Toy Bullet Swallowed By Boy Lodges in Lung, Removed By Surgery

Dean Martin, 11, son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Martin, 1199 Kewaskum st., accidentally swallowed a plastic toy bullet which he was holding in his mouth on Tuesday morning at his home.

The boy was removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, where x-rays were taken. Because the toy bullet was plastic, the x-rays did not show it and could not locate the object.

Dean was then rushed to Milwaukee Children's hospital where immediate surgery was performed to remove the bullet, which had lodged in the right lung. The bullet was imbedded in the right side of the lung, the use of which had already immobilized. As a result of being collapsed, the lung was no longer functioning.

The boy withstood the operation very well and is coming along so nicely that he could be returned to the West Bend hospital on Wednesday.

The little son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Weddig, born Apr. 4, was christened by Rev. Gadow Sunday. He received the name Henry Orin.

Sylvester Terlinden, popular young piano accordionist of this village, was featured on a 15 minute radio program Monday evening over station KPZZ, Fond du Lac.

About 70 sportsmen of the county met at the court house in West Bend with officers being elected and an advisory council to Game Warden R. J. Lake. John F. Schaeffer of Kewaskum was one of the members elected to the game committee.

At a meeting of the West Bend Moose band, officers were elected. They are A. G. Hron, Kewaskum, director; Anthony Fellenz, Kewaskum, treasurer; J. J. Wilkomm, West Bend, manager; Frank Hron, West Bend, secretary. A number of local men are members of the band.

Liberty bonds, totalling \$7,660, which were stolen from Mich. Pesch and his sister Katie on Apr. 23, 1933, were recovered at Chicago Sunday. The brutal torture robbery which occurred on the Pesch farm northeast of Kewaskum, was believed near solution with the questioning by Chicago police of two men. The loot taken at the Pesch home by four bandits exceeded \$10,000 of which \$7,660 was in bonds. When the bonds were called in by the government watch was kept for the stolen serials and \$3,500 of the Pesch loot was traced to Al Goranson, private detective, and the wife of one Izzy Lazarus.

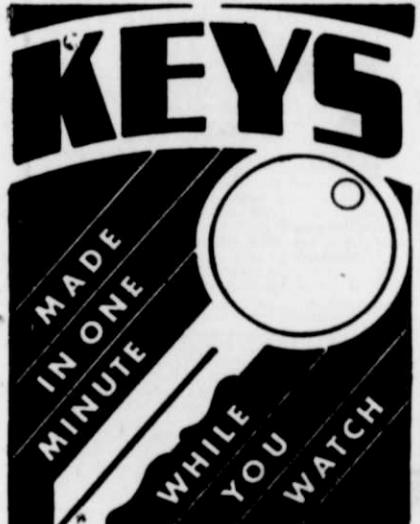
