Indians Edged By Fond du Lac, 3-2, in WIAA District Tournament

It was like David facing Goliath as Kewaskum, a small school in comparison, was matched against big Fond du Lac high school in its opening game of the WIAA district baseball tournament at Fairgrounds park in Fond du Lac Monday. But Fond du Lac Goodrich High of the Fox River Valley league narrowly squeezed past the Indians, 3 to 2, in a tight game.

In the opening contest of the tourney at 3 p. m. Monday North Fond du Lac nosed out Campbellspport, 4-3, and the Fond du Lac-Kewaskum battle followed at 5 p. m. Other schools in the meet, Oakfield and Lomira, drew first round byes. The second round of games was scheduled for Thursday with North Fondy meeting Oakfield at 3 p. m. and Fond du Lac taking on Lomira at five. The winners of Thursday's games will meet at 1:30 p. m. Saturday for the district championship and the right to advance in state tournament play.

Southpaw Jim Kalk was in fine form for the Fond du Lac Cardinals as he fanned 13 and hurled a one-hitter in beating Kewaskum. The lefty gave up one run in the first when the go go Indians stole four bases and took advantage of an error and a walk. An error, sacrifice and the Indians' only hit by Don Theusch set up the team's second run in the third. Kalk became tougher as the tift progressed and whiffed eight of the last 12 batters he faced.

Kalk also knocked in one run and was credited with an infield hit. His mound foe, Otto Ramthun, also was hard to handle for the Cardinals. In five innings he gave up only two hits, but was removed in the sixth when he showed signs of tiring by issuing his seventh walk to Fondy's Jim Schmit. The walk provided the Cardinals with the winning run, with Schmit scoring on a deep sacrifice fly to left by Shortstop Dick Wirtz.

Fond du Lac trailed 2-0 until the fourth when walks to Brunau and Engel, plus a hit by Schmit and a sacrifice fly by Kalk tied the game. Ramthun held Goodrich High without a hit the first three innings. Dave Oppermann, his replacement, surrendered one hit and struck out one, Jerry Floyd, Schmit and Kalk had the only three hits for the Cards.

DRIVE CAREFULLY

150 Ice Age Hikers Meet Here for Walk In Kettle Moraine

Some 150 men, women and children from many points in Wisconsin met in Kewaskum, the assembly point for the beginning of a four-hour hike through the Kettle Moraine area, Sunday morning at about 10:30 o'clock.

The occasion was the second annual Ice Age National Park hike, led by Rep. Henry S. Reuss (D-5th), who introduced a bill in Congress two years ago aimed at creating such a park, and Raymond T. Zillmer, a Wauwatosa attorney, who is chairman of the Citizens Committee supporting Reuss' bill.

The hike was made through the rugged Kettle Moraine sector near Dundee where the actual tramping began. The event was held for the second straight year and sunny, clear skies greeted the enthusiastic hikers. The warm sun reddened noses and necks of the group as they peeled off outer clothes.

Clyde Smith of Mauthe lake, area supervisor of the Wisconsin Conservation Department, also accompanied the walkers on their hike and explained points of interest. The four mile trail had been well marked before the tramp by yellow paint and ribbons. Smith also pointed out a floating bog in a bend of the river and informed the group that over 100 deer were shot there with bows and shotguns during the past season.

From one point at the top of a moraine, the hikers halted to look at the village of Dundee, at round-topped Dundee mountain to the northeast, and at wind-wrinkled Kettle Moraine lake to the west. The group ate lunch on a ridge bisecting a marsh and brief talks by Reuss, Smith, Zillmer and Clarence (Mickey) O'Connor followed.

The hikes were instituted to create interest in the establishment of an Ice Age National Park in Wisconsin which, in the original plans for the venture, would wind about 500 miles through the Kettle Moraine area to preserve it as an outdoor "fun and recreation" area—and also preserve the natural beauty and wildlife of the region.

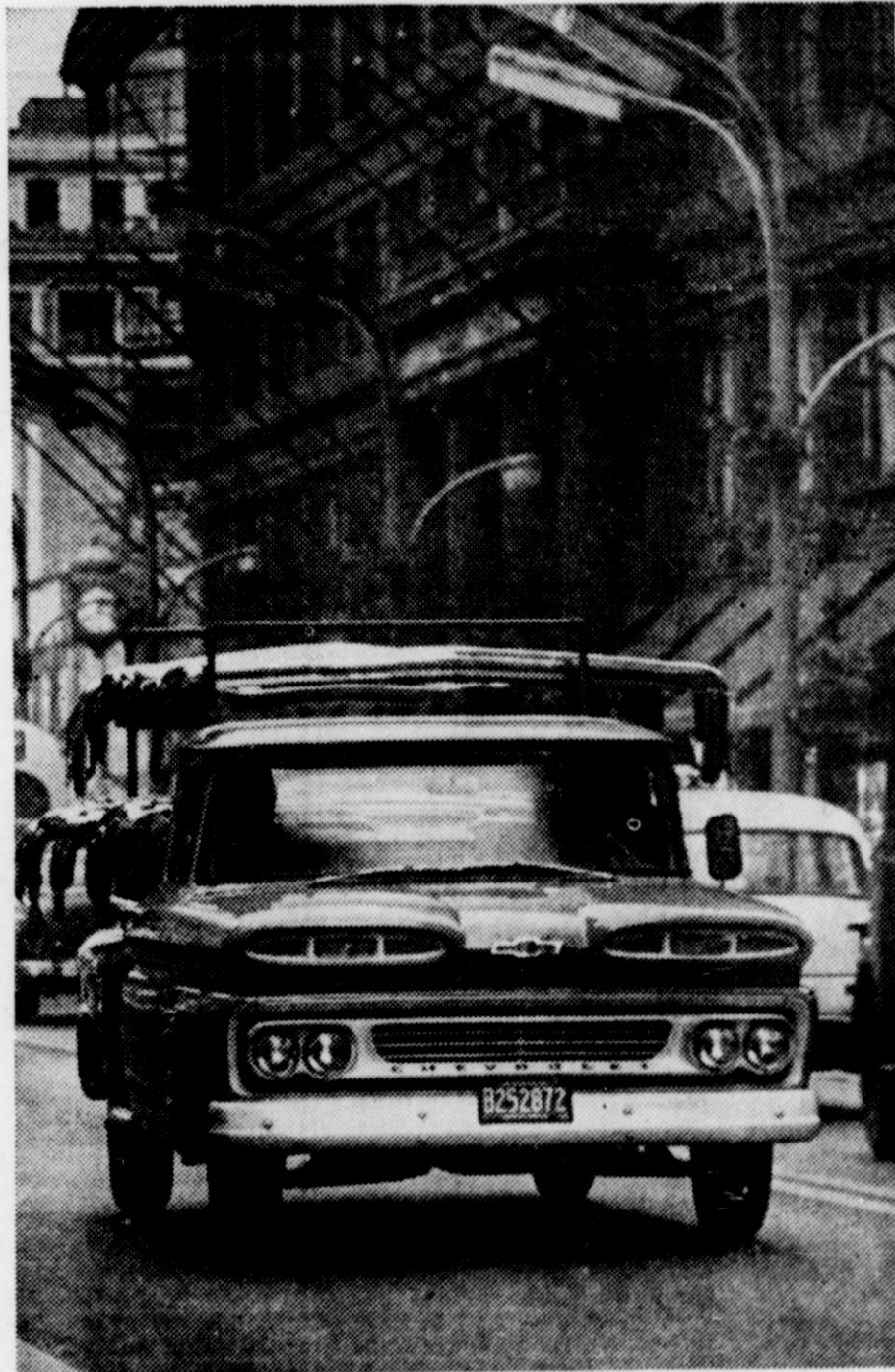
