This Saturday evening and Sunday, July 9-10, are the dates for Kewaskum's big annual Firemen-Legion picnic in the village park. All preparations have been completed to make this year's event one of the finest ever held.

Highlights on Saturday evening will be an amateur show open to both individuals and groups from this area, which will be followed by music by Les Schneider's orchestra for the remainder of the evening. More amateurs are needed to participate in the show and anyone interested in entering is urged to contact Harry Koch at the post office. An entry blank will be found on another page of this issue. All of the amusement and refreshment stands will be open Saturday night.

Starting off Sunday's festivities will be the feature attraction of the event, the mammoth parade at 12:30 p. m. sharp. This year's parade is sure to be one of the biggest in years. It will include such outstanding musical organizations as the famous "Mercury Thunderbolts" drum and bugle corps, Kewaskum High school band and girls' drill team, other musical units, numerous floats, visiting firemen and Legion groups and drill teams, children's specialties, organizations, 4-H clubs, comedy units and others.

Businessmen have been contacted and asked to enter floats and it is hoped to have very many of them in the line of march. Some of them have been busy most of the week working on their floats and there are sure to be a number of

beautiful ones. A very large number of the young folks are also hard at it preparing entries. Cash prizes will be awarded to the best floats and children's entries and all kiddies who participate will be given tickets good in trade in the park.

Free entertainment from the bandstand will be provided Sunday afternoon and evening by Bob McElroy and Carol in a ventriloquist and balloon act and by Jack Pyle and his magic with a new twist and comedy. He will also serve as master of ceremonies and is a star performer. Both are very worthwhile acts which are sure to be enjoyed by young and old.

The usual water fights will take place at 6:30 p. m. Sunday with four teams from the neighboring fire departments of Campbellsport, Barton, Boltonville and Random Lake battling it out. Winners of the first two bouts will take on each other for the championship.

Rides for the children, concession, refreshment and amusement stands will be in continuous operation. A variety of fun, games, rides and entertainment has been arranged to provide a good time for all. Kewaskum's picnic has a reputation for the biggest and best hamburgers and bratwurst anywhere around so come, have fun and yum yum.

Work Started Tuesday On \$135,000 Street Improvement Project

Work was started on Tuesday, July 5, by the contractors on the village of Kewaskum's \$135,334 street improvement project, which will include new sidewalk, curb and gutter, storm sewers, street lights, street work and other improvements.

The contractor awarded the contract for the general construction work was Warren Wieseler Construction, Inc. of 730 West Glendale ave., Appleton, on a bid of \$116,584.00. The bid for the street lighting contract was awarded to Household Utilities, Inc., 604 Fremont st., Kiel in the amount of \$18,750.00.

On Main street new mercury-vapor type street lights will be installed on the entire length of the street, similar to those on Fond du Lac ave. New sidewalk will be built on both sides of the street, curb and gutter, storm sewer and catch basins will be installed. On the east side of the river, Main st. will be graded and graveled between the present pavement and the new curb and gutter.

Other streets on which street, curb and gutter, grade and graveling, sidewalk, storm sewer or catch basin work will be done include Stark, Kewaskum, Highland, River View drive, Parkview drive, Prospect, School, Tower, Second, Clinton, Elm, Roseland drive, Meadow Lane, Midland ave, Western ave, and Hillside drive.

The work was scheduled to start on River View drive, south of Main st., which is the street leading to the village park but because of the picnic this week end work got underway instead on Park View drive, north of Main st. in order to prevent any interference with the parade and picnic Sunday.

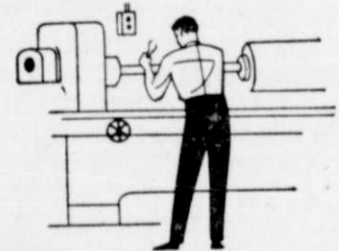
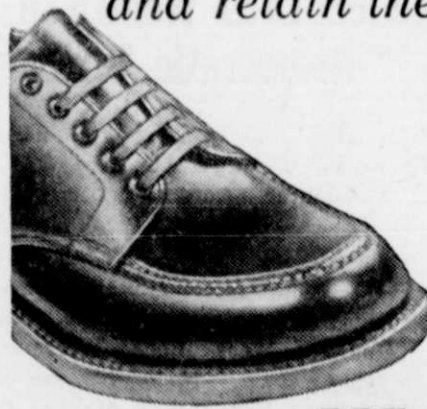

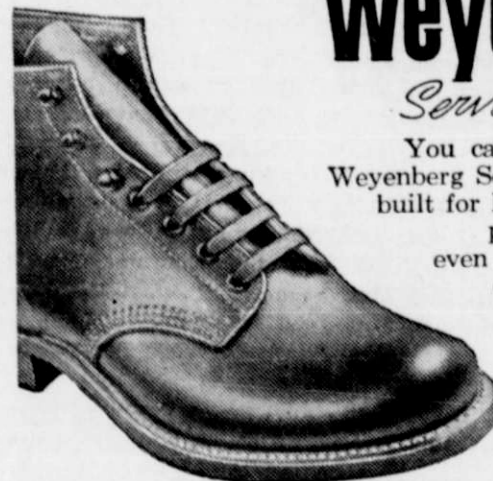
