June 6, 1960

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin, met in regular monthly session with President Reigle presiding and all board members present except Trustee John Geidel.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved upon motion by C. Wietor, seconded by J. Eberle and duly carried.

Upon the motion by W. Tessar, seconded by A. Merwin and duly carried, the fees for election officials were established as follows:

Election Inspector—\$10.00 per day
Election Clerk—\$10.00 per day
Ballot Clerk—\$8.00 per day

The chairman of the election inspectors will receive \$1.00 extra for delivering the election results to the court house.

The wage rate for all seasonal part time help such as grass cutting, lifeguard, snow shoveling, general clean-up work, etc. was established at \$1.00 per hour upon motion by W. Tessar, seconded by J. Eberle and duly carried.

Robert Berg was hired as chief lifeguard at the bathing beach in the Village Park, hours of supervised swimming to be from 9:30 a. m. to 12 noon and from 1:30 p. m. to 6:00 p. m. daily. Swimming at all other times is at the risk of the individual. Beach to be officially opened June 20 and closed on Labor Day.

Tractor Rolls Over in Field, Catches Fire

FIRE DEPARTMENT ANSWERS TWO CALLS; ALSO PUTS OUT SHED BLAZE

The fire department was summoned to the Arnold Bier farm in the town of Kewaskum, southeast of the village, at about 3:30 p. m. last Friday to snuff out a blaze on a tractor which started to burn after tipping over in a field.

The tractor was driven by Louis Seefeldt of this village, who was assisting Bier making hay on the farm. When Seefeldt turned the tractor, which was pulling a hay crusher, near the bottom of a hill in the field, the vehicle tipped over. Seefeldt jumped clear of the tractor and was not injured but the machine, which came to rest upside down, caught fire.

With the aid of another machine, the men succeeded in righting the tractor. Bier stuffed green hay around the burning parts and had the flames under control when firemen arrived. His face and arms were singed in fighting the flames and Seefeldt suffered a minor burn on his arm. Both the tractor and crusher were damaged.

At 10:30 a. m. Wednesday the firemen were called to the Al Wagner home on Hwy. 45 at the south end of the Kewaskum hill. Wagner was burning down a shed on his property which he intends to replace. The shed was covered with tar paper and the fire developed into a threatening blaze. Because the flames and smoke were being blown directly toward the nearby house in a high wind and due to the danger, the firemen extinguished the fire.

DON MATHIES BUYS NEW FANE SCHOOL BUILDING

The 55-year-old New Fane school house was sold at public auction last Sunday. The building, located in the village of New Fane, will be converted into a family dwelling.

The school was sold to Donald Mathies, R. 1, Kewaskum, for \$2,100. It stands on a tract of land which has a 200 foot frontage by a 200 foot depth, with an additional 100 by 60 foot area set at a right angle to the first. The building is 30 by 42 feet with hardwood floors and a full basement. It is heated with a new oil furnace.

The school closed last year when the New Fane district merged with the Kewaskum Union High School District. Auctioneers Gene and Sylvester Otten of Barton sold the building for the school district.

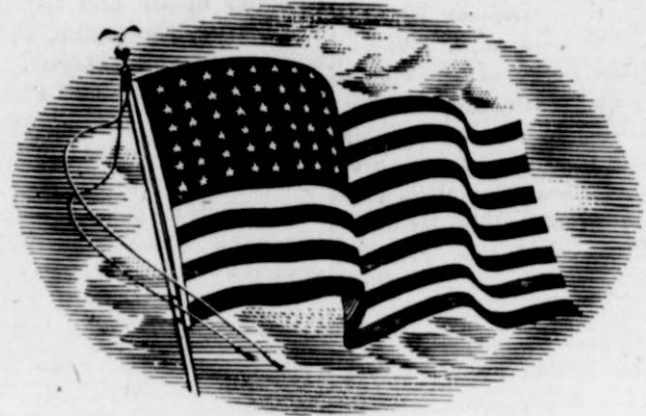
HONOR DORIS KELLER AT SURPRISE SHOWER

CARPENTER STRIKE HOLDS UP PEACE CHURCH PROJECT

Union carpenters in Washington county went out on strike Monday morning in conjunction with the four county walkout which was voted Sunday and which affects carpenters in Milwaukee, Waukesha, Ozaukee and Washington counties. The walkout affects only the carpentry industry and does not affect other building or construction workers.

One of the projects affected by the strike is the new \$80,000 educational building addition to the Peace United Church of Christ in Kewaskum, where work was held up Monday when the carpenters failed to report for work. Several other projects in the county are also affected.

The strike was voted Sunday when some 3,000 of the 4,500 members of the Milwaukee Carpenters District Council voted 5 to 1 to reject the latest offer of Allied Construction Employers Association. Action was interpreted as meaning the carpenters will adhere to their demands for a new contract to replace the one which expired June 1. Carpenters originally asked for a 25 cent an hour wage increase, 3 cents more an hour for the welfare fund, 3 cents more an hour for the vacation fund, six paid holidays and a 10 minute coffee break. The carpenters also suggested a "gentleman's agreement" for an additional penny an hour a year for five years for the welfare, vacation and pension funds. ACEA's last

test offer was a two year pact which would provide packages of 10 cents an hour each year.

The Fourth of July Recalls The Original "Star Spangled Banner"



The Original "Star Spangled Banner" Which Survived the Bombardment at Fort McHenry, Baltimore

Independence Day focuses attention on the original "Star Spangled Banner," shown above in its final resting place, the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D. C.

The flag flew above Fort McHenry, Baltimore, during a night-long bombardment by the British fleet in September, 1814. Francis Scott Key, who had witnessed the shelling of the fort, was so moved to see the flag still flying in the morning that he composed "The Star Spangled Banner" on the spot. The song eventually became our national anthem.

History has it that Col. George Armistead of Fort McHenry wanted the largest flag possible so that the British, who were blockading Chesapeake Bay, would be sure to see it. As a result the flag was heroic in size, measuring 30 by 42 feet. These strange proportions were caused by the fifteen stripes. There were, of course, fifteen stars too.

The flag was made by Mrs. Mary Young Pickersgill who is listed in the Baltimore directory of that period as a maker of "ships banners and flags." Two nieces were pressed into service to help cut and sew the 400 yards of hand woven bunting which went into the

making of this historic banner. It was so large, in fact, that only the malt room of a Baltimore brewery could accommodate it during its making.

Composer Key's phrase, "the rockets red glare," may have influenced a century of Independence Day celebrations which accented fireworks and firewater more than patriotic programs. But as the toll of deaths and injuries mounted annually and the public began to demand moderation, many communities in the 20th century passed laws prohibiting the use of fireworks except for cooperative displays set off by experts. Modern observance of the Fourth is more than likely to mean a parade and patriotic speeches, winding up with a family picnic at which our Day of Independence is moderately saluted with beer.

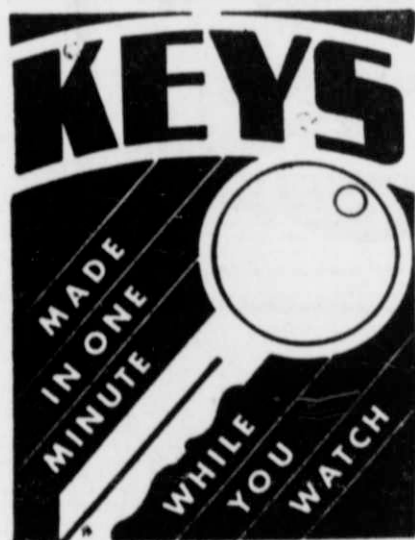

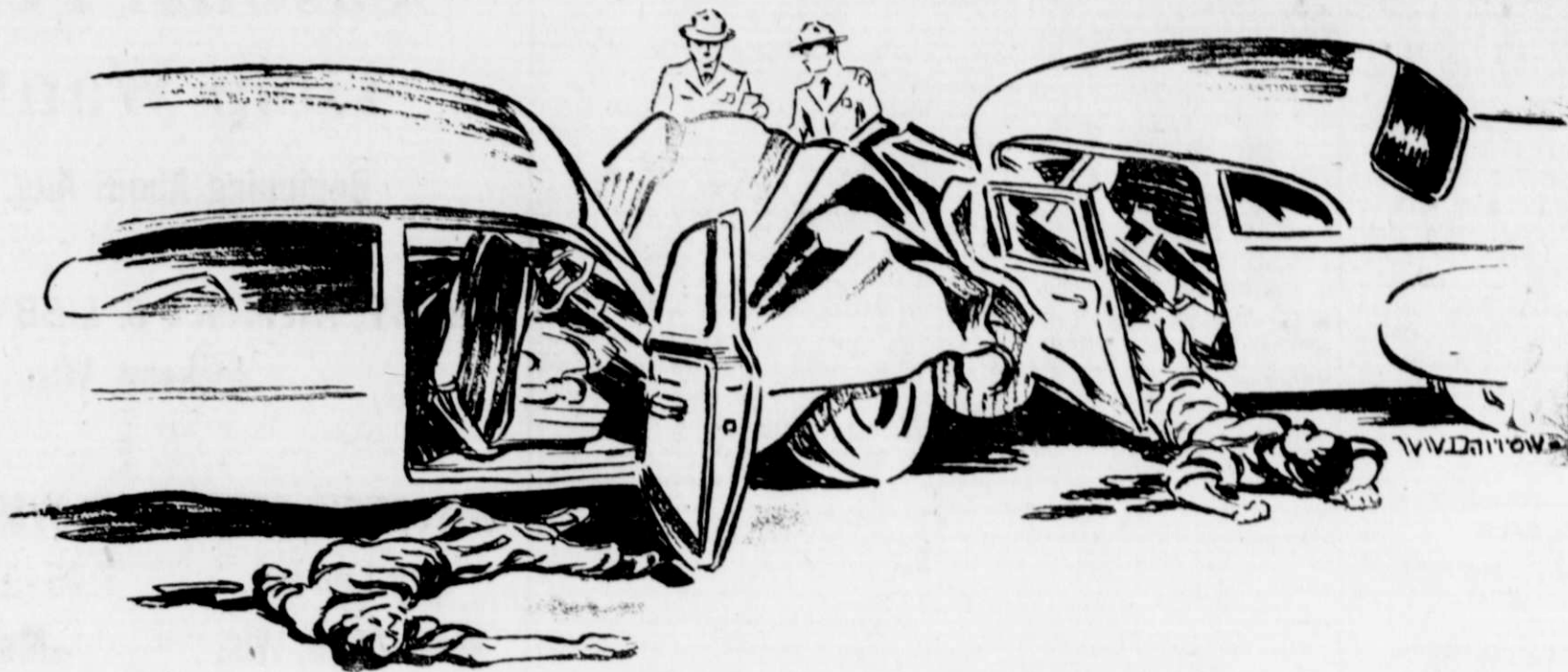

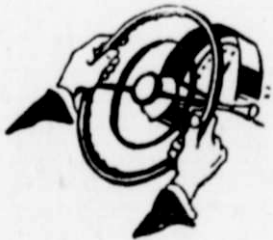

A Picnic? It's In The Bag!

A "spur of the moment" picnic is often described as a "had the best time" type. A late "let's cook out tonight" from the man of the house, or a "why don't we go on a picnic, mom?" from the children, need cause no panic. Decide the family picnic favorites that can be packed in a hurry and the meal is practically in the bag! What to take? that's the next question. Hamburgers?—yes, pull the ground beef patties from the freezer, allowing two for each picnicker.

Hamburgers with Variety

Hamburgers can lend endless variety to meals. Although their cooking at picnics is usually limited to broiling or panbroiling. Seasonings and sauces can add a "different" touch. As a basic recipe, add 1 teaspoon salt and ½ teaspoon pepper to each pound of ground beef. Onion, garlic or celery salt may be substituted for ½ of the salt, if desired. An eighth teaspoon thyme, marjoram, basil or oregano may be used in place of the pepper. Chopper onion, olives or celery may be combined with the meat. The hamburgers may be shaped around a cube of cheese, a pickle slice or a stuffed or pitted ripe olive. Sauces including a mixture of catsup, prepared mustard and Worcestershire sauce

or soy sauce, sugar and ginger may be brushed on the hamburgers as they cook to provide a barbecued or an oriental flavor.

To Complete the Menu

Hamburger buns, potato salad, onions, tomatoes, mustard, catsup, pie or other dessert and beverage complete the menu.

Send one of the children to the nearest market for the buns, canned potatoes or potato salad, and a pie or other dessert. Hard-cook enough eggs to top the potato salad. Put coffee, cold milk, or other beverage in the thermos container.

Packing the Lunch

Make the packing easy—carry all the food in paper bags. Wrap the patties, sliced tomatoes and onions in aluminum foil. Put the potato salad in containers and pack with the hamburgers. Pack mustard, catsup, containers of salt, pepper and sugar and cream (if desired for coffee) in a second bag. Pies, cookies or doughnuts or fruit can be slipped in a third bag. The last bag can carry the picnic plates, cups, napkins, forks, a paring knife and can opener. Someone can carry the beverage container.

Barton Dairy Meets Grade A Requirements

All milk and milk products processed and packaged by the Barton Dairy of R. 2, Kewaskum, continue to qualify for the use of the Grade A label. The processing plant and producing farms meet high Wisconsin Grade A standards.

Every producer of milk is inspected at least once during each six months grading period. During this same period four or more laboratory checks are made of every raw milk supply. Laboratory results are used to determine compliance with these high standards.

In the processing plant, pasteurization equipment, pasteurization procedures, sanitation and general methods are checked on a monthly basis by highly trained milk sanitarians. Four or more laboratory checks are made of all processed products during each six months grading period.

Whenever violations of Grade A

standards set by the state occur, whether on the producing farms, the pasteurization plant or the finished products, procedures to bring about immediate corrections are undertaken. Milk or the milk products in violation are removed from the Grade A supply until such time as tests and/or inspections prove that the supply again complies. This constant supervision and inspection by trained milk sanitarians is the consuming public's assurance that pasteurized Grade A milk and milk products are produced, processed and packaged under the best possible conditions.
