Village Population Grows To 1,569, Increase of 381

Census Figures Reveal Sizable Rise in 10 Years

POPULATION OF COUNTY UP 12,109 TO 45,990; TOWN OF KEWASKUM UP 79

Census figures released the past week reveal that the village of Kewaskum showed a very substantial growth in the past 10 years. The population increased from 1,188 in 1950 to 1,569 in 1960, a growth of 381 persons. This rise compares very highly with the average increase in other communities and proves that Kewaskum is getting to be a good-sized little city.

The 1960 figures are believed to be substantially correct but are subject to revision after the returns for non-residents are credited to their proper locality and other routine checks have been made. The official announcement will be made at a later date by the director of the Bureau of Census.

The figures show that the population of Washington county increased by 12,109 persons, from 33,881 in 1950 to 45,990 in 1960. The town of Kewaskum registered an increase of 79 persons, from 823 to 902. Among the villages, Barton increased by the greatest number of persons, 529. Germantown, however, showed the greatest rise percentage-wise, boosting its population by 74 per cent.

Numerically, Jackson showed the smallest gain among the villages, increasing by 94 persons. The village of Slinger, with a 24 per cent increase, showed the smallest increase percentage-wise. The greatest growth made in the county occurred in the town of Germantown, where 1,863 more persons were counted in 1960. The town of Wayne registered the only loss of any municipality. It has 48 less people in 1960 than in 1950.

Heinemann-Kewaskum Label on Dairy Cases Replaced By Fairmont

Fairmont Foods Co. last week replaced the familiar Heinemann-Kewaskum labels on cartons of milk, ice cream, cottage cheese and other dairy products produced at the local plant. As a result there is a new name in food store dairy cases in the areas surrounding Kewaskum and the Milwaukee area, where most of the products are sold.

While the Fairmont label may be new to many customers in this area, it's a well known name in the food field in other parts of the nation and other areas in Wisconsin. Company officials stressed that only the name will be changed.

Fairmont was established 76 years ago in Nebraska, and the company now has branches and sales outlets in 33 states. The company has owned and operated a large dairy plant in Green Bay for many years and acquired the Heinemann-Kewaskum dairy in August of 1957.

C. S. Geiger, manager of the Kewaskum plant, said the change in brand name was made to improve administrative efficiency and to take advantage of advertising and merchandising programs planned by Fairmont. Long range plans call for the expansion of the Kewaskum plant's marketing area into territories where the Fairmont name is better known than that of Heinemann-Kewaskum.

Geiger said the change will not affect operations, personnel nor the quality standards for products of the Kewaskum plant.

NEW APARTMENT BUILDING, HOME GOING UP IN VILLAGE

Work is well along on a new, four-apartment building being erected by the Golden Rule Builders on the corner of Kewaskum and Habeck streets on the east side of the village.

Work has also started on a new home being built by Walter Meyer of West Bend at the end of North ave.

Robert Kroncke at Badger Boys State

Robert Kroncke, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kroncke, Sr., Kewaskum, is one of 780 boys, 16 to 18 years of age, who are now junior classmen in Wisconsin high schools who converged upon Ripon college the week of June 11-18 as the American Legion holds its 19th annual Badger Boys' State. Kroncke's week at Boys' State is co-sponsored by the Kewaskum Kiwanis club and Robert G. Romaine American Legion Post 384.

The largest in history, this year's Boys' State is an effort on the part of the American Legion to bring to the boys of Wisconsin a knowledge of the fundamental principles of our American government through actual practice in the duties of the city, county and state offices for a week's period. The program is entirely non-political.

Upon arrival at the Ripon college campus, the boys are grouped into cities and counties which form a mythical state. The boys are separated into two mythical parties—"Nationalist" and "Federalist" and commence to form city, county and state governments. Elections are held and the climax of the eight-day event was Thursday evening, June 16, when the newly elected governor was inaugurated.

The oath of office was administered by Justice Grover L. Broadfoot of the Wisconsin Supreme Court, who formally installed other state officers as well as members of the Boys' State Supreme Court. Gov. Gaylord Nelson gave the main address of the inaugural ceremony. Major General Ralph J. Olson, adjutant general of Wisconsin, acted as marshal. Other dignitaries were in attendance. Each year a Boys' State band and chorus are organized.

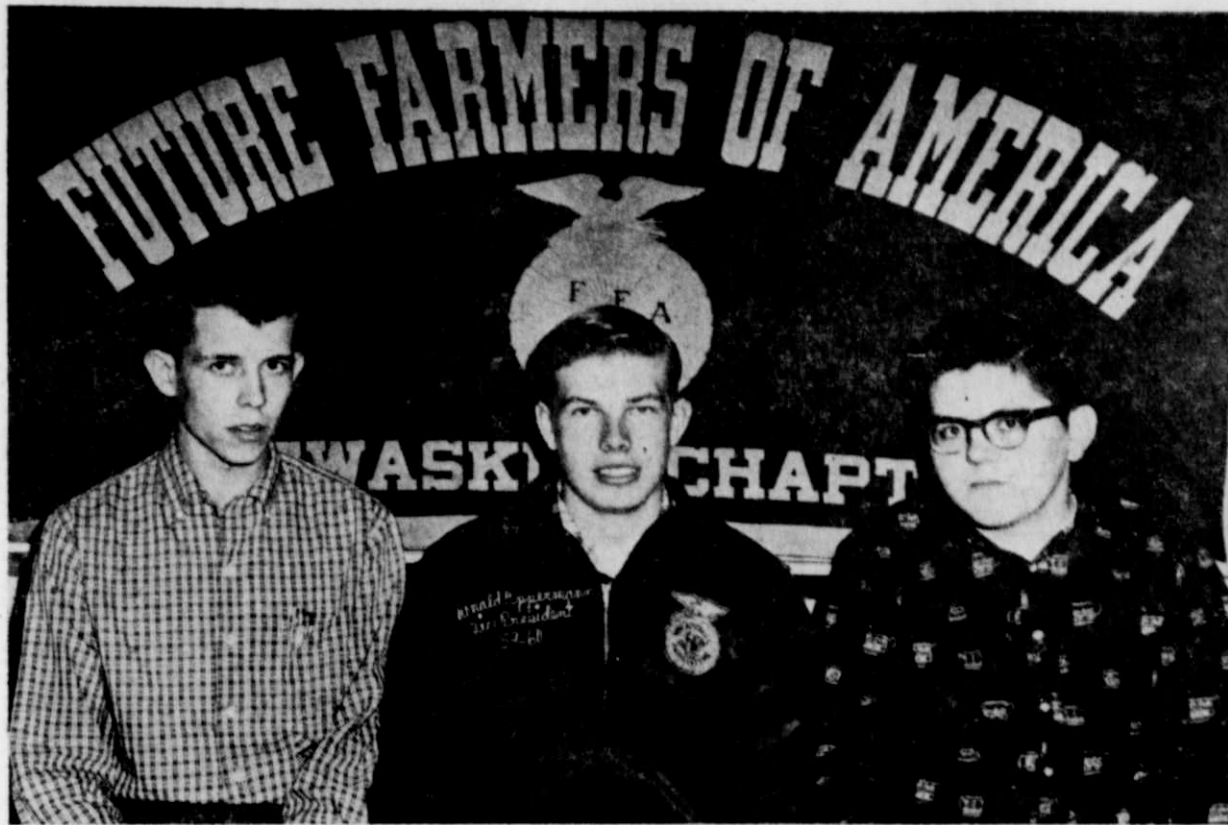

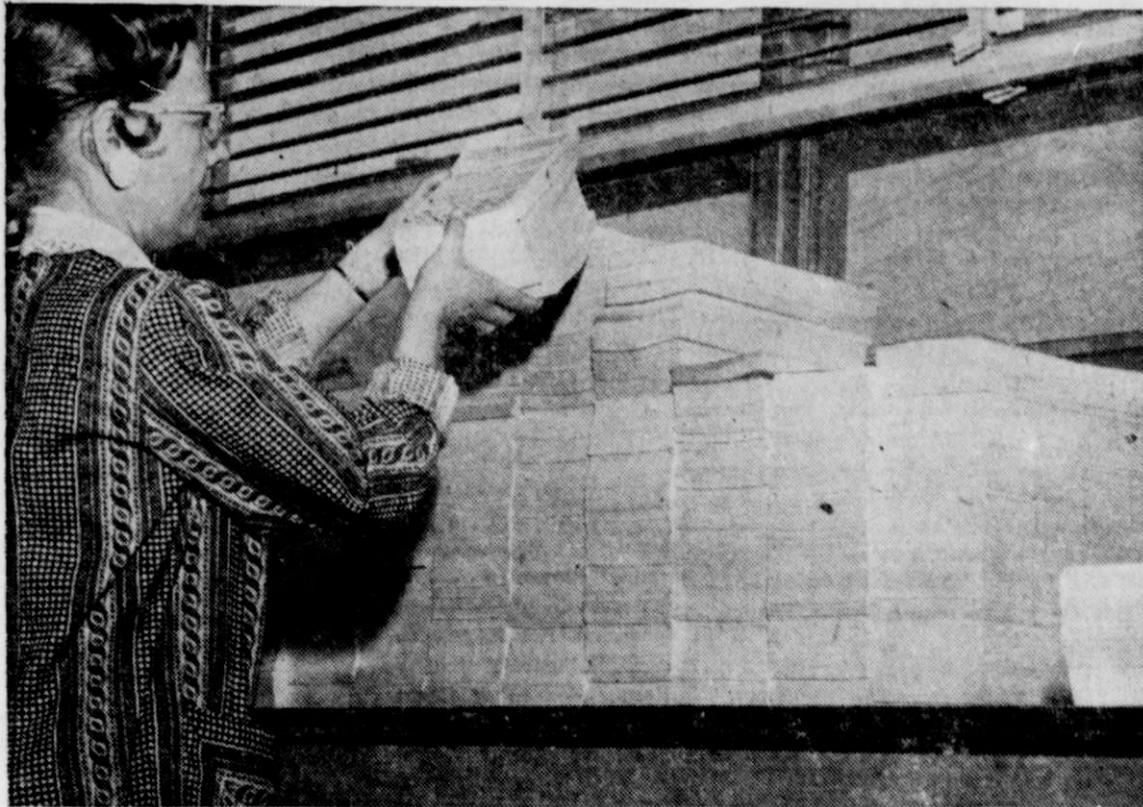

Child Bitten By Rabid Cat; Pets Quarantined

A quarantine notice affecting all dogs and cats in the Town of Germantown was issued Tuesday by Vernon Kauth, town clerk, after a 3½ year old girl was bitten by a stray cat which was later discovered to be infected with rabies.

Under terms of the order, township residents are required to keep all dogs and cats confined on their premises and the animals may not be transported out of the township until further notice, probably for two or three weeks.

Victim of the mishap was Mary Ann Osborne, daughter of the Joseph Osbornes, R. 1, Germantown. The child was bitten by a stray cat last Thursday while playing in a neighbor's yard. The cat bit Mary when she petted it. A neighbor man, who helped round up the animal was also attacked by the cat which nipped his trouser leg but did not harm him. The animal was captured and Harold Spurgin, town constable, shot it and sent the cat's head to the state health department at Madison for analysis.

Monday the state reported that the cat was rabid and immediate action was taken for further treatment of the child. A Menomonee Falls physician administered the first of a series of 14 to 21 "shots" of the new vaccine used in treating persons bitten or scratched by rabid animals. Doctors report that the new vaccine, which has become available in recent years, is entirely safe and has no ill effects. It has proven highly successful in combatting possible infection by rabid animals.

Dr. James Albrecht, Washington county coroner, Kauth and area doctors urge all residents to be especially alert for stray dogs and

cats and to immediately report any animal which might be "acting strangely" to offset possible further recurrences of such attacks. The quarantine order was issued as a precautionary measure to help educate county residents in the proper procedure to follow in the event of like incidents. Parents are urged to warn their children not to play with strange animals.
