

Key, who had witnessed the shelling of the fort, was so moved to see the flag still flying in the morning that he composed "The Star Spangled Banner" on the spot. The song eventually became our national anthem.

History has it that Col. George Armistead of Fort McHenry wanted the largest flag possible so that the British, who were blockading Chesapeake Bay, would be sure to see it. As a result the flag was heroic in size, measuring 30 by 42 feet. These strange proportions were caused by the fifteen stripes. There were, of course, fifteen

The flag was made by Mrs. Mary Young Pickersgill who is listed in the Baltimore directory of that period as a maker of "ships banners and flags." Two nieces were pressed into service to help cut and sew the 400 yards of hand woven bunting which went into the

making of this historic banner. It was so large, in fact, that only the malt room of a Baltimore brewery could accommodate it during its making.

Composer Key's phrase, "the rockets red glare," may have influenced a century of Independence Day celebrations which accented fireworks and firewater more than patriotic programs. But as the toll of deaths and injuries mounted annually and the public began to demand moderation, many communities in the 20th century passed laws prohibiting the use of fireworks except for cooperative displays set off by experts. Modern observance of the Fourth is more than likely to mean a parade and patriotic speeches, winding up with a fam-ily picnic at which our Day of Independence is moderately saluted

with beer.



A Picnic? It's In The Bag!

Hamburgers can lend endless variety to meals. Although their cooking at picnics is usually limited to broiling or panbroiling. Seasonings and sauces can add "different" touch. As a basic recipe, add 1 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon pepper to each pound of ground beef. Onion, garlic or celery salt may be substituted for ½ of the salt, if desired. An eighth teaspoon thyme, marjoram, basil or oregano may be may be combined with the meat. 

Grade A Requirements

All milk and milk products processed and packaged by the Barton Dairy of R. 2, Kewaskum, continue to qualify for the use of the Grade A label. The processing plant and producing farms meet high Wisconsin Grade A standards.

Every producer of milk is inspec. ted at least once during each six months grading period. During this same period four or more laboratory checks are made of every raw milk supply. Laboratory results are used to determine compliance with these high standards.

In the processing plant, pasteuri. methods are checked on a monthly basis by highly trained milk sani- hidden rocks, crags, sandbars or tarians. Four or more laboratory submerged junk. checks are made of all processed products during each six months grading period.
