Village Street Improvement Program Contract Awarded to Appleton Co. on \$116,584 Bid

Kiel Firm's Bid of \$18,750 for Street Lights Is Accepted

Adjourned Meeting, April 22, 1960

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in adjourned session with president Reigle presiding and all board members present.

This meeting was called for the purpose of awarding the contracts for the proposed street improvement program.

The low bidder for the general construction work was Warren Wieseler Construction, Inc. of 730 West Glendale Ave., Appleton, Wis. The bid was \$116,584.00.

Motion was made by J. Eberle and seconded by W. Tessar that the Wieseler bid shall be accepted. Motion was unanimously carried with all members present, on roll call, voting "aye."

Motion was made by H. Degner, seconded by J. Geidel that the new street lights on Main street shall be Line Material conventional mercury luminaires with a pole mounted ballast. Motion was carried on roll call vote, all members present, voting "aye."

The low bidder for the street lighting contract was Household Utilities, Inc., 604 Fremont Street, Kiel, Wisconsin, in the amount of \$18,750.00.

Motion was made by W. Tessar and seconded by H. Degner that the bid of Household Utilities be accepted. Motion carried on roll call vote, all members present voting "aye."

The following resolution was introduced by Trustee C. N. Wietor.

RESOLUTION NO. 60-1

WHEREAS, the Village of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin (hereinafter called the "Village"), is presently in need of funds aggregating \$150,000.00, for the following purposes, to-wit:

For the construction of curb and gutter, sidewalk, storm sewers, and for excavation, furnish and place gravel for new and existing streets and the installation of a new street lighting system on Main Street;

and

WHEREAS, the Village Board deems it necessary and in the best interests of the Village that, pursuant to the provisions of Section 67.12 (12), Wisconsin Statutes, the sum of \$150,000.00 be borrowed upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth for the purposes hereinabove stated:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that for the purposes hereinabove set forth the President and Clerk be and they hereby are authorized, empowered and directed, pursuant to Section 67.12 (12), Wisconsin Statutes, to borrow from Bank of Kewaskum, Kewaskum, Wisconsin (hereinafter called the "Lender"), the aggregate sum of \$150,000.00 and, to evidence such indebtedness, said Village President

Civil Defense Alert Here Is Fine Success

The Civil Defense alert which began at 1 p. m. on Tuesday received excellent cooperation and was a huge success in Kewaskum, according to Marvin Martin, CD director.

Martin, Police Chief Roland Pledl, the 15 auxiliary policemen who participated, firemen and everyone else who participated in the "Alert 1960" exercises are to be congratulated on their fine co-operation.

At the sound of the take cover siren police and auxiliary members immediately took positions on streets and corners throughout the village, halting traffic and clearing the streets of people. At the same time Chief Pledl sped from one point to another to take and give messages to his men on patrol. The highways leading into Kewaskum were also patrolled so that no vehicles could enter or leave the village during the seven minutes the exercise was in effect.

The school children left their classrooms in orderly fashion and proceeded into the basement of the school, where they stood with their faces against the inside walls, away from all windows.

Only one person was spotted on the street during the alert. The test failed to cause any excitement or confusion here, but residents cooperated 100% as the streets were completely bare.

Looking Thru the Field Glasses . . .

BY BOB LAKE

Washington County Conservation Warden

Due to the cold weather this week end, the opening of the fishing season in Washington and Ozaukee counties was a dismal flop. The largest concentration was at Wallace lake. The sight of gas lanterns on the boats made one think of opening night on the Wolf river near Hortonville. No records were broken, and as daylight approached, not to exceed ten rainbow trout of the four thousand planted had been caught.

A crowd of eighty-eight sportsmen attended the Washington County Fish and Game Hearing the evening of May 2. The members of the committee are as follows: G. E. Otten, West Bend, chairman; Roland Miller, Slinger, and Herbert Sponholz, Jackson, regular members; Louis A. Lattses, R. 3, West Bend and Anthony Theisen, R. 1 Hubertus, alternate members.

Fishing regulations would not change a great deal from the recommendations made at the 1959 hearing. It was voted to remove the bag limit from cisco and to permit cutting holes for sturgeon spearing 48 hours in advance of the season.

The request of the department to prohibit shooting from roads and railroad tracks in the vicinity of Horicon marsh was voted down 12 to 1, as was the request to Prohibit shooting geese from outside a blind on private lands in the 2:30 p. m. closing area. The attempt to space blinds 75 yards apart was also defeated.

The department's recommendations on a deer season in the state

were accepted, Washington county to have a spike buck season, unless surrounding counties request an any deer season. Bow and arrow hunters requested a repeat of the 1959 season.

It was voted to have a repeat of the 1959 seasons on upland game birds and animals.

The vote to open a season on morning doves in the western part of the state was defeated 39 to 6.

It is now legal to spear carp and suckers (day light hours only) in Washington and Ozaukee counties. You may not spear in a trout stream, a fish refuge, and you must stay two hundred feet away from a dam.

Be sure that you have your BOAT CERTIFICATE OF NUMBER in the event you plan to use a motor on it.

The impact of thousands of uncontrolled hunters on farm lands is fast causing property owners to regard game as a nuisance, according to J. R. Smith, superintendent of Game Management of the Wisconsin Conservation Department.

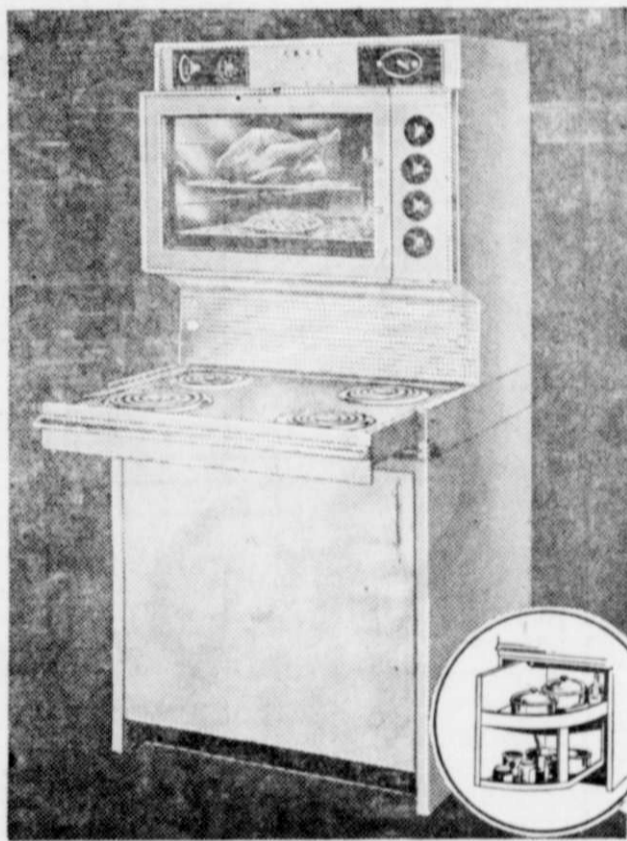

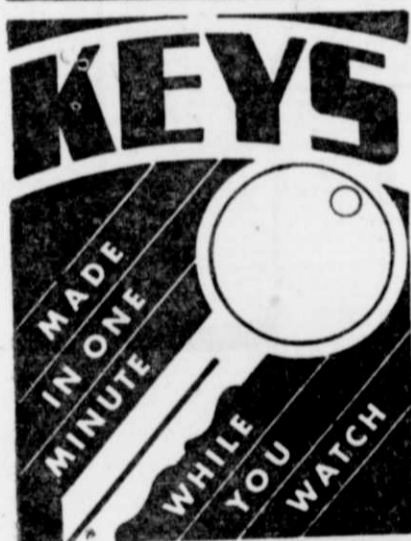
