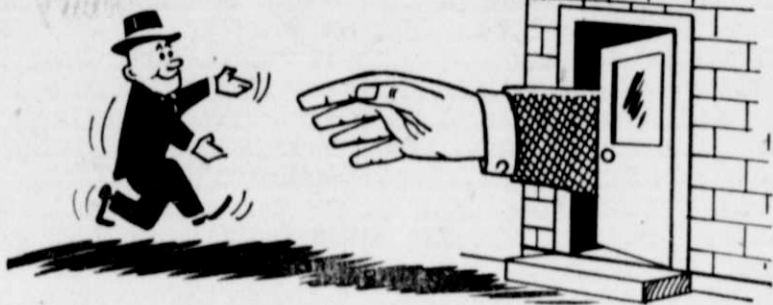

25 Years Ago

Basier is the fourth Kewaskum player in the past two years to go to the bigger leagues. Other players developed here were: Stan Hodge, who is trying out with Grand Rapids; Eddie Murray, Cincinnati Reds of the National league, and Fabian "Able" Gaffke, who is expected to be a regular outfielder with the Minneapolis Millers of the American Association this season with veterans like Holland, Harriss and "Buzz" Arlett. Gaffke led the Badger league in batting two years ago as did Murray last year.

A surprise announcement was made this week by Gregory Harter of this village that he and Miss Helen Sabish of Elmore are married and have been so for the past year. The wedding took place in Milwaukee Apr. 10, 1934. Also recently married were Elizabeth Koehler of Barton and Joseph Metz of the town of Auburn.

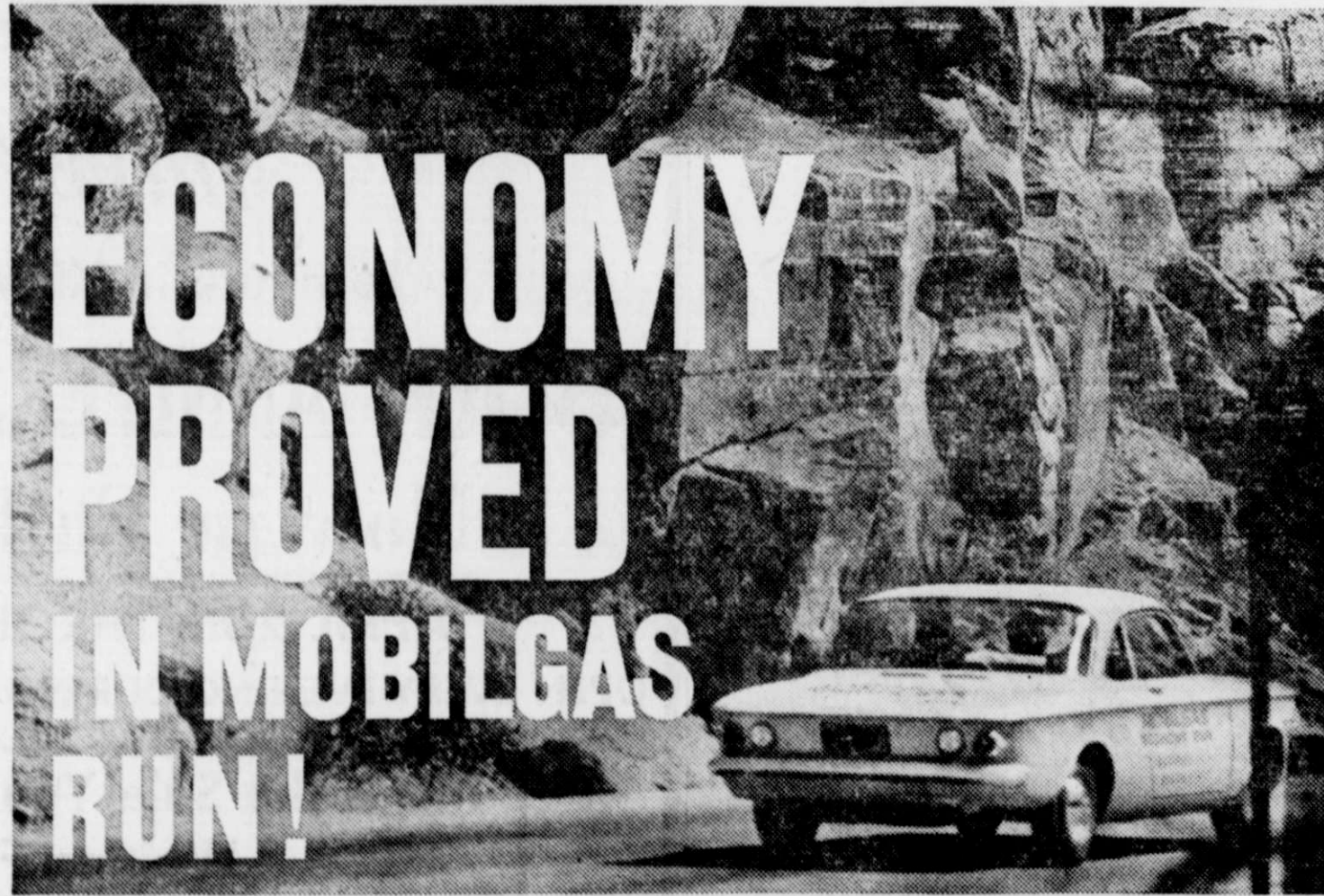

Your County Conservation Congress hearing will be held on Monday, May 2, at 8:00 p. m. at the court house, West Bend.

At this meeting you will have an opportunity to vote on and discuss hunting regulations for the coming year, fishing regulations for the coming year, and elect a regular

member and an alternate to your County Congress committee. The regular member will be elected for three years and the alternate for two years.

The game and fish questionnaires will cover any proposed regulation changes for 1960. You may also propose and discuss any other change in the regulations you think would be advisable. Just because they are not on the questionnaire, does not mean they cannot be made a part of the record and the recommendations of the group. In most cases, the proper time during the hearing to do this is under county suggestions. If you have some good logical changes you believe to be necessary, you should by all means bring them up for discussion at your Conservation Congress hearing and be prepared to give as much background, facts and figures as possible to sell your idea to the group.

We want and need your ideas and suggestions for better and simplified regulations which are both workable and enforceable. The proper time and place to make your suggestions is at your Conservation Congress hearing on May 2. Let's all plan now to be there

and take part in the discussions. Your attendance will be greatly appreciated.

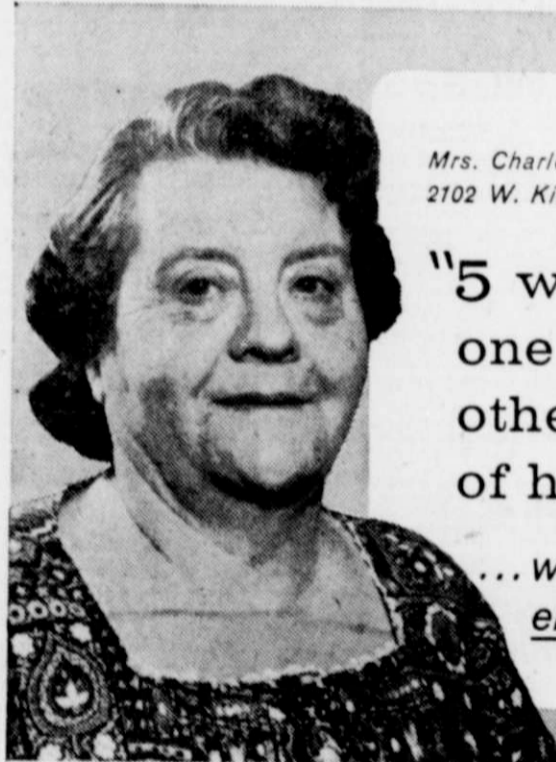

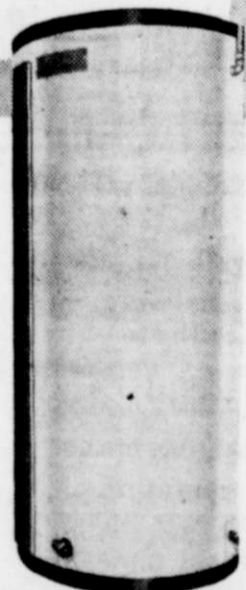
